Comments to HCR 82/HR 56, REQUESTING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO PROVIDE MORE TRANSPARENCY IN ITS MEETINGS

Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments to HCR 82/HR 56 which requests that the Board of Education (the "*Board*") consider publishing board members email addresses; ensure greater public input by holding public meetings after regular work hours or on weekends when possible to accommodate people that may not be available to attend the meetings held earlier in the day; hold its general business meeting in each county at least once a year; and publish more detailed and specific agenda items; as well as an email address of an appropriate contact person to ensure clarity and transparency.

The appointed Board since inception has placed a high priority upon stakeholder and community engagement. We spent 18 months engaging various stakeholder communities statewide in the development of the Board/Department of Education ("*BOE/DOE*") strategic plan. We have conducted 15 evening community meetings throughout the state which is nearly double the number of meetings required by law. Our nine volunteer Board members have visited over 200 schools and attended over 400 community stakeholder meetings throughout the state. Additionally, the Board has held 180 committee and board meetings. All meeting have been open to the public and the meeting agenda allows for public testimony at the beginning of the meetings and prior to action items on the agenda.

The board has expanded the opportunity for the public to send emails to the Board via the website as well as make phone calls to the Board office. All complaints are shared with all Board members and require a response within specific guidelines. Additionally, the BOE/DOE established an independent "hotline" for members of the public to anonymously express concerns. These are all recorded and an audit trail has been established. Also, to allow for concerns or recommendations to be expressed in private from parents, employees and general public, our Board has established "chair office hour". These times are available after every General Business Meeting (2 times per month) and typically from 4:30-5:30 p.m. which allows for parents and employees to come after work. Additionally, we have added to the permanent Board agenda, a monthly Complex Area presentation with specific metrics and performance

data so that each Board meeting allocates time for our 15 community complexes to specifically discuss their individual issues with the Complex Area Superintendent ("*CAS*"). This allows any community member to come and testify on any subject within their school complex with the CAS and senior DOE staff as well as the Board members present.

We are in the process of reviewing all of our Board policies and are in the process of first seeking public input prior to any revisions. A good example, is a review of policy 2105 which concerns our Hawaiian Immersion program. In order to gain community input on this important subject the Board established a stakeholder working group and has conducted and attended over 40 community meetings and school visits statewide. Sex education is another example of where recently the Board dedicated the bulk of a Board meeting time to seek public input before reviewing changes to our current sex education policies. Again, a public stakeholder meeting is being formed by the DOE to ensure public input is considered.

Our DOE/BOE strategic plan specifically addresses goals and requirements for community engagement. The Superintendent's contract goals address a requirement for community engagement. Our Board fully understands we are the public's voice and therefore, have a duty to proactively seek that voice. We welcome the opportunity to improve public engagement in meaningful and productive ways.

Currently, under consideration is the televising of our Board meetings at certain times per quarter, creating public forums in which there is dialogue between the community and the Board, and increasing the number of community/complex meetings which are held within the community during the evening hours and adding a separate time for meeting staff to discuss their issues.

The Honorable Chair Roy Takumi, The Honorable Vice-Chair Takashi Ohno and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii State Teachers Association (HSTA) **supports HCR 82/HR 56, Relating to the Board of Education.**

HSTA is the exclusive representative of more than 13,500 public and charter schoolteachers statewide. As the state affiliate of the 3.2 million members of the National Education Association, the HSTA believes that an active, working relationship with the BOE will help HSTA members to function effectively to protect our rights, our interests and help us to advocate for better policies that affect public education.

It is clear that this Board of Education has done very little since 2010 to advance public education and include all educational stakeholders. For our schools and our children to be as successful as they can be, public participation must be part of the educational process and the core democratic principles of transparency, accountability government must be respected.

For example, neighbor islands are still excluded in the discussion to public meetings. BOE meetings never start on time and never end on time, consistently holding meetings that last well over 2 hours.

It has also been difficult to submit testimony as the agenda items are very vague and when seeking clarification. Board staff has admitted that even they do not understand the topic on the agenda.

HSTA continues to advocate for an elected Board of Education. We believe in democracy where the people can select who they want and have the opportunity to vote for people who want to serve the public.

