I am Christopher Manfredi, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,832 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

HFB provides the following comments and suggestions on HB 1991, HD1 which seeks to amend the Hawaii Procurement Code relative to agricultural products.

This measure will bring the Procurement Code back to where it was before HFB's requests to the Legislature modified the language, resulting in the current code. The changes were suggested because our farmers and ranchers were having a difficult time entering into state supply contracts. During our involvement with this process, it became clear that education at all levels, not just within our group of farmers and ranchers, but even within the procurement offices, was needed. Although HFB attempted to move everyone in this direction, the training was never accomplished.

Something needs to be done. We respectfully request that the proposed measure be amended to include clear metrics that can determine the success of the procurement code with the exemption.

HFB respectfully requests your support with the suggested amendment so we can fulfill the State's vision for increased self sufficiency and sustainability by supporting local businesses.

Hawai'i Appleseed Center for Law and Economic Justice is a nonprofit, 501(c)(3) law firm created to advocate on behalf of low-income individuals and families in Hawai'i on civil legal issues of statewide importance. Our core mission is to help our clients gain access to the resources, services, and fair treatment that they need to realize their opportunities for self-achievement and economic security.

Thank you for an opportunity to testify in **support** of House Bill 1991, which would exempt fresh meats and produce from the state procurement code.

Increasing access to healthy foods is paramount to addressing food insecurity and hunger as well as obesity. State food procurement laws impact government workers, the general public, and populations for whom access to healthy foods is particularly important: students, hospital patients, and those living in institutions. Flexibility with food procurement policies will enable the state government to craft policies that will maximize the amount of fresh produce and meat served in its facilities.

Greater leeway in food procurement can also be used to support local farmers. Agencies can develop sound procurement policies that will promote the purchase of locally-grown produce and meat. We are particularly hopeful that the flexibility granted by this exemption will facilitate farm to school programs and increased purchasing of fresh produce to be served in public schools.

House Bill 1991 creates a more sensible procurement code that exempts fresh produce and meat, enabling the state to pursue a food policy that can improve our local economy, increase food self-sufficiency, and promote public health.

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) **supports** HB 1991, HD 1 to exempt the purchase of fresh meat and produce, animals, and plants, for use by a government body. This bill will allow government agencies to pursue more options for competitive pricing and provide agencies with opportunities to support the local economy, through the acquisition of highly perishable items from local business.
