H.B. 578, H.D. 1 – RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO supports the intent of H.B. 578, H.D. 1 which amends Chapter 89, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to prohibit a public employer from willfully implementing or attempting to implement any term of a collective bargaining proposal without the exclusive representative's agreement, and conversely prohibits similar action from an employee or employee representative toward an employer.

As delineated in Section 89-1 (b), Hawaii Revised Statues, joint decision-making is the modern way to administer government and it is the public policy of the State to promote harmonious and cooperative relations between government and its employees. Allowing for a party to unilaterally implement terms of a collective bargaining agreement clearly violates this process and undermines the fundamental principles of bargaining.

"Last, best, and final offers" simply contravene collective bargaining. Gov.