Dear Chair Takumi and Members of the Education Committee:

Support for HCR82 and HR56

Thank you for hearing these two resolutions on the Board of Education. My name is Karen Ginoza. I am President of FACE Oahu. Faith Action for Equity (FACE) is a grassroots, interfaith organization driven by a deep spiritual commitment to improve the quality of life for our members and all the people of Hawaii. Through our common values and collective power, we address the root causes of challenges facing our community. FACE is the only organization of its kind in Hawaii.

On behalf of FACE Oahu as well as President of the Hawaii State Teachers Association (HSTA), I have attended many meetings of the elected and appointed Board of Education. One significant difference between the two boards is the lack of access and voices of teachers and the general public. The current school board does not allow public testimony if the item is not on the agenda. It is very difficult to know what the agenda items are since the agenda is released to the public with very little details. We do not have access to the documents that the board members have.

Last year, I requested to speak to the board but was never given the opportunity to present a report completed by Faith Action for Community Equity (FACE). I was finally given a few minutes in a public forum before a few board members to share the report.

Under the appointed school board, the public is not given the opportunity to submit items for consideration by the board. Change will only take place when a new governor is elected since it is the governor who appoints the school board. Do we have to wait four to eight years to bring democracy back to the school system? Parents, teachers, and the public need to have their voices heard. It is only when we all work together that we will be able to improve education.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify. I strongly urge your support for HCR82 and HR56. I hope this can be part of state law next year.

Chair Takumi and members of the Committee:

I am Marcia Linville, speaking in support of HR56.

I have a MLS and have been a librarian for over thirty years working in Federal, State, City, and Special Libraries. I have served as president of the Librarians Association of Hawaii, Section Head of the Hawaii Library Association, and as Agency Council Head (that's Chief Steward) for Unit 13, Professionals DOE, HGEA, for almost 20 years. I have also served as the Democratic Party's Legislative Liaison for Education, and presently serve on the Board of League of Women Voters. I have a Phi Theta Kappa in Early Childhood Development from the U H at HCC. I have also worked as Resource Teacher in the schools. At the request of Marian Saunders originally, and for most of these positions at one time or another over the last 40 years, I have attended Board of Education Business Meetings. I am testifying as a concerned citizen on the basis of that experience.

I, like many people have become concerned over the lack of information flow and transparency in the present appointed Board of Education. The concern stems from the fact that they are appointed. Unlike you, they have never had to go to the public, tell them who you are, what you hope to do in the position, and ask them what they want from the holders of that position. And you must admit, it is so much easier to do the public's work if you don't have to talk to the public. That is essentially what the Board is doing. Input from the public is allowed by the Board only on what the Board wants to hear, when the Board wants to hear it. It's much commented on Community Meetings are attended primarily by DOE staff. At the Honolulu meeting, there were only 5 people who stood up when community members were asked to stand. Me and two friends were 3 of them. At the Hilo meeting only 2 community members stood. So, no, the Board is not hearing from the Community. When one of those people asked how she could get an item on the agenda for discussion, she was told, "You can't". When a teacher tried to bring the problem of the lack of qualified school librarians to the Boards attention, by the ingenious method of buying a cake and having it inscribed in frosting, someone came down with a knife and cut it out. When the public has tried to bring problems to the Boards attention, by legislative action, we have been stopped. The public input item on the agenda which was a working part of every Board Meeting for the last 40 years has been eliminated.

The Board has done a remarkably fine job in organizing the DOE Administration. It is more efficient and productive, and probably more ethical, and they are to be congratulated. But it has done this by using a business paradigm, in which the Superintendant is seen as the CEO, the Complex Area Supes are seen as Middle Management, and the teachers are seen as retailers, with the students as consumers. But the education of the children of Hawaii is not a business. And the ultimate consumers are all the people of the state. They need to be heard.

And while the Administration is remarkably improved, teachers, parents and children seem to have been forgotten, and forgive me, but it was my understanding that the main purpose of the schools was to serve the needs of the children through the work of the teachers.

HR 56 will go a small way toward making that possible. I ask for your support Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this matter
