Chair Takai, Vice Chair Ito, and Members of the House Committee on Veterans, Military, & International Affairs, & Culture and the Arts:

I am Maj Gen Darryll D. M. Wong, State Adjutant General and Director of State Civil Defense. I am testifying in **SUPPORT** of House Bill 2074.

This bill requests authorization to issue general obligation bonds to fund the State's share of the construction costs of a new long-term care facility. There will be no bond issue unless the federal government appropriates their share of the facility's construction costs.

After construction, there will be no operational costs to the State. Currently, the Yukio Okutsu State Veteran's home in Hilo is owned and licensed by the State and managed by a contract administered by the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation. The new facility will operate in the same manner.

This new facility will mirror the success of the Okutsu facility built in 2004. It will be a step toward reducing the significant shortage of long-term care beds and services available to qualified veterans.

Chair Takai, Vice Chair Ito and Committee members:

I'm Ron Han, Director of the State Office of Veterans Services (OVS). I appreciate this opportunity to provide testimony **in support** of the concepts in House Bill 2074, Relating to Veterans.

This measure authorizes the issuance of GO bonds for the construction of a long-term care facility for veterans contingent upon the receipt of federal funds. The offset is 35% state funding and 65% federal funding.

The State of Hawaii in partnership with the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has an opportunity to fix an ever increasing critical need in our community: long-term care resources and services for our veterans. With the success of the Yukio Okutsu State Veterans Home in Hilo, a second Veterans State Home is needed to fill the 173 bed shortfall (verified by VA based on our Veterans population State-wide) we are currently experiencing. OVS is expecting our State Veteran population to grow due to the drawdown of troops in Iraq, the forthcoming pullout from Afghanistan in 2014, and with defense budget cuts targeting existing end strength. More military members are attaining Veteran status. Additionally, there are growing numbers of aging Korean and Vietnam War veterans in need of health care that a skilled nursing facility would bring. This new State Veterans Home would also bring additional jobs and provide training synergy with our current and future health care professionals and providers stimulating our local economy.

The OVS supports the intent expressed in this measure as long as its implementation does not impact or replace the priorities set forth in the Executive Budget for Fiscal Year 2015.

My name is Charles Ota and I am the Vice President for Military Affairs at The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii (The Chamber). I am here to state The Chamber's *support* of House Bill No. 2074, Relating To Veterans.

The measure proposes to authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds for the construction of a one hundred seventy three bed veterans long term care facility, provided that no bond issuance shall be unless the federal government appropriates a percentage of funds needed to complete the facility.

We concur that the state will face a significant shortage of long term care facilities statewide to meet the demands of an ever-growing veteran's population. Across the nation, the Veterans Affairs office estimates that more than one million members of the armed forces will become veterans within the next five years. There are an estimated one hundred twenty thousand veterans in Hawaii, with forty four thousand over age sixty-five.

Hawaii's only veterans care facility, jointly funded by the federal and state governments, was completed in Hilo, HI in 2004 and has successfully operated at no operational or maintenance cost to the state.

In light of the above, we recommend approval.
