### In consideration of HOUSE BILL 673, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO PESTICIDES

House Bill 673, House Draft 1 proposes to require pesticide use in the State of Hawai'i to be registered, tracked, analyzed, and reported (along with associated data on health complaints, accounting, and recommendations on safety and efficacy) on an annual basis by the Department of Agriculture (DOA). The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) respectfully provides the following comments on this bill, but defers to DOA on the implementation.

As an island state, Hawai'i relies on the use of approved pesticides to manage threats to agriculture and natural resources posed by non-native pests. The use of these pesticides is carefully considered and must follow the product-specific guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The addition of a new state system to register and track pesticides, along with the substantial amount of annual reporting associated with this system, would decrease the efficiency of the State's protective measures with regard to agriculture and natural resources. The creation of this system would increase the amount of bureaucratic oversight involved in initiating agricultural and conservation projects, increasing the time it would take to respond to new pests. Further, the creation, maintenance, and annual reporting associated with this system would be costly. House Bill 673 would authorize DOA to charge a fee to cover those costs, meaning that the cost would be borne by resource users, including members of the landscape industry, agriculturists, land managers, and conservation practitioners.

Because the use of pesticides already follows stringent safety guidelines approved by the EPA, and because this bill would increase bureaucratic costs associated with agriculture

and conservation while also decreasing efficiency, the Department provides comments, but defers to DOA on the implementation.

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### HB 673 HD1 RELATING TO PESTICIDES

Chair Belatti and Members of the House Committee on Health:

I am Sean O'Keefe, testifying on behalf of Alexander & Baldwin, Inc. (A&B) and its division Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company (HC&S) on HB 673 HD1, A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PESTICIDES. We respectfully oppose this bill, which would require the Department of Agriculture to prepare an annual report of restricted use pesticides in the state and require private or commercial pesticide applicators to report certain information to any "abutting property owner", when requested.

Pesticides are safely and effectively used for a wide variety of beneficial purposes, including ensuring that our drinking water does not contain harmful bacteria or viruses, protecting our homes from the ravages of termites and other insects, controlling mosquitoes, rodents, and other disease-carrying vectors, controlling invasive species in our forests, and protecting our agricultural crops from insect damage, disease, and weed infestation.

Pesticide use is already highly regulated by both the State of Hawaii and the federal government through existing authorities under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) and the Hawaii Pesticide Law (Chapter 149A, HRS). Pesticide users must comply with a myriad of requirements aimed at preventing adverse impacts to human health and the environment. Additional requirements apply to pesticides designated for restricted use, including mandatory certification of private and commercial applicators.

For many pesticide users, including farmers, recordkeeping and other regulatory requirements are already so extensive that they demand almost as much time and effort to comply with as do the pesticide applications themselves. The proposed bill would require private and commercial applicators to provide detailed information regarding pesticide applications to any "abutting property owner" who requests it.

HC&S strives to be a good neighbor and understands that some neighbors may have concerns about its farming operations, including about pesticide applications. For this reason, HC&S has in the past voluntarily and informally provided information to adjacent property owners regarding pesticide applications when asked, in some cases providing advance notice of any scheduled application adjacent to their property. We believe that most farmers are willing to work cooperatively with their neighbors in this manner and that legislative action to require this is unnecessary. Moreover, as drafted, the requirements of this bill are subject to misinterpretation that could impose an unreasonable burden upon farmers.

Because the term "abutting property owner" is not defined, it is unclear whether the proposed reporting requirement would apply only to requests from property owners immediately abutting the actual site of a pesticide application (e.g., an individual field with a shared property line) or to all property owners abutting the farm or other facility upon which a pesticide application is made. In the latter case, for applicators such as HC&S which farm large tracts of contiguous acreage, this could allow a single landowner who objects to any use of pesticides in general to file repeated, frivolous requests for information regarding any pesticide application which occurs anywhere on the abutting 37,000 acre farm, regardless of location relative to the requestor's property.

Additionally, although the reporting requirement applies only to "private or commercial applicators" (i.e., those who use, or supervise the use of, restricted use pesticides), the applicator would be required to report information "regarding the use of pesticides" generally. This would appear to require reporting of the use of any pesticide by a private or commercial applicator, not just those designated for restricted use.

Lastly, most of the information required to be reported (i.e., information other than identification of the product applied) would appear to be of little or no utility to the abutting landowner and simply serves to increase the reporting burden without furthering the stated objective of this bill.

Based on the foregoing, we respectfully request that this bill be held in Committee. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Aloha Honorable Health Committee Representatives,

On behalf of Babes Against Biotech, a non-profit organization devoted to environmental awareness, we would like to voice our support for a Hawaii pesticide registry HB673 that we might willfully track the effects of pesticides in Hawaii. We are particularly concerned about those pesticides related to genetically modified organisms (GMO's). While we would like to include general use pesticides, at least we can start compiling data about restricted use pesticides.

