A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 286-41, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows: 3 If the vehicle to be registered is specially "(c) 4 constructed[reconstructed or rebuilt; is a special interest 5 vehicle; or is an imported vehicle, this fact shall be stated in 6 the application and upon the registration of the special 7 interest motor vehicle and imported motor vehicle, which has 8 been registered until that time in any other state or county, and the owner shall surrender to the director of finance the 9 10 certificates of registration or other evidence of such form of 11 registration as may be in the applicant's possession or control. 12 The director of finance shall grant full faith and credit to the 13 currently valid certificates of title and registration describing the vehicle, the ownership thereof, and any liens 14 15 noted thereon, issued by any title state or county in which the 16 vehicle was last registered. House Committee on Transportation

The Department of Transportation **opposes** this bill that would abolish the reconstructed vehicle inspection program.

The reconstructed vehicle inspection program serves public safety objectives by providing a means of double checking significant modifications that people make to motor vehicles and ensuring that the safety features of the modified vehicles are not compromised excessively and that the modifications will not be a detriment to highway safety. We cannot show that the program reduces crashes, but it does identify problems. During 2012, 1,883 vehicles failed the reconstructed vehicle inspection the first time the vehicle was inspected. A total of 1,342 vehicles passed the inspection. Thus, the program kept approximately 500 unsafe vehicles off of the roads in 2012.

The program also serves to notify potential buyers of reconstructed vehicles of the modifications that have been made to the vehicles. This allows for a more intelligent vehicle purchase.

The program provides a means for hobbyists to register vehicles that lack a manufacturer's label certifying that a vehicle complies with all applicable federal motor vehicle safety standards as of the date of manufacture. Section 286-42(a), HRS reads in part, "... Except for motorcycles that are built on an aftermarket motorcycle frame, special interest vehicles, and reconstructed vehicles, any motor vehicle or device that is not certified by the manufacturer to be in compliance with all applicable Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards as of the date of manufacture shall not be registered." If the program is discontinued, owners of reconstructed vehicles that do not have a certification label will have their registration cancelled and will no longer be able to drive them on the public roads.

Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and members of the Committee, my name is Alison Powers, Executive Director of the Hawaii Insurers Council. Hawaii Insurers Council is a non-profit trade association of property and casualty insurance companies licensed to do business in Hawaii. Member companies underwrite approximately 40% of all property and casualty insurance premiums in the state.

Hawaii Insurers Council **opposes** this bill. By repealing the definition of "reconstructed vehicle" and requirements for inspection and approval of a reconstructed vehicle, we believe the safety of the vehicle may be in question and may be unbeknownst to a purchaser of a reconstructed vehicle. Although the "recon" law only applies to Oahu, there are by far the most vehicles on Oahu and its repeal could exponentially increase the number of reconstructed vehicles on the road.

If the bill were to pass, changes could be made to a vehicle which could make it no longer comply with Federal Department of Transportation standards regarding vehicle safety. If the "reconstructed vehicle" definition is repealed, modifications to the vehicle's body, power train, steering system, suspension system, exhaust system, intake system, or bumper system may be made, which are extremely broad. These less-safe vehicles would then be legal and on the road increasing the likelihood of injury to their occupants or others in the event of a motor vehicle crash. If these vehicles are sold, buyers may not know they have been modified and are now less-safe.

We ask that this bill be held. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.
