I thank you for the opportunity to present comments relating to HB 417 HD 2, relating to appropriation of funds to the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation Primary Care Training Program at the Hilo Medical Center.

As a member of the Hilo Medical Center's Executive Management Team, I resolve to strengthen the state's provider workforce through the HHSC Primary Care Training Program (HHSCPCTP).

Support of this program and of family medicine graduate education will generate greater numbers of providers practicing throughout the islands. I endorse the HHSCPCTP as a Means of Closing the Provider Gap in Hawaii.

Investing in training family practice residents in the neighbor islands is expected to yield a meaningful return on investment.

- Increasing the number of family practice physicians is expected to decrease the number and rate of "potentially avoidable hospitalizations," which the state now pays for through both its Medicaid program and unreimbursed care by state's public hospital system, Hawaii Health Systems Corporation.
- In rural areas of the state the impact of the Residency Program and greater access to family medicine physicians is
 projected to have a profound impact on lowering the costs of treating expensive and debilitating conditions. For example,
 diabetes and coronary heart disease have reached epidemic proportions in Hawaii County compared to Oahu and other
 areas of the state where there is greater access to primary care.
- The known economic multiplier effect of additional physicians in Hawaii means each additional physician is expected to generate 5 new jobs and new tax revenue. (Source: The Lewin Group).

I recognize that the HHSCPCTP uses an advanced model of care delivery that eliminates the need to train or attract unrealistically high numbers of physicians. The current predominant model of care throughout the country involves one primary care physician caring for 2,000-2,500 individuals with a small staff, usually including a medical assistant and receptionist. The team model of care in which the HHSCPCTP is training Hawaii's future providers allows one physician and their team to care for up to 10,000 patients. Critical team components include a nurse practitioner or physician assistant and specialists in chronic disease management such as pharmacists, certified diabetes educators, behavioral health providers, licensed nurses, and well trained non-licensed staff.

I recognize that it is well documented throughout the nation that physicians attending rural training programs are much more likely to practice in a rural area. More than half of residents trained at rural sites stay and practice in this setting after they completed their residency. The same can be expected for advanced practice nurses, psychologists, and clinical pharmacists.

I recognize that a more robust primary care base will attract physicians in other needed specialties to the islands as they will be guaranteed appropriate referrals. The opportunity to teach residents and other health professions students on the outer islands will also attract physicians who might otherwise not stay or come to Hawaii.







I wholeheartedly support the intent of HB 417 HD 2 and strongly urge your support for this critical legislation.

Aloha, Chair Ige and Committee Members:

The Hawai'i Council of Mayors, which includes the mayors of Hawai'i, Honolulu, Kaua'i and Maui counties, supports House Bill 417 HD2. The bill as originally drafted would appropriate \$2.8 million for each of the next two fiscal years to fund the Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation primary care training program.

This statewide program is administered by Hilo Medical Center, and includes the Hawai'i Island Family Medicine Residency Program as well as students participating in advanced practice nursing training from the School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa and the University of Hawai'i at Hilo. The program also includes clinical pharmacists from the UH-Hilo College of Pharmacy, and post-doctoral fellows from I Ola Lahui, which trains psychologists to meet the needs of rural communities.

Rural areas of Hawai'i continue to face a very serious physician shortage, and many areas simply do not have enough doctors to provide an adequate level of access to health care for our residents. Projections by the John A. Burns School of Medicine show the physician shortage will dramatically worsen in the next five years as many doctors retire.

An important piece of the solution for our communities is the rural residency program, which is now undergoing national accreditation and will begin training residents in 2014. National research shows that 80 percent of residents practice near where they train, and we know this program will help ease the physician shortage in our county and in rural areas across the state.

The Hawai'i Heath Systems Corporation primary care training program will produce interdisciplinary teams that can care for four times as many patients as independent practitioners, and will expand to serve rural communities on each of the islands. We believe this is an innovative and effective strategy for improving access to primary care services.

The program is designed to allow second- and third-year residents to choose elective studies and work in a variety of communities on different islands, which help provide improved access to care in each of those areas.

