The regulation of large scale dog breeders has been exhaustively analyzed as

part of a sunrise analysis conducted by the Legislative Auditor, Report No. 11-02,

Sunrise Analysis: Regulation of Large-Scale Dog Breeders and Facilities. See,

http://files.hawaii.gov/auditor/Reports/2011/11-02.pdf. In the report, the Auditor

found that the proponents of the bill failed to demonstrate a need for regulation as

defined by the sunrise law, and concluded on page 25:

We found little more than anecdotal evidence for the need to protect the public's health, safety, and welfare from abusive activities of large-scale dog breeders. Consequently, our analysis shows that S.B. No. 1522, S.D.2, H.D.1, does not meet the criteria for regulation of these breeders through the State's professional and vocational regulatory agency. We also found that the primary goal of the bill is to protect dogs rather than the public, and that DCCA is ill-equipped to administer regulation of animal breeders. In addition, financing is an unresolved issue due to the lack of information on the scale and extent of dog breeding in Hawaii...

The Department concurs with the conclusions of the Legislative Auditor that

regulation in this area, to the extent regulation may be necessary, should not be

placed with the Department.

On behalf of our members and supporters in Hawaii, we thank the Committee for considering this important, basic measure to protect both dogs and consumers. Our organization has been involved in efforts in more than 20 states that have passed laws in the past 4 years to prevent the cruel treatment and exploitation of dogs, where sadly, profit is all too often put above welfare.

Animal Welfare Concerns: Dogs at puppy mills, also known as large scale commercial breeding operations, typically receive little to no medical care, often live in squalid conditions with no exercise, socialization or human interaction and are confined inside cramped wire cages for life. Breeding dogs must endure constant breeding cycles and are typically confined for years on end, without ever becoming part of a family. The breeding "stock" live their entire lives confined to small cages, devoid of human companionship. They are often victims of filth, inadequate shelter, overcrowding, and insufficient food and water. They are bred repeatedly and often receive little or no veterinary care.

Furthermore, many of these large-scale dog breeding operations continue to produce litter after litter of puppies, exacerbating the pet overpopulation crisis; contributing to increased euthanasia rates at local animal shelters and increasing animal care and control costs to taxpayers.

Consumer Protection Concerns: Dogs from these large-scale breeders are often sold in pet stores, online, via newspaper ads and in some cases directly to consumers with little or no regard for the dog's health, genetic history or future welfare. Puppies are often taken from their mothers for sale to pet stores at approximately 8 weeks of age, when they are highly susceptible to contagious diseases such as parvovirus and are very sensitive to behavioral stress. Poor breeding practices can also lead to serious genetic problems such as hip dysplasia—an often painful and crippling disorder.

In addition, many unknowing consumers also purchase dogs with "Registry Papers" thinking that this ensures the health or temperament of the dog they are purchasing. However, the American Kennel Club (AKC), by its own admission, has stated that AKC papers, "in no way indicate the quality or state of health of the dog." No one should believe a dog is well-socialized, genetically sound, or healthy simply because he or she comes with registry papers. In several states, laws even mandate that consumers must be told that these registry papers do not guarantee health or even lineage. Unfortunately, consumers mistakenly believe that a high price for a dog means that the dog is healthy and well-socialized. Since the AKC has no enforcement authority it is necessary that the state act to protect these dogs by ensuring that basic welfare and standards of care are met.

We look forward to further discussions with DCCA as to how we may support them as the bill progresses. Again, we urge your support of HB 2534 and this most basic registration requirement to better protect dogs and consumers alike.

Testimony in Strong Support of House Bill 2534 Relating to Dogs

I am Mary Steiner the Policy Advocate for the Hawaiian Humane Society here to speak in strong support of House Bill 2534.

House Bill 2534 is a very simple business registration bill and designates that owners of 10 or more intact dogs over the age of one year register as a business with DCCA. This is voluntary and there is no penalty attached for not doing so.

