Purpose of Bill:	Authorizes schools to grow food in school gardens for consumption in the school lunch program; provided that the food is inspected and certified as safe by the Department of Agriculture. Allows nonprofit organizations to establish and administer fresh food distribution services. Effective July 1, 2013.			

#### **Department's Position:**

The Department of Education (DOE) supports school garden programs and curriculum related activities.

The DOE does not support the amended new section, as written, relating to school gardens and consumption of produce in federally funded school meals programs.

In addition to food safety, liability and equity procedures and policies must be established. There may be additional costs associated with processing that is not in the budget.

Administration of a fresh food distribution service to a DOE school should also prescribe to the same standards.

## HOUSE BILL NO. 478 RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Chairperson Wooley and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on House Bill 478, which proposes to allow all schools to grow food in school gardens for consumption in their school meals programs which shall be inspected and certified as safe by the department of agriculture. The department offers comments.

The federal Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) was created to help the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) address the key elements of food safety. On January 16, 2013, FDA published proposed the first two of five regulations to implement FSMA. At the state level, it appears that the Department of Health will hold the main responsibility of implementation. The Department would recommend a closer inspection of the upcoming FSMA rules and how those rules may determine the appropriate roles for the various state entities. One such vehicle for this conversation could be through the good agricultural practices task force that is being created by legislation that is currently moving through the legislature.



The Department of Education School Food Services Branch is responsible for the quality, quantity, price-appropriateness, and safety of the food provided to Hawaii public schools. Therefore, we would also defer to the Department of Education's School Food Services Branch for comment.
