Chair Evans, Vice Chair Lowen, and Members of the Committee on Water and Land.

House Bill 1919 HD1 adds a chapter to the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) entitled,

Kupuna Retreat Education Act for Teaching Ecology, which authorizes counties to issue an

"[e]ducational retreat permit." That term is defined as "a remote rural farm-campus" that

"[p]rovides instructional programs on ecology and related topics" and "[b]enefits local and on-

campus residents and visitors." The defined activity does not appear to be appurtenant to or

primarily a farming operation as defined under HRS § 165-2.

The subject bill is unclear about whether this permit will affect the State Agricultural

Land Use District.¹ If it does, we provide the following comments for your consideration:

• There are existing and well-used processes in place to permit uses such as educational retreats in appropriate areas in the agricultural district such that the bill is not necessary.

¹ See HRS § 205-2 ("There shall be four major land use districts in which all lands in the State shall be placed: urban, rural, agricultural, and conservation." As of November 12, 2013, approximately 49% of lands in the state are in the Conservation District and 46% is in the Agricultural District.)

In particular, the Special Permit process in HRS § 205-6 authorizes county planning commissions to "permit certain unusual and reasonable uses within the agricultural and rural districts other than those for which the district is classified." Special permits have been granted by county planning commissions for proposed educational retreats and overnight accommodations in accordance with county special use permit rules and the guidelines set forth in Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) § 15-15-95.

- The counties and the State have not completed the process of identifying important agricultural lands (IAL) to the State of Hawaii. The intent of the IAL law is to "conser[ve] the State's agricultural land resource base and assur[e] the long-term availability of agricultural lands for agricultural use[.]"² The IAL law, passed in 2005, implements Article XI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, which directs the State to "conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency and assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands."
- Allowing non-agricultural uses in the State Agricultural District may contribute to the impermanence syndrome, whereby agricultural use declines due to farmers' disinvestment in their farm operations in anticipation of development. This has been observed to occur where competing uses are allowed in areas designed for agricultural uses.³

Accordingly, we believe the current county regulatory processes and the provisions of HRS Chapter 205 and HAR Chapter 15-15 adequately address the intent of the proposed bill.

Chairperson Evans and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 1919, House Draft 1. The Department of Agriculture offers comments.

This bill seeks to create a new permit at the county level to establish educational retreats focusing on ecology and related topics, and other programs and facilities supportive of education, employment, energy, the economy, recreation, services, supplies, safety, and agricultural food production. The location of educational retreat sites are remote rural farms with land rated as "A" by the Land Study Bureau or "Other Important" land as classified by the Agricultural Lands of Importance to the State of Hawaii (ALISH) system. "A" rated lands have the highest productivity potential for most agricultural crops. These retreat sites allow for accommodations for up to eight persons per acre and a maximum habitable site of 500 acres.

The Department of Agriculture supports efforts to increase food production and promote agricultural education. We recommend the counties, as they develop their ordinances and rules for educational retreat permits, carefully scrutinize land uses and



activities proposed in this measure that are not specifically related to agricultural production and activities.

SUBJECT: House Bill No. 1919, HD1 Relating to Community-Based Educational Retreats

The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) **opposes** House Bill No. 1919, HD1, which would establish a new Chapter in the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) to address "kupuna educational retreats." The Bill also would create a new county permitting process for these retreats.

We are not opposed to the retreat concept. Our opposition is based primarily on the basis of county home rule. We are concerned that what amounts to a county zoning permit is being mandated by State law, and at the same time, sets aside compliance with county plans, zoning, and building regulations.

Our position is also based on the following:

- The Bill includes many details on application requirements, and enforcement avenues. This seems more akin to a request for proposals rather than an enabling State law.
- Notwithstanding the comment in Section 1 of the Bill regarding the special permit process, we believe the special permit is the well-established, flexible permit process that already is available for retreats. Accordingly, we agree with testimony submitted by the State Department of Agriculture on this Bill to the House Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection on January 30, 2014.

- The Bill is unclear in its relationship to Chapter 205, HRS, which is the State Land Use law. Is the intent that a retreat permit application must be made by someone who has already been given a special use permit? Is reference to a "rural area" related to the State Rural District or could the proposed site be in the State Agricultural District? How will important State goals, such as the protection of important agricultural lands and coastal zone management, be considered in the evaluation of a permit application?
- We are perplexed by the level of detail about densities, and the allowable size of projects. In other contexts, this level of development would be described as "sprawl." At maximum levels, a retreat could involve 4,000 persons, which would likely change the overall demand for public services, including county and State roads, sewers, schools, and police and fire protection, especially if tourists, students and local residents would be encouraged to visit. Using the State Department of Education's school impact fee analysis, a community of 4,000 could reflect about 1,000 schoolage children.
- It is not clear whether the proposed permit would be available on Conservation District lands.
- The DPP does not have the resources to implement, monitor, and enforce a program for the proposed educational retreat permit.
- Honoring our kupuna and teaching ecology to expand awareness and appreciation
 of the heritage and environment of Hawaii does not require a new State law, or
 educational retreats. Moreover, while these retreats may be sustainable from an
 isolationist perspective, they could impose more demands on public services and
 facilities, and therefore, not be sustainable from a regional or county perspective.
 We do not see how these retreats strongly tie Hawaii to a globally competitive
 economy, as cited in Section 1 of the Bill.

For these reasons, please hold House Bill No. 1919, HD1, in Committee. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.
