Testimony on: HCR243 URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO CREATE A DROUGHT PLAN FOR MOLOKAI AND IMPROVE THE MOLOKAI IRRIGATION SYSTEM. March 24, 2014 11:00 AM Conference Room 312

Aloha Chair Wooley, Vice Chair Onishi and Members of the Committee:

I am Christopher Manfredi, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,832 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interest of our diverse agricultural community.

HFB stands in strong support of HCR243, with amendments urging the Department of Agriculture to address drought mitigation needs on Molokai.

Molokai is one of the most drought prone areas in the State. The Department of Agriculture is currently undertaking the completion of the Agricultural Water Use and Development Plan that is part of the Hawaii Water Plan as required by the Water Code and specifies the current and future water needs of agriculture. The section of the Water Code referencing this requirement is in HRS 174C-31(e):

Thereafter, each county shall prepare a water use and development plan and the appropriate state agency shall prepare the state water projects plan.

(e) The department of agriculture shall prepare a state agricultural water use and development plan for agricultural uses in the State in accordance with chapter 167 and this chapter, and subsequently modify and update the plan as necessary. The state agricultural water use and development plan shall include but not be limited to a master irrigation inventory plan that shall:

(1) Inventory public and private irrigation water systems;

(2) Identify the extent of rehabilitation needed for each system;

(3) Identify sources of water used by agricultural operations and particularly those on lands identified and designated as important agricultural lands under part III of chapter 205;

(4) Identify current and future water needs for agricultural operations and particularly those on lands identified and designated as important agricultural lands under part III of chapter 205;

- (5) Subsidize the cost of repair and maintenance of the systems;
- (6) Establish criteria to prioritize the rehabilitation of the systems;
- (7) Develop a five-year program to repair the systems; and
- (8) Set up a long-range plan to manage the systems.

As highlighted above the AWUDP addresses the needs identified in this resolution. A separate review will require additional staff time that should be focused on the Plan.

HFBF, therefore, respectfully requests that the Resolution be amended to specifically request that the needs of Molokai homesteaders and MIS be addressed in the Plan and the progress of such work be reported to the Legislature. In so doing, this will not be another unfunded mandate straining the resources within the HDOA.

Suggested language is as follows.

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty—seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2014, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Agriculture is urged to specifically address the needs of Hawaiian homestead farmers and other water users have requested for the Molokai Irrigation System in the Agricultural Water Use and Development Plan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture is requested to provide a report on the status of the AWUDP, specifically addressing the needs of the Molokai homesteaders and the MIS system to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015;

The AWUDP is important to all of our farmers and ranchers. The Counties are waiting for it to include in their Water Plans. We respectfully request **your support of this measure with the amendments stated above.**
