1 **Department's Position:** The Department of Health supports this measure as it will serve to ensure that

2 dentists practicing in our State, at a minimum, are appropriately educated and trained to safely and

3 effectively administer general anesthesia and sedation to patients.

4 Fiscal Implications: None

5 **Purpose and Justification:**

Pain and behavioral management of patients through the administration of local anesthesia, sedation and 6 7 general anesthesia is an integral part of treating patients that have inherent risks that varies greatly from 8 individual to individual. This measure shall ensure there are clear guidelines established and issued by the State Dental Board for compliance by dentists that prescribe or administer general anesthesia or 9 10 sedation. These guidelines will assist dentists in the delivery of safe and effective anesthesia and 11 sedation. The Department recommends that the guidelines are based upon the American Dental Association's 12 guidelines for the use of sedation and general anesthesia by dentists, and the American Academy of 13

14 Pediatric Dentists guidelines for monitoring and management of pediatric patients during and after

15 sedation for diagnostic and therapeutic procedures. Approval of this measure will help ensure dentists

TESTIMONY ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2459, RELATING TO DENTISTRY.

TO THE HONORABLE DELLA AU BELATTI, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is Mark Chun, D.M.D., Dental member of the Board of Dental Examiners ("Board"). The Board appreciates the opportunity to testify and offer comments on House Bill No. 2459, Relating to Dentistry.

The purpose of House Bill No. 2459 is to require any dentist who prescribes or administers general anesthesia, intravenous-conscious sedation, or conscious sedation in providing dental services to obtain a written authorization issued by the Board. The bill also requires site certification for locations where specified anesthesia is prescribed or administered.

The Board supports the intent of the bill but believes its new administrative rules and other statutory requirements address the provisions in this bill. First of all, dentists who prescribe controlled substances are required to register with the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency and The Office of Narcotics Enforcement of The State Department of Public Safety. Therefore, it would not be necessary to include prescribing sedation by requiring written authorization from the Board. Second, the Board has enacted new provisions in its administrative rules requiring written authorization from the Board if a Testimony on House Bill No. 2458 Friday, January 31, 2014 Page 2

dentist will be administering moderate sedation, intravenous-conscious sedation, deep anesthesia and general anesthesia. The new administrative rules specify that administration of nitrous oxide or a single oral sedative medication administered in an appropriate dose to reduce anxiety would not require a written authorization, as the Board believes the education and training received in an ADA accredited dental school would be appropriate training. In addition, the new administrative rules have provisions for facilities and staff requirements that would need to comply with the current ADA guidelines for the Use of Sedation and General Anesthesia by Dentists and the current American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery Office Anesthesia Evaluation Manual.

Therefore, the Board believes that its new administrative rules and other statutory requirements address the provisions in House Bill No. 2459.

The HDA believes that in light of the new rules adopted by the Board of Dental Examiners that in part covered the issues relating to sedation and anesthesia which bill attempts to address, the need for this legislation is rendered moot and redundant under the current circumstances.

As reported in the media within the last few days, Governor Neal Abercrombie approved the new dental practice rules two weeks ago, which became effective this past Monday, January 27, 2014. The Board of Dental Examiners worked on an extensive overhaul of the dental practice rules for the last several years and these rules included amendments which this bill seeks to address.

Comments: Representatives, Mahalo for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of HB 2459 with recommendation for an AMENDMENT. When a healthcare provider is focusing on a procedure, their attention should be 100% on the accurate completion of the procedure. In hospitals, clinics, and ambulatory centers were moderate sedation procedures are completed, strict regulations are enforced to ensure the safety and monitoring of the patient which includes another person skilled in assessment of patient status and identification of life threatening events. As a Nurse and Nurse Practitioner with over 30 years of experience, I recognize the critical need for another skilled professional in the room when a patient undergoes moderate sedation procedures. Regrettably, in the dentist office setting, such requirements are not present. While there are Dental Assistants and possibly Dental Hygienists, their training does not include patient assessment and certification in moderate sedation procedures. In reviewing the websites for Hawai'i based training for dental assistants and hygienists, there is no mention of any type of training for moderate sedation, only a requirement for CPR certification. The University of Hawai'i School of Dental Hygiene website lists one course (http://www.nursing.hawaii.edu/curriculum-in-dental-hygiene.html), titled Pain Control and Local Anesthesia in Dentistry. It does not address moderate sedation. The Hawai'i School of Dental Arts (http://www.hawaiischooldentalarts.com/index.html) requires only CPR training and does not address moderate sedation training. It also notes dental assistants may be employed with only "onthe-job" training. Dental assistants who wish to attain national certification must attend training, but the person standing next to the dentist in scrub s may have little to no training. I urge the Committee to consider an amendment to this bill to require another person (dentist or NURSE) to be present when patients undergo moderate sedation procedures in the dental setting. The purpose of the second person is to monitor the patient's status to ensure a safe experience. NURSES are skilled in patient assessment, identification of life threatening events, and can execute actions to ensure patient safety. I applaud the Legislature for taking this action to re quire certification of dental offices where moderate sedation procedures are conducted, but I also urge you to require the same safety measures for administration of moderate sedation procedures as is required for medical practices. I appreciate the opportunity to submit testimony on this important measure.

Testimony in support of HB 2456

Testimony in opposition to HB 2457; HB 2458; HB 2459; and HB 2460

Representative Della Au Bellati, Chair; Representative Dee Morikawa Vice-Chair; honored members of the House Committee on Health,

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on these issues affecting the dental health of the people of Hawai'i . I'm a general dentist with 30 years of practice in the State of Hawai'i and as a previous officer of the Hawai'i Dental Association, I've provided testimony on a variety of issues.

I support HB 2456 which requires an introductory dental examination prior to entry in a primary or secondary school in Hawai'i. The keiki of Hawai'i would be well served by placement in a "Dental Home" setting. As a longtime dentist I can recall the State DOH Certificate of Dental Health that we used to hand out on completion of treatment.

I oppose HB 2457 which requires the DOH to enter into agreements to administer sealants to high school students. There are protocols in place where such programs can be administered on an ad hoc or proscribed basis. Since the Dental Department of the DOH has only recently been reestablished, it would be prudent to see what priorities and program implementation will be forthcoming before proceeding on any mandated path.

I oppose HB 2458 which would change the membership and structure of the Hawai'i Board of Dental Examiners. Governor Abercrombie has only recently signed the revised Rules for the Practice of Dentistry in Hawai'i. This comes only after an 8 year comprehensive review and revision by this Dental Board. Change of the makeup of the Board would unduly compromise the ability of the Board to carry out its duties.

I oppose HB 2459 which requires a dentist to obtain written permission from the Board of Dental Examiners in prescribing or administering general anesthesia or conscious/ unconscious sedation. While well intentioned, there have been recent changes to the Hawai'i Dental Rules which essentially obviates this measure. I earnestly hope that we give these Rules changes a chance.

I oppose HB 2460 which would set up a secondary licensing structure for Dental Specialists. There have been a number of times in recent years where the integrity of dental licensure in Hawai'i has been challenged. This measure could have the unintended consequence of having differing means and standards of licensure between categories of dentists. That being said, I would be amenable to recognition of Board Certified Specialties as recognized by the ADA. This approach is also congruent with the advertising strictures in the Hawai'i Revised Statutes regarding dental advertising. This, however, should be addressed separately.

Again, mahalo for this opportunity to submit testimony on these measures.