Investing in training family practice residents on the neighbor islands is also expected to help decrease the number and rate of potentially avoidable hospitalizations. That will allow the state to save money by reducing unreimbursed care now paid for by Hawai'i's Medicaid program and the state's public hospital system.

We believe this is an important program that will benefit rural residents across the state. Mahalo for your consideration and support for this effort to help keep our families healthy.

Aloha, Chair Ige and Committee Members:

The County of Hawai'i strongly supports House Bill 417 HD2. The bill as originally drafted would appropriate \$2.8 million for each of the next two fiscal years to fund the Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation primary care training program.

This statewide program is administered by Hilo Medical Center, and includes the Hawai'i Island Family Medicine Residency Program as well as students participating in advanced practice nursing training from the School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa and the University of Hawai'i at Hilo. The program also includes clinical pharmacists from the UH-Hilo College of Pharmacy, and post-doctoral fellows from I Ola Lahui, which trains psychologists to meet the needs of rural communities.

The state and Hawai'i Island continue to face a severe physician shortage, with a recent study estimating that Hawai'i County needs 150 more doctors to provide an adequate level of access to health care for our residents. Projections by the John A. Burns School of Medicine show the physician shortage will dramatically worsen in the next five years as many doctors retire.

An important piece of the solution for our community is the rural residency program, which is now undergoing national accreditation and will begin training residents in 2014. National research shows that 80 percent of residents practice near where they train, and we know this program will help ease the physician shortage in our county and in rural areas across the state.

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Investing in training family practice residents on the neighbor islands is also expected to help decrease the number and rate of potentially avoidable hospitalizations. That will allow the state to save money by reducing unreimbursed care now paid for by Hawai'i's Medicaid program and the state's public hospital system.

We believe this is an important program that will benefit rural residents across the state. Mahalo for your consideration and support for this effort to help keep our families healthy.

Dear Chair Ige, Vice Chair Kidani, and Members of the Committee:

As Director of the Hawaii Island Family Medicine Residency and Team Leader of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation Primary Care Training Program I submit the following comments on the legislation to support this program, coming before you today as HB 417, HD2 which mirrors the language of SB 1383 which you have already evaluated and passed through this committee. Medicine is changing rapidly. No longer can providers sit in their office and wait for patients to come to them with a concern. Instead, they must reach out to their patients, providing guidance and encouraging healthy practices, even if the patient never calls for an appointment. Neither can the state of Hawaii continue to sit back and wait for mainland trained professionals to come and assume the care of its population. Like the sugar plantations that recruited many of those doctors and nurses, those days are gone. Instead a proactive approach is needed in 2013.

Thus, my initial comment to you is regarding the timeliness of this piece of legislation. Timeliness is exemplified in three ways. First, the HHSC Primary Care Training Program is largely up and running, but cannot add the essential component of physician training without state support. Just last week we underwent our accreditation site visit for the Family Medicine Residency and we are poised to start recruiting medical students for matriculation next year. Second, the need for additional providers is now. In the last several weeks I have been approached by three organizations asking me if I have doctors for them. One was a native Hawaiian health organization, another a community health center, and the third a hospital. Less than two week ago, I spoke with a physician in his 70's who said he would hang on and keep practicing until we could train physicians to take over his practice. Third, the opportunity to attract capable trainees is on the rise. This week, the American Association of Medical Colleges reported an uptick in interest in primary care among medical students, and many medical schools are increasing their class size to accomodate a larger number of students with a declared intention of practicing primary care. Without new training sites, however, there will be nowhere for these medical students to go.

