In consideration of HOUSE BILL 760, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT

House Bill 760, House Draft 1 proposes to require lessors of rental motor vehicles to include an option to the lessee in the motor vehicle agreement to contribute a sum to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) for the preservation and protection of the environment. The Department supports this bill that could supplement funding for the Natural Area Reserve Fund and the Land Conservation Fund.

Check-offs are used in 36 states to provide funding for conservation programs. The funds receiving the check-offs support a variety of critical natural area protection and land acquisition programs. Protection and restoration of natural areas provides the dual benefit of ensuring a fully functioning water supply as well as preserving the unique cultural and natural resources that attract visitors to Hawaii.

The visitor industry clearly relies on natural resources. The Koolau Forest Watershed on Oahu is estimated to provide a net present value of \$1-3 billion for ecotourism alone. Forest protection also prevents erosion that muddies beaches, coral reefs, and fisheries. Protection sustains the native plants and animals unique to our islands and important to the Hawaiian culture.

Forests also mitigate climate change effects from rental vehicles by absorbing greenhouse gases. Reducing and preventing deforestation is the mitigation option with the largest and most immediate carbon stock impact in the short term, according to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. In Hawaii, destruction of native forests by hooved animals can reduce or practically eliminate stored carbon. Invasive plants can reduce aboveground biomass by 19-38%. Thus, enormous carbon emissions have already and will continue to occur from forest degradation in Hawaii. Over half of Hawaii's forests have already been lost.

The LLCP protects rare and unique cultural, natural, agricultural, and recreational resources from destruction by funding the acquisition of fee title or conservation easements by nonprofits, counties, and state agencies.

House Bill 760, House Draft 1 supports programs that protect Hawaii's world-renown beauty and the natural resources needed to sustain the visitor industry.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS</u> HB760 HD1, which will allow Hawai'i's visitors to voluntarily contribute towards the maintenance and conservation of our natural and cultural resources.

Numerous studies in Hawai'i and abroad have indicated that visitors to areas of natural beauty and importance are generally more than willing to contribute financially to maintaining the environmental quality of these areas. Given the prominence of our natural environment as a tourism driver, these "user fee" studies thus indicate the existence of a currently untapped revenue source, i.e. visitors who may be willing to contribute financially to the environment they travel thousands of miles to enjoy.

By allowing visitors to voluntarily contribute to our natural environment at the time of their visit, this measure will allow the state to tap into a source of substantial potential revenues for the protection and conservation of our islands' resources. Given the clear need for greater financial investment in our watersheds, coastlines, and other natural and cultural resources, and given the growing strain placed on these resources by the visitor industry, this measure thus provides much-needed revenues from an appropriate source of funds, without burdening taxpayers or our existing tourism industry. In addition, visitors who contribute funds under this measure will know that they played a part in protecting the natural resources and environment that are critical to our tourism economy, and to the welfare of the entire state.

Therefore, the OHA urges the Committees to <u>PASS</u> HB760 HD1. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify on this measure.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB 760 HD1

Aloha Chair Baker, Chair Solomon and Committee Members:

The Sierra Club, Hawai'i Chapter, with over 10,000 dues-paying members and supporters, *supports* the HB 760 HD1. This bill would allow people renting a car the option of making a donation to the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

The islands of Hawai'i are blessed with an abundance of natural resources, diverse ecosystems, and stunning beauty unparalleled elsewhere on the Earth. This is the foundation of Hawai'i's tourism industry. For this reason, we need to better protect Hawai'i's environment, and we should use visitor money to do so.

A survey of 1,000 visitors performed in 1998 by the Sierra Club, Maui Group, found that Hawai'i's environment and pristine natural areas were very important in attracting tourists. Respondents chose open spaces, natural beaches, and undeveloped coastlines as reasons they visit Maui. The survey also revealed that visitors would be willing to pay for the protection of Hawai'i's environment. Over 80% of the sample surveyed said that they would be willing to spend an extra dollar on their hotel room tax (transient accommodations tax – TAT) if it was to be spent on preserving and protecting Hawai'i's natural areas.

The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i is a private non-profit conservation organization dedicated to the preservation of the lands and waters upon which life in these islands depends. The Conservancy has helped to protect nearly 200,000 acres of natural lands in Hawai'i. Today, we actively manage more than 35,000 acres in 11 nature preserves on Maui, Hawai'i, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, and Kaua'i. We also work closely with government agencies, private parties and communities on cooperative land and marine management projects.

The Nature Conservancy supports H.B. 760 HD1, which would allow an optional contribution by rental car customers to the natural resource protection programs of the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

The DLNR's Natural Area Reserve Fund and Land Conservation Fund are the State's primary source of funding for forest and watershed protection, invasive species control, and land preservation across the state. Many of the programs supported by these funds have experienced up to 50% reductions in State funding since 2008 as a result of the weakened economy as well as the growing need for conservation work since invasive pests don't recognize economic cycles. While the optional contribution proposed in H.B. 760 HD1 may not be a major source of revenue for natural resource programs, it should provide an opportunity for more visitors and Hawai'i residents to learn about these worthy programs, appreciate their value, and make a much appreciated and helpful contribution to them.

Dear Chairs Baker and Solomon and Members of the Joint Committees:

We submit this testimony on behalf of EAN Holdings, LLC, operating Enterprise Rent-A-Car, Alamo Rent-A-Car and National Car Rental in Hawaii (collectively referred to as "Enterprise").

Enterprise opposes H.B.760 H.D.1, which requires lessors of rental motor vehicles to include an option to the lessee in the motor vehicle agreement to contribute a sum to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for the preservation and protection of the environment beginning July 1, 2015. While preserving native ecosystems is certainly a worthwhile goal, rental car customers already pay their fair share of supporting Hawaii's infrastructure and natural beauty through the various taxes they already pay. There is no additional nexus to impose this mandate on top of what the rental car companies and its customers already provide. The Department of Land and Natural Resources has indicated that 36 states have a similar check-off system. However, Enterprise operates in nearly every state in the country and there is no other state where Enterprise is required to institute such a check-off system.

Enterprise already offers a voluntary contribution for research to offset carbon emissions in each contract. We feel this is more relevant and that this option should be left to the companies rather than for any particular agency requiring the companies to support their

individual mission. Many missions and many causes could have an equal claim for such treatment. We feel this sets a bad precedent. Our economy is very dependent upon return travelers, and we already impose many costs on our visitors who are voluntary visitors in most cases. Even though the contribution is voluntary, we believe that this suggestion to renters is likely to be offensive to them and to create a bad impression upon people we need and want to return. This requirement imposes additional burdens upon rental car companies that already provide a very significant service to the state in collecting significant fees from the renters of their rental car vehicles. At a minimum, companies such as Enterprise that already provide an environmental check-off should not be required to impose any additional check-off on their rental agreements.

We are concerned that it is becoming too easy to seek support from others when the support should be internal as the department has fundamental resources that it should be able to tap to meet its responsibilities. For the foregoing reasons, we believe this bill should not go forward.
