The Hawai'i Coalition Against Legalized Gambling supports HB 614. The purpose of the bill is to amend Section 712-1270 of Hawaii Revised Statutes to include Part III Gambling Offenses to the list of other criminal offenses which can be terminated under Part V Nuisance Abatement.

Under this bill the Honolulu Police Department will be able to remind land owners and lessors of their duty to be aware of and stop their properties from being used for illegal gambling activities by citing the Nuisance Abatement law. Private citizens will also be enabled to initiate legal action under this law.

According to HPD violent acts are occurring in illegal gambling rooms and have been the cause of more than one homicide. Gambling rooms are also being used to distribute narcotics. Further, illegal sweepstake gambling activities and other gambling machines are being established in internet cafes and arcades through rental of premises, many of which are accessible to our youth in Hawaii.

Enactment of this legislation will remedy the current situation of land owners and lessors who fail to take action to remove illegal gambling activities from their property.

The Hawaii Coalition Against Legalized Gambling urges the Committee on Judiciary to Pass HB 614.

Chair Rhoads and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General is in support of this bill.

This bill seeks to include gambling offenses in the state nuisance abatement laws under chapter 712, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and entitles citizens who bring a nuisance abatement suit against a place used for gambling the same rights and protections of victims and witnesses in criminal proceedings.

Currently, the offenses that are included in Hawaii's nuisance abatement laws are relating to prostitution, obscenity, illegal drugs, and fireworks. The Hawaii Revised Statutes includes these offenses, along with nuisance abatement, under chapter 712, titled, "Offenses Against Public Health and Morals." Gambling offenses are also covered under this chapter, yet they are not included as covered offenses for nuisance abatement. Gambling rooms have been found to fuel other illegal activities, such as drugs and violence. Gambling rooms, like drug houses, should be included in our nuisance abatement laws.

This bill will simply give law enforcement an additional tool to protect the public through the abatement of gambling activity and its related ills.

Accordingly, the Department of the Attorney General respectfully requests that this bill be passed.
