My name is Marvan Wakabayashi and I live in Pacific Palisades. I am in support of House Bill (H.B.) No. 2521. I understand that Representative Gregg Takayama introduced this bill to address the invasive albezia tree. I am glad that this is being brought up since I believe my family and property are being affected by an albezia tree growing in the mini mall property adjacent to my house that overhangs into our property. The large trunk and branches creates some of these property and life threatening concerns: 1. Potential toppling of trunk and branches poses a danger to my family, grandkids and house 2. It threatens the safety of children from Palisades Elementary that use the area as a "short cut" as well as the mini mall building 3. The roots may have caused maintenance problems to the city sewer line 4. The large roots are damaging the concrete lined drainage swale 4. Leaves have clogged my gutter which require that I pay for the cleaning. The recent rain storms and exceptional high winds has increased our concerns Branches from the tree are always falling in my yard and I am worried about the safety of my children and grandchildren and my house. If they pose any kind of threat, the tree should be removed.

In February 2013 I sent a similar e-mail to Senator Clarence Nishihara pointing out the potential threat to my family and property.

One final note, I noticed a grove of albezia trees at Palisades Elementary School/Park were cut down. I think this was done by the people in charge at the State or City who are concerned for the safety of the children and park users.

I am a home owner with a hazardous albizia tree hovering over my home that grew another 10 feet this year. This albizia tree is located in the owner's hillside property and also affects other homes. For years, the home owners have been unsuccessful to persuade the owner to trim the branches and tree. My family are afraid that one day a 15+ mile winds/rainstorm will cause huge branches or even the tree to fall and destroying my home. Current worldwide weather environmental changes, i.e., East Coast freezing conditions, vanishing shorelines, volcanic eruptions, are signs State Government should take as a warning by implementing revisions to its contingency emergency disasters plans.

I contacted Steve Seigler of the State Civil Defense, Department of Defense, about my concerns. He inspected the tree, claimed it hazardous, and said nothing could be done. The law states that it is the owner's reponsibility. The Department of Defense has no funds available and would need the Governor's approval to declare it as 'emergency' to enter the property.

Representative Aquino and Committee Members, I urge you to appropriate funds to this Bill and to amend HRS 128-10.3, Civil Defense Powers; Mitigation of Hazardous Situations.

Testimony in support of H.B. 2521 – Relating to Hazards to Property:

As the State Civil Defense (SCD) employee tasked with responding to citizen requests for assistance under HRS 128-10.3 (commonly referred to as Act 76), I am in favor of this funding bill. Since HRS 128-10.3 was enacted in 2009, State Civil Defense has received 199 requests for assistance related to potentially hazardous trees. Of those 199 cases, 138 have been resolved. The remaining 61 are being followed up on; however, a number of those will not be resolved because the tree owner refuses to respond in any way to the concern. When the tree owner refuses to respond, SCD follows-up on the situation, but due to lack of funding cannot take action to determine if a tree hazard to public health and safety does in fact exist or mitigate that hazard if found. To date, a number of cases that fall in this category have resulted in the trees of concern eventually failing and causing severe damage to electrical infrastructure and the property/lives of the citizen who had originally asked for state assistance.
