# HOUSE BILL NO. 1990 RELATING TO HAWAII GOOD AGRICULTURAL PRACTICES

Chairperson Luke and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on HB 1990 relating to Hawaii Good Agricultural Practices. This bill establishes a Hawaii good agricultural practices program to develop science and risk-based good agricultural practices that reasonably reduce the potential for on-farm food-borne illness; educate and train Hawaii farmers on good agricultural practices, and develop a consumer information program for home practices on treatment and handling of fresh and processed agricultural food products. The Hawaii Department of Agriculture supports the intent of this bill but would suggest waiting for the recommendations from the good agricultural practices task force.

Act 106, SLH 2013 created a good agricultural practices task force to identify and develop good agricultural practices and preventative measure guidelines in the food supply system to improve the overall safety of locally grown food. The task force is will identify and develop good agricultural guidelines for agricultural producers and provide a report of its recommendations to the legislature.

My name is Kyle Datta and I am general partner of the Ulupono Initiative, a Honolulu-based impact investment firm, which is working to improve the quality of life for Hawai'i residents by investing in projects that create more locally grown food, increase renewable energy and reduce/recycle waste. We are representing on behalf of the Local Food Coalition, which is an organization comprising of farmers, ranchers, livestock producers, investors and other organizations working to provide Hawai'i's food supply.

**The Local Food Coalition <u>supports</u> HB 1990**, which establishes the Hawai'i good agricultural practices program. As the number of small farms in Hawai'i has grown in importance during the last ten years, this trend is necessitating the development of a Hawai'i good agricultural practices program. The program's intent is to reduce the potential for contamination of food products on farms via science-based guidelines that support safe farming practices, including considerations for various farm sizes, techniques, and crops. Currently, food safety certification audits are costly for many Hawai'i farmers and preventing more local food from entering the marketplace.

There is a lot of uncertainty around food safety issues. Therefore, we are hopeful that this bill can develop programs to educate and train local farmers in best practices to meet food safety requirements. Furthermore, we are supportive of a consumer information program to teach the public about safe handling of agricultural products.

As part of the Local Food Coalition, Ulupono is very pleased to support proposals designed to help grow more local food. Our group's members came together last year with one common goal: to promote the local production of food in a sustainable and economically sound manner to benefit Hawai'i's people through the revitalization and expansion of our state's agricultural sector. Dear Chair Luke, Vice Chairs Nishimoto and Johanson, and Members of the Committee:

I am sending this testimony to express my **support for HB 1990**, "Relating to Hawaii Good Agricultural Practices." In recent years, more and more buyers of agricultural produce have insisted that their local suppliers be food safety certified. Under the Food Safety Modernization Act, the Food and Drug Administration will soon establish nationwide criteria to prevent bacterial contamination of produce. Thus, local farmers will be under increasing pressure to become food safety certified.

As HB 1990 notes, the current practice of third-party food safety certification is impractical and expensive for many farmers in Hawaii, especially for the small farmers who make up the majority of Hawaii's agricultural producers. Hawaii needs a locally-based, practical food safety certification program that takes into account Hawaii's diversity of crops as well as Hawaii's unique climatic, social, and economic circumstances. I therefore support HB 1990, and encourage you to pass this important bill.

HFUU is **in Support of HB 1990**; a State standard for Good Agricultural Practices (GAPs), and the work involved legislatively and administratively that will get us there.

As more small farms sprout up across the state, we the Hawaii Farmers Union United are concerned about the over-regulation of the farmer by food purveyors distributors as well as government. Therefore, we ask that one set of standards (As determined by the Gaps Task force) be created for all food grown in Hawaii. We ask that consideration be taken so that Hawaii GAPs certified crops and other products are exportable to national and international markets. Furthermore, we ask that the State of Hawaii Department of Agriculture (HDOA) as well as the University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) work together to make a cohesive inspection regime (HDOA) and farmer GAPs compliance training (CTAHR).

We are grateful for the legislatively mandated GAPs Task Force currently working to solve this lack of food safety certification, and urge the legislature to work with them to fine-tune this bill over the course of the session, but in no way hinder it's passage. This question of food safety and associated cost to the small producer is critical, and we must move forward with a State of Hawaii food safety regime that works and is affordable for farmers.
