#### In consideration of **HOUSE BILL 1904** RELATING TO INVASIVE SPECIES

House Bill 1904 proposes to appropriate \$2,000,000 in general funds to the Hawaii Invasive Species Council (HISC) for outreach regarding and the prevention and eradication of invasive species on Hawaii Island. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure and offers the following comments.

As an island state, Hawaii faces a broad array of invasive species problems, including stinging fire ants, rapidly growing invasive plants that alter watershed forest composition and function, marine algae that smother our coral reefs, and mosquitoes that may carry deadly diseases. Hawaii Island, in particular, has the State's largest populations of little fire ants, coqui frogs, and the invasive plant Miconia calvescens. The Department supports invasive species prevention, control, and outreach on Hawaii Island, but notes that the State of Hawaii faces serious invasive species threats on all islands. The Department suggests that an appropriation for invasive species control on Hawaii Island be considered within the context statewide needs for invasive species control.

The Department also notes that the Executive Budget request includes \$1,000,000 in supplemental funds for HISC, to be added to \$750,000 that was previously appropriated for Fiscal Year 15 at the start of this biennium. The Department supports the Executive Budget request, but recognizes and appreciates this additional appropriation measure, provided that this appropriation does not replace or adversely impact appropriations for other priorities in the Executive Budget request. The Department supports efforts underway to increase overall funding for invasive species by \$5 million and would recommend that any additional funding for specific projects under this bill does not adversely impact such efforts.

The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i is a private non-profit conservation organization dedicated to the preservation of the lands and waters upon which life in these islands depends. The Conservancy has helped to protect nearly 200,000 acres of natural lands in Hawai'i. Today, we actively manage more than 35,000 acres in 11 nature preserves on Maui, Hawai'i, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, and Kaua'i. We also work closely with government agencies, private parties and communities on cooperative land and marine management projects.

The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i submits the following comments regarding H.B. 1904 Relating Invasive Species.

We appreciate the crisis situation that exists with respect to invasive species, particularly on Hawai'i island, and we support a strong and coordinated response to address these invasions.

However, we hope that the necessary response to the pest issues on Hawai'i island will not prevent the State and its partners from also devoting appropriate attention and funding to pest issues across the islands. The task of the Hawai'i Invasive Species Council (HISC) is to provide a comprehensive, statewide approach to invasive species including prevention, early detection, control, research and education programs. This effort necessarily results in prioritization based on a variety of issues including human health, safety and well-being, economic harm, and the threat to the health and function of the environment.

We are also concerned about unintended financial impacts. For example, in Fiscal Year 2007 the Legislature's provision of specific funding for coqui control was really a shifting of existing funds from other invasive species programs, which then caused layoffs in the Island Invasive Species Committees and a hiatus in the Hawai'i Invasive Species Council's research grant program.

Therefore, we respectfully ask that this Committee and the Legislature avoid a piecemeal response and instead take a comprehensive approach of providing significant and consistent funding to address the full range of invasive species priorities across the state.

Dear Chair, Vice Chair, and Committee Representatives sitting on Water & Land Committee.

The purpose of this Act: HB1904 is to appropriate funds to the Hawaii invasive species council to be used for education regarding the prevention and eradication of invasive species on the island of Hawaii.

In this Act, there is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof, as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014—2015 to the Hawaii invasive species council for the purposes of education regarding and the prevention and eradication of invasive species on the island of Hawaii.

The sum of \$2,000,000 dollars is excessively over estimated; leaving the mechanism of misappropriating of these funds for that reason. Yes, it is true the State's budget has recently been determined to be in the black; however, the State's economy is fragile from the long economic downturn; whereby, to allow excessive appropriations such as requested therein this bill: HB1904, would be grossly negligent.

The sum appropriated should be reduced to \$1,000,000 dollars accordingly. Paramount, the funds should be expended invariantly by the department of education for the purposes of this Act, and not by the department of land and natural resources. As, the department of land and natural resources will misappropriate these funds from the source it was conceived to address, education.

In appreciation of your public service work and as a constituent of the committee chair, I request you would reduce the amount of the request funds, and redirect the entity by which these funds shall be expended through. I **oppose** this Act as it currently stands.

Comments: On HB1904 BIISC defers to the testimony of the HISC and DLNR. BIISC supports significant increases in funding to improve the knowledge base, awareness, engagement, and initiative among specific stakeholder groups and the general public to prevent and control the spread of invasive species. Providing these funds to the HISC initiates a competitive process, ensuring that highly qualified and adequately staffed organizations ultimately receive, expend, and report on the success of funded education campaigns. A short list of the many worthy organizations on the island of Hawaii combat and educate the public about invasive species: BIISC, which focuses on the highest risk economic and human health impacts, and early detection/rapid response efforts. The Hawaii Ant Lab, which develops methods, produces guides, and trains the community to detect and control the Little Fire Ant. Plant Pono and the Hawaii Weed Risk Assessment, working collaboratively with the horticulture industry to "know before you grow" and receive an endorsement for getting it right. The Watershed Partnerships, which work across the highest value native forests to remove established invasive species threatening native biodiversity and the islands' water supply, and have actively engaged a generation of Hawaii's students in the forest and in the classroom. The College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources of UH (CTAHR), which provides active, hands-on extension services to producers of locally grown food and agricultural products. The Pacific C ooperative Studies Unit, with a forty year history of working to protect cultural and natural biodiversity in the Pacific while encouraging a sustainable economy. The Department of Agriculture, which employs some of the most highly trained, experienced, critically important, and underfunded people and programs in Hawaii Government. The Division of Forestry and Wildlife, which manages multiple conflicting priorities and requires far greater resources to communicate the reasoning behind their management activities. The Division of Aquatic Resources, engaging an international fishing fleet in the battle against aquatic pests that harm our reefs and fisheries. The Hawaii Department of Health, whose vector control branch provides critical, time-sensitive information to the public, but only if those positions are funded. There are far too many partners and cooperators in the fight against invasive species to name, and each works diligently with extremely limited funds to educate the people of Hawaii, to protect Hawaii.
