HB 2053, RELATING TO AGING

Testimony of Gary L. Gill Acting Director of Health

Friday, January 24, 2014, 9:00am

1 Department's Position: The Department of Health supports HB2053, provided that its passage does

2 not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in our Executive Budget, and offers comments.

3 Fiscal Implications: Appropriates \$78,555 for use by DOH.

4 **Purpose and Justification:** This measure is signicant as falls and fall related injuries among older adults impose an enormous burden on individuals, society, and Hawaii's health care system. Among 5 adults 65 years of age and older, falls are by far the leading cause of injury-related deaths (45% of the 6 7 total), hospitalizations (83%), and EMS attended injuries among older adults (82%). Direct medical charges for fall and fall-related injuries among older adults amount to nearly \$95 million annually, an 8 amount that could be doubled if you were to include the costs of rehabilitation and long term care. Falls 9 10 impact the quality of life and independence of older adults. Over half of those hospitalized from a fall 11 are discharged to a nursing facility or rehabilitation center and many never regain full independence. However, falls are not an inevitable part of aging and can be prevented. The Department is 12 13 committed to addressing this critical public health issue and has already taken some steps to address fall 14 injuries among older adults in Hawaii. These efforts include coordinating the implementation and

1	evaluation of the "Hawai'i Falls Prevention State Plan, 2013-2018" to prevent falls and reduce the
2	severity of fall-related injuries in collaboration with the Hawai'i Fall Prevention Consortium.
3	Considering the magnitude of falls among older adults and the anticipated increase in this age
4	group in the next 20 years to over 18% of Hawaii's population, the current level of dedicated resources
5	for fall prevention are insufficient. The fall prevention and early detection position proposed in this bill
6	will enable the Department of Health to support a coordinated state-wide approach that is needed to
7	prevent and reduce the impact of falls among older adults. The Department requests that the \$78,555 in
8	funding allocated for the position be increased to \$81,985 to include the recently adjusted salary rate for
9	state employees. The Department is prepared to carry out the duties as described in the bill in
10	collaboration with community partners.

EOA's Position: The Executive Office on Aging (EOA) supports this measure, provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities within the Administration's supplemental budget request.

Purpose and Justification: This measure appropriates \$78,555 to the Department of Health's (DOH) Emergency Medical Services and Injury Prevention System Branch to establish and fill a Fall Prevention and Early Detection Coordinator position. The source of funding for this position is the Trauma System Special Fund.

The position will work closely with EOA, the Falls Prevention Consortium, and other key stakeholders to implement a comprehensive statewide program to reduce falls and their consequences. While the DOH has recognized the seriousness of the problem of falls in older adults for some time, and has implemented strategies to date, much more needs to be done. Establishing this position will assure a continued focus on prevention of falls in our community and ultimately result in longer, healthier lives for our aging population. STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON H.B. 2053 RELATING TO AGING

The ILWU Local 142 supports H.B. 2053, which establishes a fall prevention and early detection coordinator within the Department of Health's Emergency Medical Services and Injury Prevention System Branch and appropriates \$78,555 from the Trauma System Fund for FY 2014-15.

Falls among seniors is costly. When a senior falls, medical costs are much higher than when a younger person falls. Yet falls are often preventable with information about what causes falls and what behaviors to modify. Appropriation of less than \$80,000 from an existing fund for a fall prevention and early detection coordinator is a prudent and sound investment to potentially save hundreds of thousands of dollars in medical bills and untold physical suffering.
