Comments: There is a general lack of emergency shelters for hurricanes on all Islands. Why limit this bill to just Public Schools ? What about all the other Public buildings on each Island ? Like the local Recreation Centers, Gyms, etc. During the Hurricane, how are these buildings going to keep the lights on ? The bathrooms working ? Once the hurricane has passed how are these building going to support all those that no longer have then own home to go back to ? Where are they going to live ? The objectives of this bill are right on, but the problem is bigger than just shelters. Is our state prepared for another large scale disaster ? Especially if we have a disaster that involves multiple Islands ? A Tsunami could involve the entire State !

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Testimony - HB 1868

Good afternoon. My name is Raleigh Ferdun and am submitting this testimony in support of HB 1868. I am a resident of Manoa Valley and am a member of the Manoa Disaster Preparedness Team (Manoa DPT). This team is composed of volunteer citizens, such as myself, members of the Manoa Neighborhood Board and representatives of Malama Manoa. The objective of the Manoa DPT is to compile a comprehensive Manoa Disaster Preparedness Plan and to make Manoa a resilient community which can weather any disaster and quickly recover thereafter.

Manoa is an older community in several different ways. Many of the houses were built in the 1950s, '60s and '70s and are single wall construction. As such they would be very vulnerable to an Iniki strength wind event. The population of Manoa Valley is 20,000 to 25,000 residents so during a hurricane there could potentially be 100s or possibility 1000s of residents requiring emergency shelter. Currently there are only two hurricane shelters available in Manoa, Manoa Elementary School and Noelani Elementary School both with very limited capacity. In addition, neither of these shelters is designated as a special needs or pet friendly. Manoa is an old community in the sense that there are many elderly and disabled residents yet there is no nearby special needs shelter.

In addition, of great concert to the Manoa DPT is that, although Manoa Valley is not in danger of tsunami inundation, we may need to play host to potentially 1000s of people from Waikiki, Makiki, and Downtown seeking higher ground. If there is substantial damage at those lower elevations, a large number of evacuees could require shelter for an extended period of time. In that scenario, the available shelters in Manoa would be totally inadequate.

As a member of the Manoa Disaster Preparedness Team I request that this committee, and the legislature as a whole, take steps to upgrade and increase the capacity of emergency shelters not only in Manoa, but elsewhere as well. And to do so before we have an event which shows us how ill prepared we are.

Mahalo for allowing me to submit my testimony in **STRONG SUPPORT of HB1868** to fund the retrofitting and upgrading Manoa's public school buildings.

As an active member of the **Manoa Disaster Preparedness Team (MDPT)** we have been tasked the extremely serious responsibility of creating a practical plan to respond for a disaster in Manoa. I am personally involved with the subject of disaster preparedness of Manoa Valley, because of my 80 year old home. And many of us have been made aware of the lack of sufficient emergency shelter for our residents.

Manoa Valley has unique disaster shortcoming. We are a neighborhood with a high number of resident senior citizens, approximately 30 percent of approximately 22,000 residents, or 4,000, over 65 years old. We also have about a dozen care homes housing several hundred very infirm elderly patients.

Manoa, with many old homes and many old people will need greater support than the average community. Our present public shelters, **Noelani and Manoa Elementary Schools**, will be overwhelmed beyond capacity. We need to upgrade these schools to meet civil defense shelter requirements.

Residents of the lowlands of our Ala Wai watershed will also have a greater need for that shelter. The ultimate importance of such preparation is to receive certification from Civil Defense for Manoa's shelter needs. Thus, we can take care of not only Manoa residents but also the many other displaced people: tourists and residents, from the sea level and low-lying communities of Waikiki, Kapahulu, Makiki, McCully, etc.

It is not if, but when a tsunami, hurricane or super storm hit Oahu is imminent. The Corps of Engineers projections predict that at that time, the waters would flood the Ala Wai Canal and that the Ala Wai Golf Course would serve as a water catchment.

To meet that calamity head on, we must start preparation, not tomorrow, but today, and it starts with your support. The MDPT Team has identified the need for additional civil defense certified facilities in our valley as a priority.

We request your outmost consideration of HB1868, not just for Manoa residents, but for the greater good of the entire Ala Wai watershed population.

Comments: I support this bill as written, with the proviso that the upgrading of Manoa Elementary and Noelani Elementary to conform to FEMA hurricane shelter standards be coordinated with any proposed effort to air-condition those schools, an initiative that is currently under consideration. In the event of a hurricane, civil defense authorities ordering residents in a storm situation to take shelter in sub-standard community buildings, or overcrowded buildings, is asking them to risk serious injury or death. Currently, there is only room for about 10% of Manoa's population in our elementary schools. Many more shelters in Manoa than the two Manoa elementary schools need to be identified and prepared.
