# HB 1551 Relating to Education

Dear Chair Luke, Vice Chair Nishimoto, Vice Chair Johanson and members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony. The Board of Education SUPPORTS the INTENT of HB 1551.

The Board of Education, on February 18, 2014, approved substantial amendments to our Hawaiian education policies. These policies reaffirm our commitment to Hawaiian Education and Hawaiian Immersion programs in Hawai'i's public schools and set forth an organizational framework within the Department of Education as outlined in HB 1551. Policies attached.

Given the recent passage of these policies, HB 1551 is duplicative.

The Board spent nearly one year working with various stakeholders to develop the policy revisions holding more than 40 stakeholder meetings during the development process. Upon approving the revisions the Board received over 100 testimonies in support of the policies and almost none in opposition.

Part of the policy is the development of a strategic plan for Hawaiian education and we look forward to working with the Legislature and stakeholder groups as we implement these policies.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of the intent of HB 1551.

# HAWAIIAN EDUCATION BOE POLICY 2104

Hawai'i's public education system should embody Hawaiian values, language, culture and history as a foundation to prepare students in grades K-12 for success in college, career and communities, locally and globally. Hawaiian language, culture, and history should be an integral part of Hawai'i's education standards for all students in grades K-12.

The Board of Education recognizes that appropriate support for and implementation of Hawaiian education will positively impact the educational outcomes of all students in preparation for college, career and community success.

Therefore, the Department of Education (Department) shall establish in the Office of the Superintendent an Office of Hawaiian Education of which the head shall be part of the Superintendent's leadership team. The Department will allocate resources including personnel and fiscal to create and implement appropriate, curricula, standards, performance assessment tools, professional development, and strategies for community engagement throughout the Department.

The goals of Hawaiian education shall be to:

- Provide guidance in developing, securing, and utilizing materials that support the incorporation of Hawaiian knowledge, practices and perspectives in all content areas
- Provide educators, staff and administrators with a fundamental knowledge of and appreciation for the indigenous culture, history, places and language of Hawai'i
- Develop and implement an evaluation system that measures student outcomes, teacher effectiveness and administration support of Hawaiian Education. To ensure accountability an annual assessment report to the Board of Education will be required.
- Use community expertise as an essential means in the furtherance of Hawaiian education
- Ensure that all students in Hawai'i's public schools will graduate with proficiency in and appreciation for the indigenous culture, history, and language of Hawai'i.

This policy is applicable to charter schools. A charter school may request a waiver of this policy from the Board of Education.

# KA PAPAHANA KAIAPUNI BOE POLICY 2105

Ka Papahana Kaiapuni (Kaiapuni Educational Program) provides students with Hawaiian bicultural and bilingual education. Additionally, the program contributes to the continuation of our Hawaiian language and culture. The Kaiapuni Educational Program offers students an education in the medium of the Hawaiian language. The comprehensive program combines the use of Hawaiian teaching methodologies, language, history, culture and values to prepare students for college, career and to be community contributors within a multicultural society. The Department of Education (Department) shall develop the necessary rules, regulations, guidelines and procedures as well as an updated strategic plan for the program. Every student within the State of Hawai'i's public school system should have reasonable access to the Kaiapuni Educational Program.

The goals of the Kaiapuni Educational Program shall be:

- 1. To provide parents and student a Hawaiian bicultural and bilingual education based upon a rigorous Hawaiian content and context curriculum. The Kaiapuni Educational Program is offered to students K-12.
- 2. The curriculum and standards are to be developed by the Department to prepare students for college, career and contributors to community with the assistance of the appropriate stakeholders including the 'Aha Kauleo, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, University of Hawai'i system of colleges, 'Aha Pūnana Leo, the Charter School Commission and any other stakeholders selected by the Department. The development of the Kaiapuni curriculum, content, instruction and assessment should be informed and researched-based utilizing qualitative and quantitative data.
- 3. The Department shall establish in the Office of the Superintendent an Office of Hawaiian Education of which the head shall be part of the Superintendent's leadership team which will have oversight of the program's implementation and accountability to ensure effective curricula, performance standards for professional qualifications, organizational structure (e.g. Complex Area, Office), and community engagement. Additionally, this office will provide an annual program performance report to the Board of Education (BOE) and community via the Superintendent.
- 4. The program's success is largely dependent on the capacity, capability and expertise of the program's professional staff. The Department will establish professional qualifications and develop training programs internally and/or in cooperation with stakeholder groups/universities. The goal is for program professionals to be qualified in both English as a medium of instruction and Hawaiian as a medium of instruction and appropriately compensated for these additional qualifications.
- 5. The program's effectiveness requires the development and proper administration of appropriate formative and summative assessment tools. These program evaluation tools should be in alignment with the State's Kaiapuni curriculum and measure student growth

and proficiency with the goal to prepare students for success in college, career and community.

