HB 2443 HD1 - RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO

Chair Luke, Vice Chairs Nishimoto and Johanson, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Donald Straney, Chancellor of the University of Hawai'i at Hilo (UH Hilo). We support HB 2443 HD1 that appropriates funds to UH Hilo to support its memorandum of agreement with RISE 21st Century After School Program and the implementation of the agreement by the 'Imiloa Astronomy Center of Hawai'i, a unit of UH Hilo.

The 'Imiloa Astronomy Center of Hawai'i has been cultivating community partnerships that targets greater engagement by Hawai'i Island youth with the resources of UH Hilo. A positive partnership has been established with the RISE 21st Century After School Program that serves as a community and cultural resource for disadvantaged Native Hawaiian youth in Keaukaha. The proposal will help to expand collaborative opportunities supported by staffing and curriculum resources to establish mentorships, initiate project-based learning activities, and offer academic and career planning. In addition, I am the sole fiscal and administrative support for the R.I.S.E program and was instrumental in its initial creation.

I have worked alongside R.I.S.E. Executive Director, Shadd Keahi Warfield on various community projects and programs involving youth in our community (specifically the Keaukaha and Panaewa Hawaiian Homestead areas) for the past 10 years. Through such experiences, I have recognized the challenges our local youth face such as exposure to drugs, alcohol, abuse, poverty, suicide, domestic violence, and more.

It is extremely important for these youth to have exposure to opportunities to offset such behaviors and/or circumstances and to help them recognize their true potential in becoming valuable contributors to the sustainability of our community and future generations. I have extreme confidence that the R.I.S.E. program will contribute greatly to this need, being that it is one of the only programs of its kind in the Hilo district.

Our established relationship and memorandum of agreement with the University of Hawaii at Hilo and the Imiloa Astronomy Center helps to increase the higher education and career opportunities for R.I.S.E. youth participants and the larger community; one of the main objectives R.I.S.E. is striving to achieve. Dear Chair Luke, Vice Chair Johanson, Vice Chair Nishimoto, and Members of the House Finance Committee:

My name is Stanley H Roehrig. I am a local boy lawyer living in Hilo. I was raised in Manoa and moved with my young wife to Hilo in 1966 to practice law. Most of our 48 years in Hilo have been in Keaukaha.

My wife and I have been involved with Keahi Warfield, Ka'iu Kimura, and many others in the development of the after school program for disadvantaged Hawaiian children in the Hilo area, called the RISE After School Program.

In the last session of this legislature, the legislature adopted both SCR132 and SR94, requesting the University of Hawaii at Hilo to implement the RISE Program. University of Hawaii at Hilo Chancellor Straney signed a Memorandum of Understanding implementing the program. See Exhibit "A" attached. The program is being administered as an outreach program of UH Hilo 'Imiloa Astronomy Center and the Division of Academic Affairs.

Through the vehicle of HB2443, the University of Hawaii at Hilo and the RISE 21st Century After School Program seek funding from the legislature for fiscal year 2014.

We believe that this program, initially based in Hilo, will be a prototype for an important statewide after school program in all areas of the state where the Hawaiian communities and their families are at risk.

Please help us with this measure.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAI'I AT HILO AND RISE 21st Century After School Program

The University of Hawai'i at Hilo and RISE 21st Century After School Program agree to cooperate via this memorandum of understanding to provide a bridge between the University of Hawaii at Hilo campus and the communities of Keaukaha and Pana'ewa for the purpose of creating mentorship opportunities, project based learning activities, and also peer mentoring opportunities for the youth of the RISE program.

This agreement provides for a collaborative partnership in the belief that the agreement will increase mutual interest in higher education promotion and workforce development for healthy communities.

- 1. UH Hilo ('Imiloa Astronomy Center and the division of Academic Affairs) and RISE agree to the following activities based on their respective missions and educational needs and objectives:
 - UHH will provide mentoring for encouragement, motivation, and self esteem and to increase knowledge of future career and academic paths;
 - b. UHH and RISE shall collaborate on funding initiatives to support collaborative goals and objectives;
 - c. UHH and RISE will collaboratively develop and offer project based activities that foster and encourage peer mentoring while addressing relevant community initiatives.
- The implementation of this agreement shall be separately negotiated and determined by both 'Imiloa and RISE. Efforts shall be made by both sides to find financial sources for carrying out the objectives listed above.
- 3: This agreement is in force for two (2) years and is subject to revision or modification by mutual agreement. It is also understood that either party may terminate the agreement at any time.
- 4. This agreement is effective when the representatives of both parties have affixed their signatures and seal to the agreement.

I am writing this letter in support of HB 2443 and the relationship between the RISE After School Program and the 'Imiloa Astronomy Center.

Since opening in 2006, the 'Imiloa Astronomy Center of Hawai'i – University of Hawai'i at Hilo - has emerged as a major new cultural institution serving the Island of Hawai'i and the world beyond. 'Imiloa is a popular success, serving over 100,000 visitors each year, as well as a major education asset for the Island.

'Imiloa's mission is to honor Maunakea by sharing the culture and science of the mountain to inspire generations.

We eventually would like to be able to grow this program to expand throughout the island, and potentially the state.
