HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE FORMATION OF A TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP LEGISLATIVE RECOMMENDATIONS THAT INCLUDE HEALTH AS A PRIORITY IN LAND USE PLANNING AND TRANSPORTATION DECISIONS.

WHEREAS, obesity is a major health and economic concern for 1 Hawaii and the nation, causing higher medical costs and lower 2 quality of life; and 3 4 WHEREAS, in Hawaii one in three children entering 5 kindergarten is overweight or obese and one in two adults is 6 7 overweight or obese; and 8 WHEREAS obesity-related medical expenditures in Hawaii were 9 10 calculated to be over \$470 million in 2009, and are continuing to rise; and 11 12 WHEREAS, obesity is a complex and multifaceted issue 13 requiring the collaboration of stakeholders in government, non-14 profit, private and health care sectors to create systematic 15 large-scale environmental changes; and 16 17 WHEREAS, in the past two decades, the environments that 18 19 affect opportunities for physical activity have changed drastically and obesity prevention initiatives need to focus on 20 creating environments that provide opportunities for physical 21 22 activity; and 23 WHEREAS, due to the significant effect of the built 24 environment on health and the direct effect that transportation 25 decisions have on land use and community design, Hawaii must 26 work on transforming the current transportation and land use 27 planning systems to achieve transportation and land use policies 28 29 that promote health; 30 WHEREAS, all levels of government (federal, state, and 31 local) have important responsibilities in transportation and 32

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1 land use planning. From zoning regulations to the construction 2 of transportation systems, government decisions regarding land 3 use have a significant impact on public health; and 4 5 WHEREAS, public health practitioners have a critical role 6 to play to achieve this transformation; and 7 8 WHEREAS, discussion between public health practitioners and 9 all levels of government needs to take place to ensure coordination and collaboration between transportation and land 10 use planning stakeholders; now, therefore, 11 12 13 BE IT RESOLVED that collaboration between state agencies is 14 encouraged when developing policies that impact environmental 15 factors that contribute to poor health and inequities; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is 18 requested to establish a Healthy Community Design Task Force 19 tasked with: 20 Developing legislative recommendations that include 21 (1)improved health as a priority in land use planning and 22 transportation decisions, including, but not limited 23 to creating policies and funding for bicycle and 24 pedestrian facilities on all appropriate streets, 25 roads and highways statewide and adding health as a 26 consideration in land use planning policies and 27 28 decisions; 29 (2)Identification of agencies with funding or regulatory resources that can influence transportation and land 30 31 use planning; 32 Creation of goals and performance metrics for outcomes (3) 33 including but not limited to health and obesity; Creation of an action plan to achieve those metrics, 34 (4)the action plan should address changes needed in laws, 35 policies, procedures, agency funding and regulatory 36 37 processes; and Identification of synergistic initiatives and 38 (5)39 organizations for successful implementation of the action plan, including, but not limited to Aging in 40 Place, reduction of Hawaii's dependence on imported 41 fuel, mitigation of Hawaii's congestion problem 42 43 particularly with respect to Honolulu, climate change, and safe routes to school; and 44

Subject: House Concurrent Resolution No. 22 Relating to a Health Task Force

The Department of Planning and Permitting has **comments** on House Concurrent Resolution No. 22, which would establish a task force to look at health as a priority in land use planning and transportation decisions.

We support healthy lifestyles and recognize that public sector planning and decisions do influence the built environment and can contribute or detract from promoting good health. Our rapid transit system not only reduces dependence on the use of private cars, but reduces ambient air quality, creates safer streets, and encourages more walking.

However, we are not convinced that convening a relatively large number of people, over a somewhat broadly defined concern is the best use of limited time and resources. The Department of Health is consulted on all major land use decisions – from amendments to policies in the Oahu General Plan and regional plans, to impacts of specific land use projects. Moreover, every environmental assessment and impact statement is an opportunity for the Department of Health to provide comments on project impacts related to public mobility, physical activity and obesity.

Rather than convening a task force at the outset, we suggest that the Department of Health develop specific recommendations on how existing plans, standards and project review criteria can be improved. Applicable agencies and other stakeholders can review these recommendations and take appropriate action. If helpful, a larger discussion forum, such as a task force, could be convened to resolve outstanding issues. Not only would this alternate process be more efficient, but it could allow for more time on issues needing more widespread attention. The Honorable Ryan I.