Currently pesticides associated with the mass production of genetically modified organisms are destroying the island of Molokai, poisonous dust flies in the air and there is no containment. We need a registry to establish the effects of pesticide laden dust on our citizens and our agriculture. Pesticide abuse from GMO companies particularly has created conditions whereby it is no longer safe to live on Molokai and to live there means you will definitely be affected by the chemical laden dust and yet, daily the residents are being contaminated.

Residents of Kauai are suing a chemical company producing GMO's and spraying heavy pesticides for the damages caused by their pesticide dust [1]. In addition, pesticides of the GM company Syngenta have literally blown into a Waimea Canyon elementary school multiple times, causing blackouts, headaches and necessitating the closure of the school to clean for four full days [2]. These companies who are spraying toxic chemicals on Hawaii residents are not taking responsibility, we need a registry to establish exactly what they are using and allowing us to link the effects when applicable. Please include all pesticides in the registry, with no exceptions.

Over 52,000 dead sea urchins have been found off the coast of a GMO and heavy pesticide use fields in Kauai [3].

Thierry Work, wildlife disease specialist for the U.S. Geological Survey's National Wildlife Health Center in Honolulu says, "We're always concerned when urchins die because of what happened in the Caribbean," Work said. "The Caribbean has lost 80 percent of its coral. The massive coral die off was preceded by a massive die off of urchins. They are a keystone species and an early warning system for large-scale changes in the ocean..." Don Heacock, Kaua'i's biologist for the state Department of Land and Natural Resources Division of Aquatic Resources says, "We can only speculate about what's killing them right now, but here's something to think about: Kaua'i produces more GMO seeds than anyplace. Now, there are a whole bunch of people in the genetic engineering camp that say GMO crops need less pesticides, but the new wave of crops is more toxic than ever before... The BT corn is meant to kill. It has an insecticidal protein in the corn. In the Midwest, they found the residue from GMO corn is related to aquatic insect deaths, which are food for baby fish." BT corn has BT pesticide genetically engineered into every kernel of corn and this must also be registered.

Now that the GM company made pesticides are losing their effectiveness, they are using stronger and harsher chemicals to attack the super weeds and super bugs that have developed resistance to widely used commercial pesticides [4]. Since Hawaii is the global test site for the most GMO open air field trials in the world, we are the ones who are being experimented on in regards to using chemical pesticides of increasing strength to attack monstrous bugs and nearly impossible weeds the older pesticides can no longer control.

This means these companies are exposing our residents to components of Agent Orange for example, as they are vying for 2,4-D resistant seed patents which actually increases pesticide use [5], we recognize they are spraying 2,4-D on us to test their new GM seed resistance: A war chemical. According to Wenonah Hauter, executive director of Food & Water Watch, and Mae Wu, a health attorney at the Natural Resources Defense Council, "Many studies show that 2,4-D exposure is associated with various forms of cancer, Parkinson's Disease, nerve damage, hormone disruption and birth defects." In addition 2,4-D has been found to increase growth inhibitors [6] of soy and threaten other crops [7]. Echoing the words of another organization Food & Water Watch, over 140 advocacy groups signed together in a letter addressing Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, "The scientific community has sounded alarms about the dangers of 2,4-D for decades. Numerous studies link 2,4-D exposure to major health problems such as cancer, lowered sperm counts, liver toxicity and Parkinson's disease. Lab studies show that 2,4-D causes endocrine disruption, reproductive problems, neurotoxicity, and immunosuppression." [8]

Do we know how much of it is being used? How about where? We need to establish a record of application and useage; HB 673 will help to establish. One amendment to consider is the exclusion of "minimum risk" pesticides per Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) until we know what the "minimum risk" pesticides are we should strike that clause from the bill.

HB 673 will help to establish a baseline understanding of how much and what types of pesticides are being applied to farms, parks, schools and public facilities. Beekeepers worldwide are concerned about the myriad of pesticides being used in so many places. Neonicotinoids associated with the growth of genetically modified organisms are some

of the worst and affect our bee population [9]. Hawaii is the world's leading exporter of Queen bees and the bees are unable to find their way back to the hives upon pesticide exposure [10,11], resulting in bee Colony Collapse Disorder [12], especially after pollinating on plants with neonicotinoid pesticide seeds [13].

Mahalo again for considering this testimony in favor of HB 673. We look forward to celebrating your support of a Hawaii pesticide registry as it is crucial information affecting the health and environment. Tourists will not want to spend thousands of dollars flying here to be poisoned and we need to get this situation under control before it is too late. Pesticides travel and affect our water, ground water, ocean water and non-target areas. The continued abuse of pesticides kill the healthy microorganisms in the dirt and destroy the nutritional content of Hawaii's rich soil we need to grow anything at all. A toxic field is not one you want to eat from and we have a right to know all of the pesticides being applied and every other detail about these deadly chemical uses.

