H.B. 1667, H.D.1 RELATING TO VETERANS

House Committee on Veterans, Military, & International Affairs, & Culture and the Arts

The Department of Transportation (DOT) appreciates veterans and respectfully recognizes the merits to reward their sacrifices for duty, honor and country. Lowering fees and charges and anything else that might be helpful to them would be a priority.

The DOT, however, **opposes** H.B. 1667, H.D.1 because it would have an adverse impact on fees that support the operations, maintenance, and construction of our highways.

This exemption for the state motor vehicle registration fee will reduce the revenues deposited into the State Highway Fund. The state vehicle registration fee accounted for 16.5 percent of the total State Highway Fund Revenues for fiscal year 2013 and is estimated to provide the same percentage for fiscal year 2014. Any proposed decrease would have a negative impact on the health of the State Highway Fund.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support of** this important measure. The purpose of this measure is to exempt qualifying totally and permanently disabled veterans from paying the State Motor Vehicle Registration Fee on one of their noncommercial vehicles.

The Maui County Council has not had the opportunity to take a formal position on this measure. Therefore, I am providing this testimony in my capacity as an individual member of the Maui County Council.

I support this measure for the following reasons:

- 1. Veterans of the armed services should be recognized and honored for their selflessness and bravery in serving our country. In addition to the challenges faced overseas, many veterans return home with permanent physical and mental injuries, including the loss of limbs, varying degrees of post-traumatic stress disorder, and other continued hardships. I applaud the Legislature for putting forward a bill that will show a small measure of our appreciation for their sacrifices.
- 2. By Act 141 (2008), the Legislature exempted one noncommercial vehicle owned by members of the National Guard, military reserves, and active-duty armed services, including the Coast Guard, who are residents of Hawaii from paying the Motor Vehicle Weight Tax. Permanently disabled veterans were not included, yet they are equally deserving of this exemption.

For the foregoing reasons, I support this measure.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony here today.

For the past six years the needs of the Transportation Department have outweighed the need to help permanently disabled Veterans residing in Hawaii. During the past six years, the tax on vehicle registration has increased two or three times and the budget for the Transportation Department has increased considerably!

The VA finally reported on December 3, 2013 that there are only 2,203 permanently disabled Veterans living in Hawaii. An estimate of the impact of this bill was finally made possible.

In 2008, a full exemption of the registration fees was granted to the National Guard Reserves, other military reserves, and active duty military personnel claiming Hawaii as their legal residence of record (Department of Customer Services CSD Act 141). Permanently disabled Veterans were for whatever reason not included!

Permanently Disabled Veterans still endure an appreciable degree of pain; all of them are still unable to seek gainful employment; most likely all of them still suffer varying degrees of PTSD and some the effects of exposure to Agent Orange; many suffer the loss of limbs; and many must rely on a wheelchair to get around! Are these *permanently disabled* Veterans less deserving of this exemption than other military personnel?

I believe that most of the members of our Congress agree that these Permanently Disabled Veterans deserves this exemption! The affected Veterans humbly implore this Committee to unanimously approve HB1667, <u>effective on the date of</u> <u>approval</u>. If the bill is not effective until 1 July or 1 Oct, Veterans registering their vehicles prior to those dates will not be able to use the exemption until next year.

SUBJECT: MOTOR VEHICLE, Exempt motor vehicle registration for disabled veterans

BILL NUMBER: HB 1667, HD-1

INTRODUCED BY: House Committee on Transportation

BRIEF SUMMARY: Adds a new section to HRS chapter 249 to provide that any totally and permanently disabled veteran who is: (1) a resident of Hawaii; (2) other than dishonorably discharged from the U.S. uniformed armed forces; (3) determined by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to have a service-connected 100% disability rating for compensation or a service-connected disability rating of 100%; and (4) in receipt of disability retirement pay from any branch of the uniformed armed forces, shall not be required to pay any state motor vehicle registration fees provided the exemption shall not extend to vehicles used for commercial purposes, nor to more than one vehicle of the disabled veteran.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Upon approval

STAFF COMMENTS: This measure proposes to exempt one noncommercial motor vehicle owned by disabled veterans who are residents of the state from the state motor vehicle registration fee. The legislature by Act 141, SLH 2008, exempted from the motor vehicle weight taxes, one noncommercial motor vehicle owned by members of the national guard, reserves, active duty armed services, including the coast guard, who are residents of Hawaii.

Inasmuch as the motor vehicle weight tax and registration fees are user charges designed to recover the cost of construction and maintenance of Hawaii's highway system, there is little justification for the proposed exemption. It should be remembered that all motorists use the state highways and should, therefore, lend a hand in paying for good and safe roads. Note well, that any exemption granted to a select group of users requires that the lost revenues be made up by those who must continue to pay. Motorists who will have to pick up the additional costs created by this proposed exemption should hold those who would propose such an exemption responsible for raising their taxes.

Exemptions based solely on physical condition or age have no place in the tax law and represent poor tax policy. So while the exemption would provide relief to a disabled veteran, a single mom making minimum wage, barely making ends meet, must continue to pay these fees. As such, this proposal cannot be justified. Given that this proposal has been continually introduced, it is hard to imagine that lawmakers have not asked the question as to why they believe that a disabled veteran is financially incapable of paying his or her fair share to maintain the state's highways.

I am Major General Darryll D. M. Wong, State Adjutant General, and I am testifying in **SUPPORT** of House Bill 1667.

This bill exempts qualifying totally and permanently Disabled Veterans who are 100% Veterans Affairs (VA) rated from paying the State motor vehicle registration fee. As of November 2013, the Department of Veterans Affairs reported there are 2,203 Hawaii veterans rated at 100% disability.

This exemption would be a small recognition of those veterans who incurred military related injuries and are now rated 100% disabled.