- 6. The delivery of the program to students within the Department may include one of three organizational structures depending on the number of program students: (a) All students are enrolled in the program; principal and teachers are dual qualified. (b) Majority of students are enrolled in the program; principal and teachers are dual qualified; those students not in the program would be taught in English under supervision of the school's principal; and, (c) Students are offered a Kaiapuni Educational Program in an English medium school. Only the teachers teaching the Kaiapuni classes are required to be dual qualified. This policy shall not apply to teachers currently employed by the Department and/or Charter Schools prior to February 18, 2014, and may be waived on an individual basis by the Superintendent of Education as circumstances warrant.
- 7. Each Kaiapuni School shall comply with all applicable BOE policies, rules and regulations.

This policy is applicable to Kaiapuni charter schools. A charter school may request a waiver of this policy from the BOE.

The State Public Charter School Commission appreciates the opportunity to offer these comments on HB1551, which would statutorily establish an Instructional Office of Hawaiian Studies within the Department of Education.

The Commission appreciates the provision in the bill indicating that the proposed office "may assist public charter schools in providing instruction to students on Hawaiian history, culture, arts, and language." Aloha Chair, Vice Chairs and all House Representative Committee members of Finance, I am testifying in strong support of HB 1551.

I am a native Hawaiian lessee who resides on the Hawaiian homestead in the ahupua'a of Waimanalo, O'ahu and a former anake/kumu in the Kupuna Component. A component that is responsible for the implementation of Hawaiian Studies to K-6 grade in the Department of Education public schools. I am also a junior in the Myron B. Thompson school of social work at the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

Growing up in a predominantly Hawaiian community makes me an eye witness to the need of Hawaiian teaching. Hawaiian natives ability to self-determination can only begin through the education of their history, language, culture, and traditional practices which was severed throughout the years that followed the 1896 law banning the language from our school system, a band that later was lifted in the 1980's. Almost one hundred years of disconnection has left a lot of misunderstanding and loss of vital information amongst the natives and the non-natives alike. The kupuna component enables such information and practices to be shared by these individuals who grew-up with such knowledge bestowed upon them through their life

experiences and lessons or through on-going education in regards to language and Hawaiian history.

In 2008 the state mandated an audit of the program where statistics showed that numerous amounts of money was not documented. Long story short, money was not accounted for. Currently the Department Of Education disburses the funds to all K-6 grade schools. Approximately 48 schools who do not have a kupuna component program STILL receives funding for a program they do not implement. Better management of funds are needed. Our kupuna have been hassled by the schools they work at when requesting funding for their lesson plans, activities, etc. An office of Hawaiian education would function as an umbrella over all of the D.O.E. elementary schools' kupuna component programs, middle & high school Hawaiian programs, and would include immersion and charter schools as well, enabling better monitoring of funding, curriculum content, and support that our kupuna, teachers and children of Hawaii needs. All students should have a better understanding of Hawaiian language, philosophy, values, culture, and traditional practices. The establishment of such an office is a step in the efforts to help create a Hawaiian lens and outlook in Hawaii's children, who will one day be the future decision makers of Hawaii. My name is Kukana Kama-Toth and I am in SUPPORT of this bill. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify.

I thank you for scheduling this hearing to consider the substance of HB 1551 and its attendant budgetary implications. The bill, if passed, will reinforce the Board of Education's recent adoption of revised BOE policies 2104 and 2105 which essentially establishes the Office and the Assistant Superintendent of Hawaiian Education in the Department of Education.

I feel strongly that legislative action on HB 1551 and companion SB 2740will support and strengthen the Board of Education and the Department of Education in carrying out the mission and goals as stated in both Board policies.

The need for Hawaiian education is large as thirty plus years have passed since the Hawaii State Constitution of 1978 first mandated teaching Hawaiian history, language and culture to Hawaii's public school children. The BOE and DOE must now do "catch up" because a total curricular approach to developing Hawaiian education has never been done. Too many of our children have grown up or are growing up not knowing, understanding, or appreciating the first people of these islands, the host culture –its history, language, traditions, and values. It is a culture that made Hawaii unique, a place where people liked to live, visit or stay. We need to reinfuse the culture into our society through teaching our children

I realize that the total funding for a program with such depth and scope cannot be done all at once; however, I believe we need to start with what would be essential budget needs. The following is a possible model:

Funds for: 1 Assistant Superintendent's position

1 secretary to the assistant superintendent

1 administrative Services Position

.1 budget Specialist

1 secretary or clerk for the two positions above

4 curriculum/instructional development positions

Total : nine(9) positions

### HAWAIIAN EDUCATION BOE POLICY 2104

Hawai'i's public education system should embody Hawaiian values, language, culture and history as a foundation to prepare students in grades K-12 for success in college, career and communities, locally and globally. Hawaiian language, culture, and history should be an integral part of Hawai'i's education standards for all students in grades K-12.

The Board of Education recognizes that appropriate support for and implementation of Hawalian education will positively impact the educational outcomes of all students in preparation for college, career and community success.

