#### In consideration of HOUSE BILL 1544 RELATING TO ANIMALS

The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) appreciates the intent of House Bill 1544 which proposes to allow restrained dogs in state parks in designated areas that have access to the shoreline. The Department however feels this measure is not necessary because rules have been established which address the actions sought in the measure.

The Department's Division of State Parks (Division) has established, under Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) 13-146, rules which address animals, including dogs, in the State Parks. The rules already established by the Board of Land and Natural Resources (Board) in Section 13-146-10 state in part:

(a) No person shall enter the premises with dogs, cats and other animals unless they are crated, caged, on a leash which shall not exceed six feet in length, or otherwise under physical restrictive control at all times.

(b) ... The board or its authorized representative may also designate, by the posting of appropriate signs, any portion of the premises where animals shall not be allowed.

HAR 13-146-10 also addresses responsibility for the clean up and proper disposal of animal droppings, for restoration or restitution for any damages caused by the animal, and if the animal is loose, for restitution for any costs incurred in trapping and removing the animal.

Lastly, penalties for violations of these rules are found in HAR 13-146-3.

#### TESTIMONY OF ROBERT TOYOFUKU ON BEHALF OF THE HAWAII ASSOCIATION FOR JUSTICE (HAJ) IN OPPOSITION TO H.B. NO. 1544

January 22, 2014

To: Chairperson Cindy Evans and Members of the House Committee on Water and Land:

My name is Bob Toyofuku and I am presenting this testimony on behalf of the Hawaii Association for Justice (HAJ) in opposition to H.B. No. 1544.

There are two basic underlying reasons of tort law in the American legal system. One is to compensate a person for his or her injuries as a result of the negligence of another including a government entity. The other is to serve as a deterrent to prevent negligent or irresponsible behavior. When a person or an entity realizes that they may be held liable, there is a strong incentive to prevent the occurrence of harm. One reason for imposing liability is the deliberate purpose of providing that incentive. Said another way, tort law encourages responsible behavior.

This bill absolves the State of all responsibility for the negligent acts of an employee or state officer for any injury to person or damage to property caused by any dog in a state park. Generally, the state would not be liable for civil damages for the negligence of the owner of a dog in a state park unless the state is independently negligent in some way and we feel that this portion of the bill is not necessary. HAJ requests that this portion of the bill be deleted.
