1 Department's Position: The department opposes this bill.

Fiscal Implications: This bill would require additional staffing that the department has not included or 2 funded in the Executive Biennium Budget and therefore may adversely affect other spending priorities. 3 Purpose and Justification: Enforcement of this legislation would require additional staff and legal 4 resources. Currently, there is no measure to determine at what point odors become injurious to public 5 health, therefore we would not be able to enforce this provision. The department would be required to 6 create standards that do not exist anywhere else in the nation with regards to the abating this nuisance. 7 We respectfully request that the legislature follow the recommendations of the community meeting held 8 earlier this year which the HD1 version of this bill addressed. The SD1 completely changes the 9 remedies that were presented at the forum on feral bird feeding sponsored by City and County of 10 Honoulu, the State Legislature, the DOH, the DLNR, HPD, and mental health professionals, that the 11 act of feeding the birds must be regulated, and not the level of odor or filth unless enforceable, 12 measurable standards are developed. There are no other States that have measurable standards . Current 13

1	laws regarding nuisances are extremely difficult if not impossible to enforce due to the lack of
2	measurable standards. It is also difficult to determine any "injury" to public health when there no
3	current epidemiological evidence that show any disease transmission as the result of the feeding of feral
4	birds.
5	The department would like to focus its limited resources in areas proven to be of public health
6	concern such as controlling the incidence of food borne illness risk factors in food establishments
7	through proper inspection frequencies that have been proven to produce consistent compliance with food
8	safety regulations which are directly related to outbreaks of food borne illness.

HB 619 HD1 - RELATING TO FERAL BIRDS

Please do NOT pass this bill because it is an unnecessary one; people complaining that their property has been damaged by birds/pigeons fed by their neighbors ALREADY HAVE recourse available to them to stop this nuisance: they may take their neighbors to small claims court and prove that their actions have caused them damage and expense, and win compensation. It is senseless to criminalize harmless, and indeed, kind and sweet behavior. In addition, at a time when the economy is struggling, pet shops selling bird food will suffer as a consequence of people not being allowed to buy wild bird food. Further, rehabbing of foundlings will become illegal under this law. Try explaining that to a child. All rehabbing efforts will be in jeopardy and will simply result in civil disobedience – this is not the kind of law you want to create. Taking care of and casually feeding birds is a simple, inexpensive pleasure remaining in people's lives – do not tamper with it.
