Purpose of Bill:

#### Department's Position:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in opposition to HB 1374, HD1, Proposed SD1. The Department of Education offers testimony limited to the amendment to HRS 103D-203 (a)(6) which proposes to repeal the Superintendent of Education's authority to serve as the chief procurement officer and instead provides that the Board of Education shall designate someone other than the Superintendent to serve this function.

As currently drafted, this measure creates an uncertainty in the ability of the department to prioritize, execute and administer the procurement of all goods, services and construction for the department. This measure creates an ambiguity in the lines of authority and responsibility between the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Education, and has the potential to decrease the level of accountability for the Department's procurement decision-making. Finally, as drafted, it is unclear what issue this bill is intended to address.

#### RELATING TO PROCUREMENT.

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Slom, and committee members, thank you for the opportunity to testify on HB 1374, HD1, Proposed SD1. The bill proposes to amend §103D-203 on designations of chief procurement officers (CPO), and to prohibit certain persons from serving as the CPO.

The purpose of designating a CPO for the various jurisdictions is to assign appropriate authority for accountability of procurement actions in the handling of expenditures of taxpayer monies. The CPO shall be an individual with the authority and duties as specified in §103D-205.

The CPO is responsible to ensure the procurements are conducted in accordance with the Hawaii Public Procurement Code (Code) and its administrative rules, and is tasked to make various determinations for its delegated procurement officers, such as approving sole sources, emergency procurements, restrictive specifications, procurement violations, exemptions from the Code, contract extensions, etc. The individual designated as the CPO should have relevant and recent experience in public procurement in the large-scale procurement of goods, services, or construction, and demonstrated executive and organizational abilities.

As CPO for the executive departments, I devote 100% of my time to procurement activities. Other CPOs must rightfully devote a majority of their time to their subject matter and procurement activities become secondary at best. The CPO has the highest authority to decide procurement matters, and the individual with that authority should devote a majority of their efforts to the subject matter of procurement.

If this bill allows the designated CPO to devote a good portion of their time to procurement activities, the SPO supports this bill. Thank you.

Due to the scheduling of this legislative hearing, I present this testimony on behalf of the Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation (HART), pending the HART Board of Directors approval at its board meeting on Thursday, March 21, 2013.

The Revised Charter of Honolulu (RCH) Article XVII, Public Transit Authority, established HART as a semi-autonomous agency of the City and County of Honolulu. The RCH grants HART the authority to develop, operate, maintain and expand the city fixed guideway system (RCH§17-103(1)). In order to perform the duties set forth above, the authority was given the power "to make and execute contracts, project labor agreements, and other instruments requiring execution by the authority...with any person or entity in the execution and performance of its powers, duties, and functions." (RCH§17-03(2)(a)). The executive director of HART has the power and duty to "sign all necessary contracts for the authority..."(RCH§17-104(c)).

HB1374, Proposed SD1, proposes to shift the power and duties of the HART executive director, mandated by the RCH, to a HART board of directors' appointee who shall not be the executive director. The proposed amendment directly conflicts with the RCH§17-104(c).

HART recommends no change to the current statutory requirements of Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) §103D-203 since the amendment directly conflicts with the powers and duties granted to the executive director of HART in the Revised Charter of the City and County of Honolulu, Charter Amendment Article XVII §17-104(c).

If such an amendment to HRS §103D-203 is advanced, HART recommends that the CPO appointment authority of the board of directors be defined and limited to a person who: (1) is a current HART employee; (2) has experience in transit projects with Federal funding; and (3) is knowledgeable of Hawaii and Federal Transit Administration procurement requirements.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Slom and Members of the Committee:

The Pacific Resource Partnership (PRP) is a labor-management consortium representing over 240 signatory contractors and the Hawaii Regional Council of Carpenters.

PRP continues to **support** HB 1374, HD1 Relating to Procurement, which allows past performance to be factored into future bid selection of a contractor including a review of delays, cost overruns, and compliance with project requirements. This measure would also include in each bid evaluation a review of assessments from past work from a potential contractor, and allow departments to consider the assessments when making contract awards.

PRP also supports the addition of the proposed SD 1, as a meaningful clarification of the designation of agency procurement officers.

Previous testimony has been submitted noting that current law already allows such factors to be considered; however, construction contractors with records of delays, overruns and violations on public works projects are still securing public works awards with no consideration of poor past performance. The common practice is to ignore poor past performance provided the construction contractor is the low bidder. Procuring agencies need to develop systems to give weight to contractors' performance records on public works projects.

Various models can be considered during the rulemaking process; for example, a point-system might be the most efficient process, or it might be better to allow a contractor to place its statement in the record along with a procurement officer's evaluation. The fact is, models for implementation exist. In any case, an isolated problem or issues that arose from extraordinary project conditions need not exclude the contractor from future bidding.

PRP, in its capacity as a construction industry "watch dog", has monitored multiple private and public works projects in recent years. We believe this is a great first step in "weeding out" unqualified contractors. This measure helps ensure the probability that the right contractor is chosen for public works contracts. Legislation such as this makes it <u>less likely</u> that the wrong contractor is chosen.

For the reasons mentioned above, we respectfully ask for your support on HB 1374, HD1, Proposed SD1. Thank you for the opportunity to share our views with you.
