### In consideration of HOUSE BILL 2103 RELATING TO THE AHA MOKU ADVISORY COMMITTEE

House Bill 2103 proposes to 1) Permanently assign the Aha Moku Advisory Committee to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department), 2) Require that the Aha Moku Advisory Committee (AMAC) hire an executive director who shall be included in all matters pertaining to natural resources, 3) Require AMAC to submit a progress report to the Legislature 20 days after the close of each fiscal year (FY), and 4) Appropriate funds to AMAC for FY 2014-2015. While the Department understands the intent of this legislation, it believes it is unnecessary

AMAC was established by Act 288, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, to advise on issues related to land and natural resources management through the Aha Moku System and became operational the last week of June 2013 when the Executive Director was selected by AMAC as mandated by the Act. AMAC is comprised of eight Native Hawaiian resource practitioners, each of whom represents one of the eight main Hawaiian Islands within the Hawaiian archipelago. There are 43 distinct traditional moku (districts) within the islands - all of them are working on integrating traditional Hawaiian resource methodology into the fabric of state policy through the Department. To do this is challenging, yet productive because it will assist the State in its sustainability efforts for Hawaii's ecosystem.

Through the Aha Moku there is an opportunity for native Hawaiian resource practitioners who have generational knowledge of site-specific resource areas to share their knowledge and expertise with government. And, there is the additional opportunity for the different divisions of the Department to gain an accessible roadmap to native Hawaiian resource expertise that could be helpful in resource decisions. Except for the need to secure continued funding for operations, the Department is pleased with the role that AMAC and its Executive Director have played

within the Department. The provisions under House Bill 2103 raise concerns and puts unnecessary requirements on the Department and AMAC that it cannot support.

The Department asks that the measure not move forward.
