Chair Wooley, Chair Tsuji and Members of the Committees:

My name is Alan Gottlieb, and I am a rancher and the Government Affairs Chairperson of the Hawaii Cattlemen's Council. The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council, Inc. (HCC) is the Statewide umbrella organization comprised of the five county level Cattlemen's Associations. Our 130+ member ranchers represent over 60,000 head of beef cows; more than 75% of all the beef cows in the State. Ranchers are the stewards of approximately 25% of the State's total land mass.

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council supports HB 1534.

Many Hawaii livestock producers rely on imported grain to sustain their animals and these feed costs are a significant part of their overall expense. Furthermore, the 9 years on-going drought we have had in Hawaii in many of our largest cattle raising regions has added to the problem. We continue to hear about pilot projects for feed mills here in Hawaii, and bi-products from bio-energy crops, but these have still not come to fruition.

We support policies to strengthen the cattle industry and allow us to keep more of our Hawaii born calves in Hawaii (currently about 90% of our calves are shipped out of State by boat and airplane for pasture and finishing elsewhere). With the growing demand by restaurants and local consumers for local grown beef presents a golden opportunity for Hawaii beef cattle industry provided conditions in Hawaii are optimal for raising consistent, high quality beef.

Hawaii's cattle industry faces a number of challenges, including high fuel and transportation costs, the rising costs of livestock feed, limited and aging processing facilities, and ongoing drought conditions that disrupt cattle weight gains and interrupt the marketing of consistent high quality beef. For this reason, having a good supplemental feed, grown in Hawaii is essential in many cases.

If we can develop local feeds to feed Hawaii Livestock, this will go a long way in helping all Hawaii Livestock producers and the Hawaii cattle industry to keep more of our calves here in Hawaii for finishing for local markets.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to testify on this important matter.

Dear Chair Wooley, Vice Chair Onishi, Chair Tsuji, Vice Chair Ward, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Kyle Datta and I am general partner of the Ulupono Initiative, a Hawai'i-based impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life for the people of Hawai'i by working toward solutions that create more locally grown food, increase renewable energy, and reduce/recycle waste. Ulupono invests in projects that have the potential to create large-scale, innovative change.

Ulupono <u>strongly supports</u> HB 1534, which creates an agriculture innovation grant program. As a forprofit investment firm, we are continually searching for new entrepreneurs and businesses that can help increase local food production. However, there are few programs in Hawai'i that are designed to help startup agricultural endeavors. Similar to the Energy Excelerator program conducted by Pacific International Center for High Technology Research (PICHTR), this program will help these companies start on a better trajectory by providing them early stage funding and expert consultation. Ulupono is currently analyzing some of the companies that participated in the Energy Excelerator for potential investment opportunities. If a similar agricultural program exists, Ulupono would be interested in observing the types of agricultural business models that can support local food production.

Furthermore, the average age of a Hawai'i farmer is approximately 60 years old. An agriculture innovation grant program would bring new entrepreneurs into Hawai'i's agricultural sector. These entrepreneurs can eventually create the next generation of agricultural leaders.

We believe that working together we can help produce more local food, support an economically strong homegrown agriculture industry, which strengthens our community with fresh, healthy food. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

HB 1534 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE INNOVATION

Chairs Wooley and Tsuji, Vice Chairs Onishi and Ward, and members of the House Committee on Agriculture and the House Committee on Economic Development & Tourism, thank you for the opportunity to testify today in **<u>support</u>** of HB 1534, which establishes an Agriculture Innovation Grant Program to fund agribusiness incubator programs to support start-up businesses in Hawaii focused on feed production, food waste recycling, on-farm energy efficiency, and soil health and conservation.

My name is J. Kenneth Grace, and I am employed as the Interim Associate Dean and Associate Director for Research in the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR), University of Hawaii at Manoa. I am providing <u>personal testimony</u> today on HB 1534.

I strongly support this effort to support the incubator programs that are essential for agricultural start-ups to develop into successful businesses. The Agricultural Incubator Program at the University of Hawaii, housed within CTAHR and entirely supported to date by competitive federal funding, demonstrates the potential for such programs to help Hawaii. Private efforts in Hawaii to make food safety certified kitchen and food processing facilities available to new businesses have also proven quite popular.

I respectfully ask you to consider the following friendly revisions to HB 1534:

- The present language does not include agribusiness incubator programs assisting startup businesses focused on food production, food processing, and marketing of food products for funding consideration. I suspect that this is an oversight rather than intentional, and strongly suggest that these food-related agricultural activities be included in the bill.
- 2. Section 2 states that the program will be established within the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT), and administered and implemented by the "development corporation." A "board" is also referred to as a managing entity in the bill. Since this is an amendment of HRS 206-M, which authorizes the Hawaii High Technology Development Corporation (HTDC), I assume that HTDC is the "development corporation" and "board" refers to the board of directors of HTDC. However, for clarity, I suggest that direct reference to the Hawaii High Technology Development Corporation be made, and that a more explicit description of the "board" be included in the bill.
