SUBJECT: HB 395, HD 1, Relating to Youth

Hearing: Thursday, February 21, 2013, 11:00 a.m. State Capitol, Conference Room 308

**PURPOSE**: The purpose of House Bill 395, House Draft 1, is to require the Office of Youth Services (OYS) to coordinate a two-year safe places for youth pilot program, including a network of safe places where youth can access safety and obtain advice, guidance, programs, and services. The bill also establishes and funds position for youth program coordinator.

**OFFICE'S POSITION:** OYS supports the intent of HB 395, HD 1, Relating to Youth, but requests that any appropriation not affect the priorirties in the Executive Biennium Budget.

OYS currently procures programs and services across the state to assist at-risk youth and their families in navigating through the system in order to engage in needed services through outreach and advocacy. In addition, the OYS funds 24-hour short term residential emergency shelters for youth in crisis. Walk-ins are accepted and no prior approval is required. HB 395, HD 1, would expand our current efforts in reaching at-risk and troubled youth.

Thank you for this opportunity to voice my support of HB 395.

My name is Rachel Arakaki and I am currently in the MSW Graduate program at the University of Hawaii. But, prior to beginning my studies I was a DOE high school teacher. For twenty years, I worked with Hawaii's youth. I heard their stories of feeling abandoned by divorced parents, betrayed by friends and never feeling validated.

One of my goals as a classroom teacher was to provide a haven for them in my classroom. I'd like to think that as soon as they step into my classroom, they could find that security and comfort that outside relationships denied them. But, my role as a teacher had boundaries. There were a few times I received notice that a student was on a runaway list and that the police were notified. I wondered how many safe places that student could go to, outside of their inner circle of friends. Abusive relationships at home make it hard to want to return and I've had students that would prefer police intervention than facing the abusive parent. There must be a better option for these youth who long for a nurturing and caring environment than the one that prompted them to run away in the first place.

I believe a program like this will offer them options that will secure their physical safety as well as provide them with services that can provide guidance and validation.