We believe this is important for the following reasons:

- The Sunrise Analysis on Regulation of Large-Scale Dog Breeders and Facilities prepared by the State Auditor in October 2011 at the request of the legislature states, "There is no reliable information on the magnitude of the problem of unscrupulous breeders in Hawaii." Further, the report states, "without reliable data on the numbers and size of large-scale dog breeders the cost of enforcement is unknown." HB 2534 attempts to gather this information.
- Over the years, legislators have introduced many bills to establish minimum standards of care for commercial dog breeders that included licensing requirements, inspections, enforcement and penalties. These bills have all failed. HB 2534 is an attempt to collect information on the commercial dog breeding in Hawaii.
- Data regarding the numbers of breeders in the state is anecdotal. The legislature needs accurate information in order to pass legislation. Because breeders are selling dogs via the Internet, at puppy swap meets, and through newspaper advertisements, it is hard to determine accurate estimates. Yesterday, on Craigslist alone, 87 dogs were offered for sale.
- One of the commercial dog breeding facilities shut down by the Hawaiian Humane Society resulted in 153 dogs entering our shelter. Within two months, 79 puppies were born. We estimated that the income from an operation that size could be between \$40,000 and \$50,000 a month. This is a business and not a hobby. HB 2534 protects consumers and dogs.

On behalf of the Hawaiian Humane Society, I would like to thank you for your consideration. I hope you will pass HB 2534.

Rep. Woolsey and Members of the House Agriculture Committee:

The Pacific Pet Alliance is a Hawai'i non-profit organization that promotes responsible pet ownership through education and advocacy. We respectfully ask this Honorable Committee to **oppose HB 2534**, as this bill serves no reasonable purpose. Please consider the following facts:

- Every county in our state requires that all dogs be registered annually, regardless of the number of dogs a person owns. The registration information calls for identification of each dog's owner, the dog's age and sex, and whether the dog has been spayed or neutered. This information is already available to local animal control agencies.
- On Friday February 1, 2013, Celia Suzuki, the licensing administrator for the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA), provided testimony that the DCCA concluded that it was <u>not</u> the appropriate regulatory agency for large-scale dog breeders. <u>http://www.capitol.hawaii.gov/Session2013/Testimony/HB233_TESTIMON</u> <u>Y_EDB_02-01-13_.PDF</u>
- In a 2011 report, our highly-respected State Auditor, Marion Higa, concluded that regulation of large-scale breeders and facilities was not warranted. <u>http://files.hawaii.gov/auditor/Reports/2011/11-02.pdf</u>

The Pacific Pet Alliance encourages responsible dog ownership, and encourages all dog owners to comply with their local counties' ordinances regarding registering and licensing their dogs. We respectfully ask this Honorable Committee to **oppose HB 2534**.

Dear Chair Wooley, Vice-Chair Onishi, and members of the committee: On behalf of the Shetland Sheepdog Club of Hawaii and the Hawaii Companion Animal Coalition, I wish to express opposition to HB2534.

HB2534 is a pointless effort:

- Existing law already requires all dog owners regardless of the number of dogs they own to obtain dog licenses from county authorities.
- The Legislative Auditor in 2011 noted that abusive large scale breeders did not pose a significant problem in Hawaii, as distinguished from areas on the mainland. Moreover, state-wide regulation would be unduly expensive and unjustified. *See* Sunrise Analysis: Regulation of Large-Scale Dog Breeders and Facilities, Report No. 11-0 (October 2011), http://files.hawaii.gov/auditor/Reports/2011/11-02.pdf.
- We already have significant statutory limitations on animal cruelty, e.g., H.R.S. §§ 711-1108.5 & 1109.
- In response to proposed legislation in past years, the DCCA has noted its lack of interest in entering the field of dog breeder legislation.

Please vote against passing HB2534 out of committee.

