Chair Dela Cruz, Chair English, and Members of the Committees:

DESCRIPTION:

This resolution requests the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism ("DBEDT") to set up a working group "to study, consider, and recommend ways to reduce the time and cost of shipping goods to Oahu from Molokai, Lanai, and Hana, Maui" ("Working Group"). The Working Group would include, among other government, community, airline industry, and shipping industry representatives, the Chairperson of the Public Utilities Commission ("Commission") or the Chairperson's designee. Specific strategies are listed for the Working Group's consideration, including amendments to existing law, tax reduction or incentive measures, and "any other issue" considered appropriate by the Working Group. Finally, this measure requests a report of findings and recommendations from the Working Group prior to the start of the 2014 Regular Session, and the Working Group would be eliminated June 30, 2014.

POSITION:

While the Commission supports the objective of the Working Group, it believes it would not be appropriate for the Commission to participate as a member. The following comments are submitted for the Committees' consideration.

COMMENTS:

It is the Commission's function and responsibility to adjudicate whether proposed actions affecting a regulated company may result in a rate increase, rate decrease, or change in service. For each of those potential actions to be approved, they must meet a standard that weighs whether each action is just and reasonable and in the public interest. The Working Group findings and/or recommendations may increase or decrease interisland shipping rates or may affect the quality of utility service, therefore, there would be a question of bias and impartiality on behalf of the Commission associated with any participation as part of the Working Group. For this reason, the Commission Would ask the Committee to amend this measure by removing the Commission Chairperson or designee from the Working Group roster. Questions regarding shipping rate structures could be answered by shipping industry members of the Working Group. The Commission can be available as a resource to the Working Group to answer questions limited to its regulatory role and the regulatory process.

Testimony of Roy Catalani, Vice President of Strategic Planning and Government Affairs

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Slom, Chair English, Vice Chair Dela Cruz, and Members of the Senate Committees on Economic Development, Government Operations and Housing and on Transportation and International Affairs:

Young Brothers, Limited (*Young Brothers*) offers these observations on House Concurrent Resolution 204, House Draft 1(*HCR204 HD1*).

HCR204 HD1 requests that the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism establish a working group "to study, consider, and recommend ways to reduce the transport time and cost of shipping goods to Oahu from Molokai, Lanai, and Hana, Maui" and to report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014. To help this Committee in its deliberations on this bill, Young Brothers offers the following observations and background.

On a statewide basis, Young Brothers operates 12 weekly roundtrip port calls per week in a "hub and spoke system" in which Honolulu Harbor operates as the hub. We sail twice weekly to Moloka`i and once weekly to Lāna`i. On *Sunday* night, a Young Brothers barge departs Honolulu and arrives in Kaunakakai on Moloka`i early *Monday* morning (and, like other Young Brothers sailings, sails through the night to arrive in the early morning hours in neighbor island ports in coordination with early morning trucking and delivery schedules). This barge is unloaded Monday morning in Moloka`i (with cargo being available for Moloka`i customers on Monday). By late Monday afternoon, the barge is backloaded with Moloka`i cargo, including agricultural cargo, destined for Honolulu. The vessel departs for a night sail and arrives in Honolulu on *Tuesday* morning.

On Tuesday morning, this Moloka'i cargo is unloaded in Honolulu and made available for Honolulu customers for pick-up (and, if any of the Moloka'i cargo is destined for another neighbor island, it will be loaded onto another barge). During the course of the Tuesday work day, this barge is again loaded with cargo destined for Moloka'i, along with cargo destined for Lāna'i. The barge departs again on *Tuesday* evening, arriving first in Lāna'i at daybreak on *Wednesday* morning. After the Lāna'i cargo is unloaded and cargo outbound from Lāna'i is loaded, the barge then departs later that same day for a Moloka'i arrival on late *Wednesday* afternoon (with cargo to be available to Moloka'i customers on Thursday morning). After the Moloka'i-destined cargo is unloaded, the barge is again backloaded with Moloka'i cargo (on Wednesday afternoon) and sails back to Honolulu for a *Thursday* morning arrival in Honolulu, with cargo being available for pick-up by Honolulu customers on Thursday. Notably, all perishable cargo is stored and transported in temperature-controlled containers in every segment of transportation to retain freshness and product quality.

Prior to 2009, one of the two Young Brothers sailings to Moloka'i included one sailing from O'ahu **to** Moloka'i **via** Maui. In the continuation of work on sailing schedules with the Moloka'i community, particularly the Moloka'i Chamber of Commerce, and also to achieve efficiencies in voyage costs, Young Brother reorganized its Maui County sailing schedules in 2009 (following PUC approval) to include the Moloka'i and Lāna'i sailings described above and to eliminate the sailing triangle that included Honolulu, Kahului and Kaunakakai. The savings resulting from these increased efficiencies were passed on to our customers in lower "less than container load" (*LCL*) rates for Moloka'i and Lāna'i (and these proportionately lower LCL rates are still reflected in Young Brothers' tariff). Notably, with or without these lower LCL rates, service to Moloka'i and Lāna'i is heavily subsidized by other profitable routes and lines of service. This subsidy of costs is made possible by Moloka'i and Lāna'i costs being spread through a larger statewide system of service, with its attendant efficiencies of scale and scope. In addition, local agricultural products (from all islands) receive a 30 to 35-percent discount on rates. We attach an addendum to this testimony setting forth examples of Young Brothers' freight rates applied to various commodities.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of this important measure. The purpose of this measure is to request the Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to establish a working group to study, consider, and recommend ways to reduce the transport time and cost of shipping goods to Oahu from Molokai, Lanai, and Hana, Maui.

I support this measure for the following reasons:

- 1. As the County Council representative from East Maui I can affirm that costs for many goods are significantly more expensive because of the excess cost of transporting to remote locations such as Hana, Keanae and Kipahulu. East Maui only has two small convenience stores for which residents must pay premium prices for household goods and food items.
- 2. Travel from East Maui to key commercial locations can be 4 hours round trip. The travel time can vary depending on traffic, weather, and road conditions. Many East Maui residents do not have vehicles that are capable of that long and sometimes hazardous driveE. East Maui no longer has a rental car agency to provide alternative transportation; Maui Economic Opportunities provides transportation services to kupuna only a couple of times and week; and there is no longer delivery services for those that are confined to their homes.
- 3. Our residents are at a severe disadvantage over the residents within higher population areas and locations that are more accessible for goods and services. This imbalance is not fair to residents of Molokai, Lanai and Hana, because many of these people are life-long residents of these locations and family lineage dates back many generations. They should be rewarded, not punished, for their dedication to heritage, family and their community.

For the foregoing reasons, I support this measure.