Chair Au Belatti and Members of the Committee:

I am Tim Lyons, Executive Director of the Hawaii Pest Control Association and we must continue to oppose this bill.

It is our members that protect homes and structures for structural pests including termites, rodents, bed bugs, ants and cockroaches to mention a few. It appears to be the purpose of this bill to establish some sort of information system regarding the applications of pesticides.

The first part of the bill restricts the use reporting to restricted use pesticides. The balance of the bill seems somewhat confusing. Restricted use pesticides are those that are more toxic and typically go through a process at EPA that involves years and millions of dollars prior to gaining approval. EPA typically looks at the approval process as whether the risk in the use of the pesticide balances or outweighs the detrimental effects.

The section regarding restricted use pesticides however, seems to apply to structural pest control operators inasmuch as Subsection (b) on page 2, Item 3, regards pesticide use in schools and pest control for all public buildings. It is typically our members, in addition to the schools own internal staff which make these applications. Typically however, the school's staff does not use restricted use pesticides because there is no certification program for government employees whereas private applicators go through certification and testing, as well as needing to fulfill continuing education requirements.

We also think that the section regarding information by request of an abutting property owner is full of problems. It includes commercial pesticide applicators and it calls for information that may or may not be needed. As some people are aware, many of the cockroach traps, ant traps and termite bait stations are all in tamper-proof boxes and the possibility for abutting property owner fear is greatly reduced. We also find that these requests could have no limit. In addition, part of the information that is to be reported includes "target species and threshold". In structural pest control, threshold is very much a subjective manner. One cockroach may be a threshold for you, while an occasional sighting may not bother me. Additionally, weather conditions and wind speed have nothing to do for applications made inside a home.

Lastly, we are concerned about the open-ended reporting fee that the Department could implement.

In short, this bill has a lot of problems and does not seem to fit. Although we have no objection to part (a), the balance of the bill is problematic. Based on that we are not in support of its passage.

In 1981, got married and became pregnant with my oldest son who was born in April of 1982. I lived in fear until his birth because Del Monte's spraying of the highly toxic pesticide heptachlor on its pineapple fields and feeding the pineapple tops to dairy cows contaminated Hawai'i's milk supply at that time. Can you imagine being told to "drink more milk" for your unborn baby and then worrying that the milk that you drank was poisoning him? Heptachlor is a carcinogen and the effects of this contamination were wide-spread. I had breast cancer in 2005 and, to this day, I still fear that my son will come down with cancer related to the milk that I drank when he was a fetus. One of the biggest users of pesticides, corporate conglomera te Monsanto, is also one of the highest bidders for farmland in Hawai'i, with statewide acreage increasing at an average rate of over 300 acres per year. In the U.S., the genetically engineered crops like those grown on Monsanto's farmlands increased overall pesticide use by 318.4 million pounds over their first 13 years on the marketplace (1996–2008) according to a study derived from U.S. Dept. of Agriculture data. Increased concentration of chemicals in air, water, and soil in the communities surrounding GE fields is a legitimate public health concern. Pesticides persist in soil, may leach into groundwater, and is very irritating to eyes. Chronic exposure has been linked to developmental disorders and autoimmune deficiencies. Please don't sentence our families to live in fear that their children are being poisoned by Monsanto just so they can make money. We deserve to live in a healthy environment and environmental justice demands that you pass HB673.

Comments: Dear Chair Della Au Belatti and Committee Members: I am testifying in opposition of HB 673 and urge the committee to hold this measure. My name is Mark Kijima. I own a small farm on Maui. I have served as the chairman of the Kula Agricultural Park Committee, an advisory committee to the County of Maui and also as vice-chairman of the Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation's Environmental Stewardship Committee. I have also served on the Governor's Advisory Committee on Pesticides. The HB 673 reporting requirement is an expensive, unnecessary burden on agricultural producers. The information that is being requested is already available to the Hawaii Department of Agriculture (HDOA). All sales of Restricted- Use Pesticides are reported to the HDOA. The applicators are already required by Federal law to record use of all Restricted-Use Pesticides. These records are available to the Department upon their request. The pesticide use disclosure requirement to neighboring property owners is an infringement of an agricultural producer's privacy. The use of pesticides is already regulated by the EPA & HDOA. All pesticides and their labels are approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Each pesticide and its uses are scrutinized for its effects on human health and the environment before it is registered for use in the United States. Further, the Hawaii Department of Agriculture reviews, approves and licenses each pesticide and its uses before it is allowed in the State of Hawaii. If a neighboring property owner suspects that any pesticides are being used improperly, that property owner can already file a complaint with the HDOA that triggers an investigation to determine whether any laws have been violated. The pesticide use disclosure will make agricultural producers very vulnerable to frivolous, harassing lawsuits. This is an unneeded burden on agricultural producers, business owners and will add an unnecessary cost to consumers. Again, I urge that you hold this measure. Thank you for this opportunity to present this testimony.
