#### Supporting HB 879 HD 2: Relating to the Hospital Sustainability Program.

The Healthcare Association of Hawaii advocates for its member organizations that span the entire spectrum of health care, including all acute care hospitals, a majority of home health agencies and hospices, as well as long term care facilities and other health care organizations. Our members contribute significantly to Hawaii's economy by employing nearly 20,000 people statewide, delivering quality care to the people of Hawaii. Thank you for this opportunity to testify in support of HB 879 HD 2, which modifies the Hospital Sustainability Program and extends its sunset for one year, to June 30, 2014.

The Legislature created this program last year by enacting Act 217. Recognizing that Medicaid payments were below the actual costs of care, this program increases Medicaid payments to hospitals. The program does that by assessing a fee on hospitals, using the revenue to obtain matching federal Medicaid funds, and returning a majority of the combined amount directly to hospitals.

Non-government hospitals are assessed an annual fee based on their patient revenues. Payment is based on the amount of a hospital's uncompensated care, which consists of nonpayment by uninsured patients and underpayment by Medicaid. As such, the fees and payments are different for every hospital.

This bill is the result of a collaborative effort between the Department of Human Services and the Healthcare Association of Hawaii. It is a bill that benefits Medicaid enrollees because it ensures access to quality care.

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My name is David Okabe, Executive Vice President and Chief Financial Officer for Hawai'i Pacific Health (HPH). HPH is a nonprofit health care system and the state's largest health care provider anchored by its four nonprofit hospitals: Kapi`olani Medical Center for Women & Children, Pali Momi Medical Center, Straub Clinic & Hospital and Wilcox Memorial Hospital on Kauai. HPH is committed to providing the highest quality medical care and service to the people of Hawai'i and the Pacific Region through its four affiliated hospitals, 49 outpatient clinics and service sites, more than 5,400 employees and 1,300 physicians on staff.

HPH is writing in support of HB 879, HD2 which would amend Act 217, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012 to continue the Hospital Sustainability Program by extending the sunset date of the Act, updating the referral dates in the statute, and to revise the funding amount for the hospital sustainability program for fiscal year 2013-2014. This bill represents collaboration between the Department of Human Services and the Healthcare Association of Hawaii.

Recognizing that Medicaid payments were below the actual costs of care, the Hospital Sustainability Program increases Medicaid payments to hospitals by assessing a fee to hospitals, using the revenue to obtain matching federal Medicaid funds, and using the available funds to directly pay hospitals for the uncompensated cost of care provided to patients.

HPH was a participant in the Hospital Sustainability Program in response to the dire Medicaid reimbursement situation that all providers are confronting. HB 879, HD2 will ensure continued timely payments to the hospitals and will ensure that there will be no disruption in the provision of medically necessary services to program recipients.
