Dear Chairman McKelvey & Vice-Chairman Kawakami,

I am writing in support of HB 154 that authorizes the Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture to establish a two year hemp remediation pilot program. Use of hemp to remove toxins from the soil through phytoremediation is an environmentally sound and fiscally responsible practice that will not only benefit the soil but will demonstrate just one of hemp's many productive uses. Passage of this bill will also demonstrate that Hawaii has learned what nearly a dozen states and thirty countries already know: that hemp is an incredibly useful and resilient material that is NOT a dangerous drug.

The naturally occurring hemp plant grows in dense crops that are resistant to insects and weeds, resulting in higher yields and eliminating the need for pesticides and herbicides, primary causes of non-point source pollution that foul our beaches and near shore waters. In addition to soil remediation, hemp can be used for a wide variety of purposes, including the production of paper, textiles, clothing, biodegradeable plastics, construction materials, and bio-fuel.

Unfortunately, the use of industrial hemp in the United States is still a federal crime, primarily for two reasons:

- Constant pressure from the agricultural, textile and paper industries, who see hemp as a threat to their environmentally destructive but very lucrative current business practices; and
- Fear mongering from law enforcement agencies who continue to confuse industrial hemp with marijuana.

One only needs to read the misinformation contained in written testimony submitted earlier this session to the Committee on Agriculture by the Honolulu Police Department to see an example of the latter fact. Industrial hemp has a THC content of between 0.1% and 1% while common recreational marijuana has a THC content of between 3% and 20%. It is virtually impossible to smoke enough hemp to get a buzz.

Passage of HB 154 is good for Hawai'i's soil and opens the door for future use of an incredibly versatile and environmentally friendly plant. Please vote yes on this bill. Thank you again for the opportunity to testify.

Comments: Aloha, I am writing in support of HB154. I applaud the Legislature for hearing this important measure. Passing it into law would be a small but important step in the right direction. That said, most of the rest of the industrialized world already grows and produces countless hemp products, as well as already conducted bioremediation studies using hemp that can be referenced. So doing a hemp pilot program is good, as was the last one Hawaii did around 10 years ago. The only thing I would add to it is to deal preemptively with Federal law. This can be done by adding that the state of Hawaii is doing this program despite the Federal Controlled Substances Act (CSA). Congress passed the CSA giving the rights to the states, not the DEA, to determine use of a controlled substance. Inserting language into this measure that preserves that right in the CSA and the Full Faith and Credit Act of the U.S. Constitution, would protect the state from repercussions form the Federal government, because hemp and marijuana are the same plant under the law and botanically speaking- as far as the CSA is concerned. It's our right as a state to do what is important for our health, environment, and economy, without Federal interference. Please pass this measure, and also consider making this amendment.