My second comment is that the state of Hawaii is already spending the money requested to support this program. However, instead of spending it to keep people healthy, we are spending it to mop up after they become ill. Ten percent of Hawaii residents surveyed by this Legislature's own Hawaii Physician Workforce Assessment Project stated that they were unable to access a physician when needed during the past year. Even worse twenty three percent of respondents said that a family member went to the emergency room because they could not access a primary care provider. An emergency room visit costs on average \$900. If an ambulance is called, add another \$400. If the patient is admitted, the average daily cost is over \$900 per day in Hawaii. Hawaii spends nearly \$500 million of its own dollars on the Medicaid/Quest programs. To insure its over 53,000 employees, the state spends a nearly equal amount. Much of this nearly \$1 billion in costs is due to lack of primary care or poorly organized "old fashioned" primary care. Robust team-based care can really change this picture, as proven in studies that look at US counties with good primary care versus those without. To pay for this program each year we need to prevent only 151 cases of out of control infections, known as septicemia, at \$18,500 per hospitalization. I submit that this is easily done.

Hawaii trained family physicians and their primary care teams are needed now and will be even more sorely needed in four years when the first group has completed training.

Over those intervening four years, I expect that both federal funding streams for primary care physician training and physician payment for primary care services will undergo something of a revolution. At that time, we can reassess the need for ongoing support of this program by the state of Hawaii. However, at this time, the answer is clear. Hawaii has lagged behind other states in both numbers of training slots per population and support of those training slots, and as such we are at a great disadvantage in assuring access to primary care by our citizens. 2013 is the year to change this by fully funding the bill as initially written for the next two years with an appropriation of **\$2.8 million** for both 2013-14, and 2014-15.

HB 417 HD2 - Addresses primary care physician shortages by appropriating funds for the interdisciplinary Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC) Primary Care Training Program at Hilo Medical Center.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide comments relating to the HHSC Primary Care Training Program at Hilo Medical Center. I am hopeful this measure will receive the State assistance needed which will directly impact the need to get more Primary Care Physicians into the most rural areas of our State.

Upon introduction, this measure requested an appropriation of **\$2.8 million** for both 2013-14, and 2014-15. Our neighbor island medical members, county government officials, and local business leaders all agree that the appropriation is a much needed investment. Health manpower shortages, and recruitment and retention of primary care providers were identified as major rural health concerns among state offices of rural health. Access to quality health services was the most often identified rural health priority by state and local rural health leaders across the nation. According to the Community Health Profile - Report 2012, in 2010, 14.7% of adults in Hawaii County were uninsured, compared to 9.2% for the City and County of Honolulu. In addition, Hawaii County has the lowest ratio of licensed physicians per 100,000 population compared to the other counties, it has 14% of the State's Population - but only 10% of the State's Physicians, and more residents of Hawaii County do not have a personal doctor. And lastly, the Hawaii County rate of hospital admissions for uncontrolled diabetes in 2009 was nearly twice the City and County of Honolulu rate per 1,000 population.

The Primary Care Training Program uses a team approach which will train primary healthcare teams and advance the model of Patient Centered Medical Homes, with a focus on pro-active care. Some of the activity will be coordinating patient care with specialists. Within our Family Practice Residency model, the team will be physician-led, but utilizing advanced nurse practitioners, clinical community pharmacists, and behavioral specialists. This model of care and style of case management keeps the patient out of the hospital and more effectively manages the condition. The result is highly efficient, customized care that lowers costs long-term.

Our health care leaders in this State have long been aware of the approaching crisis in primary care. We have an opportunity to invest in and support a model of healthcare that is proven and will address the health needs of our rural and neighbor island communities.

Aloha Chair Ige, Vice Chair Kidani and Members of this Committee:

My name is Vivian Landrum, and I am the President/CEO of the Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce (KKCC). KKCC represents over 530 business members and is the leading business advocacy organization on the west side of Hawai`i Island. KKCC also actively works to enhance the environment, unique lifestyle and quality of life in West Hawai`i for both residents and visitors alike.

The Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce strongly supports HB 417 HD2.

The shortage of physicians on Hawaii Island has been documented and discussed for the past ten years. As noted in several reports from the North Hawaii Outcomes Project as well as the Hawaii County Community Health Profile, the health of the people of Hawaii County is consistently worse that the state average. Factors attributing to this include genetics, social and economic conditions, health related behaviors and **access to healthcare**. Increasing the healthcare workforce was cited as one requirement to improve the health of Hawaii Island's people.