Comments: Hawaii Companion Animal Coalition (HCAC) We are opposed to HB2534 All individual dogs are already required to be licensed by the Counties. This information can easily be used to determine who owns 10 or more dogs. The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) has already voiced their disapproval of any involvement by that department in the registration or inspection of dog owners. The purpose of this registration is not stated. Would they then be subject to inspection? If so, by whom? The DCCA has no ability or knowledge to inspect. Will this list of registrants be available to the general public? No sanctions are mentioned for failing to register with the DCCA. How then will the DCCA (or anyone else) ensure compliance? Anyone currently illegally owning and breeding more than 10 dogs (in a residential area in Oahu County) will simply continue to flout the law. Only legitimate individuals and organizations would register. I assume that as written this Legislation would require registration by organizations like The Hawaiian Humane Society, ASPCA (and other animal rescue and shelter organizations), Hawaii Animal Quarantine, Police Dogs, Grooming and Boarding establishments and the like. All of these organizations at times have control or custody of more than 10 unneutered dogs over one year of age. Clearly, as proposed, this bill has no purpose. The undisclosed sponsor of this legislation on behalf of whom the Representative introduced it clearly has ulterior motives that are explicitly not stated. Presu mably, if the bill advances, it's advocates will propose amendments that expose their real motives. Please do not support such deceptive legislation. This type of bill merely reinforces the public's low opinion of guestionable legislative tactics. - (1) Are over the age of one year; and
- (2) Have intact sexual organs

shall register with the department of commerce and consumer affairs."

Does this mean that anyone who is in <u>possession</u> of ten or more dogs at any one time must register with DCCA, again?

I am fully for any bill that is against animal cruelty. I believe in humane treatment of all animals.

I feel this bill is vague and poorly written and it does not properly address humane treatment of dogs, in this case, and is a waste of taxpayers money.

Please note that testimony submitted less than 24 hours prior to the hearing, improperly identified, or directed to the incorrect office, may not be posted online or distributed to the committee prior to the convening of the public hearing.

Without any stated purpose or demonstrated need, this bill would require anyone owning 10 or more intact dogs over the age of one year to register with the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. Such registration is essentially duplicative of ordinances in the various counties which require the registration of dogs, thereby placing an additional burden on dog owners, not to mention an administrative burden on DCCA.

A similar proposal for DCCA to register and regulate dog breeders was introduced in 2011, which resulted in a legislative audit by the State Auditor, Marion Higa. See, Report No. 11-02, of October 2011. In a thorough 28 page analysis and report, the office of the auditor concluded that there was little more than anecdotal evidence to support a need for such regulation and that the State's professional and vocational regulatory agency was functionally and philosophically inappropriate to the task. Moreover, the costs of implementation might exceed the possible benefits. As this study was quite recent, it is fully expected that a new study would produce the same results.

Experience has shown that existing laws are more than adequate to protect dogs from even large-scale ownership and abuses have been stopped and, where appropriate, successfully prosecuted.