Therefore, the Department of Education (Department) shall establish in the Office of the Superintendent an Office of Hawaiian Education of which the head shall be part of the Superintendent's leadership team. The Department will allocate resources including personnel and fiscal to create and implement appropriate, curricula, standards, performance assessment tools, professional development, and strategies for community engagement throughout the Department.

The goals of Hawailan education shall be to:

- Provide guidance in developing, securing, and utilizing materials that support the incorporation of Hawaiian knowledge, practices and perspectives in all content areas
- Provide educators, staff and administrators with a fundamental knowledge of and appreciation for the indigenous culture, history, places and language of Hawai'i
- Develop and implement an evaluation system that measures student outcomes, teacher effectiveness and administration support of Hawaiian Education. To ensure accountability an annual assessment report to the Board of Education will be required.
- Use community expertise as an essential means in the furtherance of Hawaiian education
- Ensure that all students in Hawai'i's public schools will graduate with proficiency in and appreciation for the Indigenous culture, history, and language of Hawai'i.

This policy is applicable to charter schools. A charter school may request a waiver of this policy from the Board of Education.

### KA PAPAHANA KAIAPUNI BOE POLICY 2105

Ka Papahana Kaiapuni (Kaiapuni Educational Program) provides students with Hawaiian bicultural and bilingual education. Additionally, the program contributes to the continuation of our Hawaiian language and culture. The Kaiapuni Educational Program offers students an education in the medium of the Hawaiian language. The comprehensive program combines the use of Hawaiian teaching methodologles, language, history, culture and values to prepare students for college, career and to be community contributors within a multicultural society. The Department of Education (Department) shall develop the necessary rules, regulations, guidelines and procedures as well as an updated strategic plan for the program. Every student within the State of Hawai'i's public school system should have reasonable access to the Kaiapuni Educational Program.

The goals of the Kaiapuni Educational Program shall be:

- 1. To provide parents and student a Hawaiian bicuitural and bilingual education based upon a rigorous Hawaiian content and context curriculum. The Kaiapuni Educational Program is offered to students K-12.
- 2. The curriculum and standards are to be developed by the Department to prepare students for college, career and contributors to community with the assistance of the appropriate stakeholders including the 'Aha Kauleo, Office of Hawalian Affairs, University of Hawai'i system of colleges, and any other stakeholders selected by the Department. The development of the Kaiapuni curriculum, content, instruction and assessment should be informed and researched-based utilizing gualitative and guantitative data.
- 3. The Department shall establish in the Office of the Superintendent an Office of Hawaiian Education of which the head shall be part of the Superintendent's leadership team which will have oversight of the program's implementation and accountability to ensure effective curricula, performance standards for professional qualifications, organizational structure (e.g. Complex Area, Office), and community engagement. Additionally, this office will provide an annual program performance report to the Board of Education (BOE) and community via the Superintendent.
- 4. The program's success is largely dependent on the capacity, capability and expertise of the program's professional staff. The Department will establish professional qualifications and develop training programs internally and/or in cooperation with stakeholder groups/universities. The goal is for program professionals to be qualified in both English as a medium of instruction and Hawaiian as a medium of instruction and appropriately compensated for these additional qualifications.
- 5. The program's effectiveness requires the development and proper administration of appropriate formative and summative assessment tools. These program evaluation tools should be in alignment with the State's Kaiapuni curriculum and measure student growth

and proficiency with the goal to prepare students for success in college, career and community.

6. The delivery of the program to students within the Department may include one of three organizational structures depending on the number of program students: (a) All students are enrolled in the program; principal and teachers are dual qualified. (b) Majority of students are enrolled In the program; principal and teachers are dual qualified; those students not in the program would be taught in English under supervision of the school's principal; and, (c) Students are offered a Kaiapuni Educational Program in an English medium school. Only the teachers teaching the Kaiapuni classes are required to be dual qualified. This policy shall not apply to teachers currently employed by the Department and/or Charter Schools prior to [insert BOE date of policy approval], and may be waived on an individual basis by the Superintendent of Education as circumstances warrant.

7. Each Kaiapuni School shall comply with all applicable BOE pollcles, rules and regulations.

This policy is applicable to Kaiapuni charter schools. A charter school may request a waiver of this policy from the BOE.

Finally, Chair Luke and members of the House Finance Committee, I am extremely delighted and pleased with this Committee's leadership, vision, and commitment to ensuring that the DOE becomes truly a Hawaiian place of learning and is supportive of Hawaiian cultural identity. Your leadership and vision will also ensure that all children are college, career and community ready and that the Hawaiian language, culture, and history can live, thrive and become successful in the homeland of our Hawaiian Ancestors.

Mahalo for allowing me the opportunity to testify on such an important and critical agenda item in hopes that the BOE and DOE will immediately implement and provide the necessary resources throughout the entire education system to make these policies an essential part of its daily operations and educational framework.