The HHSC Primary Care Training Program could help stem the current and projected shortage by increasing the chances for additional physicians on Hawaii Island as it is documented that many residents choose to remain where they are trained. This could have a positive domino effect as new physicians will require staff, thus supporting job growth as well.

The physician shortage also impacts hiring challenges for employers. Members of this Chamber have reported even though they have health care plans for their employees; new employees are struggling to find physicians who will take on new patients. Current practicing physicians are already over burdened and reluctant to bring on new clients. Qualified workforce candidates are therefore reluctant to upgrade to a new job if the change means a change in health care provider.

The Primary Care Training Program has the potential to impact Hawai`i Island via a multitude of positive outcomes. More primary care providers will decrease unnecessary hospital visits, increase ability to treat debilitating diseases and lower costs, are just a few to add to the list.

Hawaii Island is experiencing a gradual recovery from the past few years of economic turmoil. The appropriation of funding for a Primary Care Training Program is an action that is greatly needed for this Island now and for the future. I urge you to support HB 417 HD2.

Studies have shown that in five (5) years, 1-in-3 physicians currently practicing on Hawai'i island will not be doing so. It is well known that due to the shortage of providers on the island, many Primary Care Physicians are not taking new patients, and when a new Physician establishes a practice on the island, that practice is soon filled to capacity within 2-3 weeks.

The Family Practice Residents will train primary healthcare teams and advance the model of Patient Centered Medical Homes, with a focus on pro-active care. With this new model of care, the program will be able to service ten thousand (10,000) patients comparted to two thousand five hundred (2,500) with the new traditional model of a single Provider and his office staff. This paradigm of care includes advanced practice nurses, pharmacist clinicians, and psychologists, as well as family physicians. Being able to provide preventative care will also help lower costs to families. The focus is on training for practices in smaller communities – where skills are different.

According to the Community Health Profile - Report 2012, in 2010, 14.7% of adults in Hawaii County were uninsured, compared to 9.2% for the City and County of Honolulu. In addition, Hawaii County has the lowest ratio of licensed physicians per 100,000 population compared to the other counties, it has 14% of the State's Population - but only 10% of the State's Physicians, and more residents of Hawaii County do not have a personal doctor. And lastly, the Hawaii County rate of hospital admissions for uncontrolled diabetes in 2009 was nearly twice the City and County of Honolulu rate per 1,000 population.

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Our health care leaders in this State have long been aware of the approaching crisis in primary care. We have an opportunity to invest in and support a model of healthcare that is proven and will address the health needs of our rural and neighbor island communities.

HB 417 HD2 - Addresses primary care physician shortages by appropriating funds for the interdisciplinary Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC) Primary Care Training Program at Hilo Medical Center.

Thank you . It is **vital** to receive the State assistance needed which will directly impact the need to get more Primary Care Physicians into the most rural areas of our State.

An appropriation, of **\$2.8 million** for both 2013-14, and 2014-15, is what neighbor island medical members, county government officials, and local business leaders all agree is a much needed investment. Health manpower shortages, and recruitment and retention of primary care providers were identified as major rural health concerns among state offices of rural health that negatively impact **ACCESS** to quality health services across the nation.

The Primary Care Training Program uses a **team** approach which will train primary healthcare teams and advance the model of Patient Centered Medical Homes, with a focus on pro-active care. Some of the activity will be coordinating patient care with specialists. Within our Family Practice Residency model, the team will be physician-led, but utilizing advanced nurse practitioners, clinical community pharmacists, and behavioral specialists. This model of care and style of case management keeps the patient out of the hospital and more effectively manages the condition. The result is highly efficient, customized care that lowers costs long-term.

The health care team approach is a **key feature** because we start the flow of non physicians professionals into the system more quickly. We have an opportunity to **be a leader** in addressing the shortage of health care professionals with his program. The \$2.8 million appropriation is essential to put this program into operation as a model for others.
