In consideration of HOUSE BILL 1795 RELATING TO THE KEIKI, 'OPIO, AND KUPUNA TRUST FUND

House Bill 1795 proposes to establish a program for individuals to purchase native or foodbearing trees to be planted on government-owned lands, and establishes the keiki, 'opio, and kupuna trust fund to collect funds received by the program and to support the program. After ten years, the annual interest earned on the trust corpus is to be used for programs supporting children, youth, and the elderly. **The Department of Land and Natural Resources** (Department) appreciates the intent of the bill, and offers the following amendments to avoid duplication with the existing state forest stewardship special fund and forest reserves management program.

The Department strongly supports initiatives to encourage private and public entities to invest in sustainable forest management. The Department notes a great deal of duplication in this proposal with the existing Forest Stewardship Special Fund (Section 195F-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS)) and the management of the State Forest Reserves System as authorized under Chapter 183, HRS. The duties and activities authorized under this Chapter are compatible with the goals to conserve and reforest Hawaii's native trees on public forest lands. The Department has the ability to accept funding to support forest management including federal and state funds as well as contributions from other parties. The Department's Division of Forestry and Wildlife currently receives revenues from our seedlings and forest product sales. These revenues currently go toward protecting our watersheds, native forests, and enhancing recreational areas for current and future generations. We do not see the need to establish a separate trust account and advisory board to accomplish the tasks set forth in the bill, as they are already part of the mission of the Department.

Additionally, the Department provides several opportunities for the public to participate in native tree planting and forest restoration. The Department actively encourages people and private landowners to invest in conservation and native species restoration through available landowner assistance programs, community engagement, and interactions with the State's forest and natural area reserves and state parks. We provide residents and visitors opportunities to volunteer and contribute to native forest restoration and out-planting activities throughout the year. The Department also encourages and provides opportunities from communities to be involved in forestry management through cooperative partnerships on government lands.

The Department would be pleased to work with the House Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, and Water & Land Committees to incorporate this initiative into the forest stewardship program and state forest reserve management programs. The Department is exploring the feasibility of partnering with private businesses to generate funding through visitor and resident contributions to generate revenues for existing funds that support the protection of Hawaii's forests. Forestry is a long-term investment that provides the public with a multitude of benefits, including cleaner air, increased water production, and habitat for native wildlife.

RELATING TO THE KEIKI, 'OPIO, AND KUPUNA TRUST FUND

House Bill No. 1795 establishes a Keiki, 'Opio, and Kupuna Trust Fund (Trust Fund) as a separate fund of a nonprofit agency to be administered by the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) as a means to encourage people to make financial investments while supporting conservation, reforestation of Hawaii's native trees, environmental stewardship, sustainable food and energy production and programs that support and benefit keiki and kupuna. The Trust Fund will collect moneys from individuals to purchase native or food-bearing trees to be planted on government-owned lands. After ten years, the measure requires the annual interest earned on the trust to be used for programs supporting children, youths, and the elderly.

The Department of Budget and Finance defers to the DLNR on the viability and appropriateness of an eco-tourism program. As a matter of general policy, the department does not support creation of trust funds which do not meet the requirements of Section 37-62, HRS. In regards to House Bill No. 1795, it is not evident if the proposed Trust Fund would be self-sufficient.

I encourage the Legislature to scrutinize the fiscal and operational plan for this program to ensure that it does conform to the requirements of Section 37-62, HRS.
