RE: H.B. 1570; RELATING TO ABUSE OF FAMILY OR HOUSEHOLD MEMBER.

Chair Aquino, Vice-Chair Ing, and members of the House Committee on Public Safety, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, City and County of Honolulu, submits the following testimony in **support** of House Bill 1570.

H.B. 1570 extends the period of separation that a police officer can order a person under suspicion of physical abuse or harm to 4:30 p.m. on the second business day following the weekend or legal holiday if the forty-eight hour period of separation expires on any Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday or if the incident occurs after 12:00 p.m. on any Friday, or on any Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday.

The intent of having the 48-hour period of separation is to keep the abuser away from the victim and give the victim time to get a restraining order and safe shelter. Currently, if an abuse happens over the weekend or holiday, all government agencies and many private organizations are closed while the clock is ticking away. This measure will give the time needed for victims to get help and legal protection.

For all of the reasons stated above, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu <u>supports</u> H.B. 1570. Thank for you the opportunity to testify on this matter.

The Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Kauai submits the following testimony in support of H.B. 1570, Relating to Abuse of Family or Household Member.

The purpose of H.B. 1570 is to address the concern of a Police Officer's stay away order that is issued after the close of business on a Friday, during the weekend, or on a holiday. In its current form, the statute allows for a 48-hour period of separation, however, it does not address issues that may arise if an order is given on a Friday after business hours, the weekend, or on a holiday. Therefore, H.B. 1570 calls for an extension of two (2) business days to an order issued during these times. Not only would the passage of this bill allow the victim sufficient time to obtain a restraining order, but is also maintains the essence of HRS 709-906 in providing the necessary protective measures to victims of domestic violence.

For this reason, we strongly support H.B. 1570. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this matter.

Chair Aquino, Vice Chair Ing and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Maui, SUPPORTS HB 1570, Relating to Abuse of Family or Household Member. HB 1570 will extend the period of separation that a police officer can order under suspicion of physical abuse or harm to 4:30 p.m. on the second business day following the weekend or legal holiday if the forty-eight hour period of separation expires on any Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday or if the incident occurs after 12:00 p.m. on any Friday, or on any Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday.

Last year, the legislature passed Act 251, which among other things, requires that a police officer issue a stay away order if the officer has reasonable belief that there is probably danger of further abuse, and the stay away order was extended to 48-hours from 24-hours. It is presumed that the time extension was made to allow victims two business days to obtain a restraining order. However, Act 251 did not amend the provision regarding after close of business on a Friday, or Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays. Currently, if the stay away order is issued during those times, the stay away order ends at the close of business on the first work day following the weekend or holiday. Thus, victims do not have two full workdays to go through the process of obtaining restraining orders.

Furthermore, the weekend/holiday omission is causing confusion among police officers. They have to issue a 48-hour order on weekdays, but in the case of a Sunday or a holiday with a work day following, the stay away order may be less than 24-hours. This bill will correct this problem, so that it is clear that a victim will receive to full workdays to obtain a restraining order.

Accordingly, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Maui, SUPPORTS the passage of this bill. We ask that the committee PASS HB 1570.