Please support these bills. I know first hand that people on Oahu on raising dogs in large scale breeding operations and many of these dogs are slaughtered for human consumption. During the past six months, I have been on a quest for a new puppy and have been searching advertisements in the Star-Bulletin, Craigslist, and Ebay for puppies for sale. I have responded to some of these ads. There was one person selling papillon-pomeranian puppies in Kalihi. I went to the woman's home and saw 15 dogs and puppies living in squalid conditions with the heavy stench of urine and feces all around. Many of the dogs she had needed medical care and attention. She told me that she never took her dogs or puppies to the vet for annual check-ups. I would never have bought a puppy from this woman because I was afraid the dogs had a disease or parvo infection since the living conditions were unclean. Also, the dogs were not mentally stable. I reported this woman to the Hawaiian Humane Society and they went to investigate, but they said there was nothing they could do because the law allows people to own 15 dogs and keep them at their residence. This woman also told me that her next door neighbors who are Filipino breed many dogs so they can slaughter them for eating. She even went so far as to describe to me how they kill the dogs and cook them. You must pass these bills. If you don't, you are blind to what is really going on here in Hawaii. Comments: I would like to take this opportunity to respond to HB2534, a measure entitled "Registration of Large Scale Dog Ownership". Once again, as the legislative session moves into full swing, we begin to see bills aimed at controlling dog ownership in the hopes that this will somehow put an end to animal cruelty. While I myself cannot ascertain what the purpose of this measure will ultimately be, I again feel the need to point out that there is no correlation between the number of animals a person owns and animal cruelty. This measure also seems redundant, as Hawaii already requires all dog owners to license their dogs, regardless of whether they have 1 or 50. Tasking the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to also become involved in this licensing requirement is a waste of taxpayer's money. I would think it an easy matter to identify, through records that already exists, who owns 10 or more dogs. As for the matter of 10 dogs being defined as "large scale", I think there are many that would argue this numbe r. I believe that Hawaii must quantify, more accurately, who a large scale dog owner is, or more to the point of what this bill is driving at, what constitutes a large scale breeder. I ask you to please oppose this measure, and work towards measures that will more adequately address animal cruelty, rather than burdensome licensing and regulation. To close, I point out a sunrise audit was conducted in October 2011 (Report 11-02), to study the very idea that HB2534 proposes; excerpts from the Auditor's report are listed below: "Our analysis of Senate Bill No. 1522, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 1 is not a typical sunrise review because the main purpose of the bill is to ensure that dogs are treated humanely, rather than to protect consumers from risks posed by an unregulated profession or vocation. Nevertheless, we proceeded to address the Legislature's request under the sunrise criteria of the Hawai'i Regulatory Licensing Reform Act, Chapter 26H, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. As proposed, the bill requires the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) to issue licenses to large-scale dog breeders based on a gualifying inspection and to enforce the requirements for humane dog breeding. We found the bill problematic for several reasons. First, there is no reliable information on the magnitude of the problem of unscrupulous breeders in Hawai'i. Both the Better Business Bureau and the DCCA report only a handful of complaints in the past few years. Proponents of the bill could not provide information that satisfies the sunrise criteria and our own research showed the potential harm to the public by dog breeders is at best anecdotal. Testimony in Opposition to HB 2534

Dear Representative Woolsey and Members of the House Agriculture Committee,

I write both as a concerned individual and pet owner, as well as in my capacity as the president of Hawai'i Hulacat Club, a component member-club of the Cat Fanciers' Association, Inc. ("CFA"), the world's largest registry of pedigreed felines. I am also CFA's Ambassador/Coordinator for its Hawai'i Division. CFA has long advocated in the interests of all cats, whether pedigreed or random-bred, as well as in the interests of all cats or other species. My interests primarily concern cats, and HB2534, at least as currently drafted, would apply only to dog owners. However, prior experiences from many other states and local jurisdictions that have been targeted for animal- and breeder-regulation legislation by organizations such as the Humane Society of the United states has shown that animal-regulation legislation initially addressing only dogs quite often is expanded over time to include other species. Hence, I offer my anticipatory opposition to this bill.

I respectfully ask this Honorable Committee to **oppose HB 2534**, which is redundant and would serve no legitimate or necessary purpose.

First, each of Hawai'i's counties requires <u>all</u> dogs to be registered, with mandatory annual renewals. These requirements apply regardless of the number of dogs owned by a person. Counties collect registration data that include the name and address of each dog's owner, each dog's age and its gender, and whether the dog has been spayed or castrated. Local animal control agencies have ready access to these data. There simply is no necessity for breeder registration with the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs in order to identify dog owners and to classify and characterize the pets they own.

Furthermore, a 2011 report from the State Auditor concluded that regulation of large-scale breeders and facilities was not warranted. *See:* <u>http://files.hawaii.gov/auditor/Reports/2011/11-02.pdf</u>

Finally, and most recently, last year the DCCA testified that it had concluded it was <u>not</u> the appropriate agency for regulation of dog breeders (which I view as one of the ultimate goals of HB2534, whether explicitly stated or not). *See:* <u>http://www.capitol.hawaii.gov/Session2013/Testimony/HB233_TESTIMONY_EDB_02-01-13.PDF</u> In this era of increased cost-consciousness and with the legislative desire to avoid needless and duplicative regulations, the DCCA's opinion should be considered and respected.

A better approach than that offered by this proposed legislation would be to encourage dog owners to comply with *existing* local dog licensure/registration regulations.

I respectfully urge the Committee to reject HB 2534.
