HB0896, RELATING TO SALES OF ELECTRONIC SMOKING DEVICES TO PERSONS UNDER 18 YEARS OF AGE

Testimony of Loretta J. Fuddy, A.C.S.W., M.P.H. Director of Health

1 Department's Position: Strong Support

2 Fiscal Implications: None

3 Purpose and Justification: This measure adds electronic smoking devices to tobacco as products that

4 are unlawful to be sold or furnished to and purchased by persons under eighteen years of age, and

5 further requires the additional listing of electronic smoking devices to sales prohibition signage.

6 Electronic smoking devices have become increasingly prevalent and widely available since their

7 introduction to the U.S. market in 2007. They are advertised as technologically advanced and "healthier

8 alternatives" to tobacco products using youth-relevant appeals such as celebrity endorsements,

9 trendy/fashionable imagery, and fruit, candy and/or alcohol flavors.

10 Electronic smoking devices present a compelling introduction to the sensation of smoking by

allowing users, not only to mimic the tactile sensations of smoking, but also actually appear to blow

12 smoke. These devices have the power to promote a physiological addiction to an addictive drug, as well

13 as a psychological habituation to smoking.

Promoting Lifelong Health & Wellness

1 The limited published research about safety, efficacy, or public health impact of electronic smoking devices raises concerns about the product's lack of regulation, safety/quality assurances, and its 2 appeal to youth. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration asserts that the ready availability of electronic 3 smoking devices presents a serious risk of addicting new users, including children and cautions that such 4 devices may contain ingredients that are not safe. Because there is no regulation or quality control by 5 the manufacturers, the nicotine content in electronic smoking device cartridges often does not match the 6 7 advertised or labeled content. A number of states have already passed laws restricting sales to minors. California, Colorado, 8 Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Tennessee, and Indiana prohibit the sale of e-cigarettes to 9 10 minors. The Hawaii Department of Education has just released a memo classifying the possession 11 and/or use of electronic cigarettes as a contraband offense subject to disciplinary actions.

12 The Department of Health strongly supports passage of this measure to prohibit the sale of these 13 devices and to prevent the deleterious effects on the health and safety of Hawaii's youth.
