## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF SEPARATING THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SYSTEM AMONG THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT MANOA, THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES, AND THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII-WEST OAHU AND THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO.

1 WHEREAS, the University of Hawaii system is governed by a 2 single board of regents and consists of the University of Hawaii 3 at Manoa, the community colleges, the University of Hawaii-West 4 Oahu, and the University of Hawaii at Hilo; and 5

6 WHEREAS, under Article X, section 6, of the state 7 constitution, the Legislature finds that it is a matter of 8 statewide concern whether the University of Hawaii system should 9 be separated into three systems among the University of Hawaii 10 at Manoa, the community colleges, and the University of Hawaii-11 West Oahu and the University of Hawaii at Hilo; and 12

WHEREAS, the University of Hawaii at Manoa was founded in 14 1907 and is the flagship campus of the University of Hawaii 15 system, and as a destination of choice, students and faculty 16 come from across the nation and the world to take advantage of 17 the University of Hawaii at Manoa's unique research 18 opportunities, diverse community, and nationally-ranked Division 19 I athletics program; and

WHEREAS, as one of only thirty-two institutions nationwide to hold the distinction of being a land-grant, sea-grant, and space-grant research institution, the University of Hawaii at Manoa is ranked in the top thirty public universities in federal research funding for engineering and science, and forty-ninth overall by the National Science Foundation; and

28 WHEREAS, classified by the Carnegie Foundation as having 29 "very high research activity," the University of Hawaii at Manoa 30 is known for its pioneering research in such fields as 31 oceanography, astronomy, Pacific Islands and Asian area studies, 32 linguistics, cancer research, and genetics; and



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1 2 WHEREAS, the goals and missions of the University of Hawaii 3 at Manoa, as a research university, are different from the community colleges, the University of Hawaii-West Oahu, and the 4 University of Hawaii at Hilo; and 5 6 WHEREAS, in contrast, the community colleges provide open-7 door access to affordable, high-quality education through a 8 variety of programs from career and technical education to a 9 liberal arts education; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the community colleges are already a "system 12 within a system," consisting of seven colleges, including Hawaii 13 Community College, Honolulu Community College, Kapiolani 14 Community College, Kauai Community College, Leeward Community 15 College, Maui College, and Windward Community College; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the community colleges also include educational 18 19 centers serving Oahu, Hawaii, Kauai, Maui, Molokai, and Lanai; 20 and 21 WHEREAS, the goals and mission of the community college 22 system are different from the University of Hawaii-West Oahu, 23 24 the University of Hawaii at Hilo, and the University of Hawaii at Manoa; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, separation of the University of Hawaii at Manoa and the community colleges would lead to greater efficiency and 28 better management of the university system overall; and 29 30 WHEREAS, such a separation could ultimately require the 31 establishment of three separate university systems, each with 32 its own boards of regents, specifically, one for the University 33 of Hawaii at Manoa, one for the community colleges, and one for 34 the University of Hawaii-West Oahu and the University of Hawaii 35 at Hilo; and 36 37 WHEREAS, it is envisioned that the University of Hawaii at 38 Manoa, as the State's only research university, will be 39 financially self-sustaining and receive limited state funding; 40 41 and 42 WHEREAS, it is likewise envisioned that the community 43 colleges, the University of Hawaii-West Oahu, and the University 44



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of Hawaii at Hilo, as the State's teaching institutions, will 1 continue to be financially supported by state funds; now, 2 therefore, 3 4 5 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 6 Session of 2014, that the Board of Regents of the University of 7 Hawaii is requested to study the feasibility of separating the 8 9 University of Hawaii system among the University of Hawaii at Manoa, the community colleges, and the University of Hawaii-West 10 Oahu and the University of Hawaii at Hilo; and 11 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Regents is 14 strongly encouraged to retain the services of an independent educational expert to conduct the study; and 15 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Regents is requested to submit a report of its findings and 18 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 19 Legislature not later than twenty days prior to the convening of 20 the Regular Session of 2015; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 23 Resolution be transmitted to the members of the Board of Regents 24 of the University of Hawaii, the President of the University of 25 Hawaii, the Chancellor of the University of Hawaii at Manoa, the 26 Vice President for Community Colleges, the Chancellor of the 27 University of Hawaii-West Oahu, and the Chancellor of the 28 University of Hawaii at Hilo. 29 30 31

HCR 147/HR 105 – REQUESTING THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF SEPARATING THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SYSTEM AMONG THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT MANOA, THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES, AND THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII-WEST OAHU AND THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO.

Chair Choy, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and members of the House Committee on Higher Education:

The University of Hawai'i (UH) respectfully opposes HCR 147 and HR 105 which requests the Board of Regents of the University of Hawai'i to study the feasibility of separating the UH system among the UH Mānoa, the Community Colleges and the UH West O'ahu and the UH Hilo.

As a system of campuses with varying missions (research, regional comprehensive and community colleges), we provide unique opportunities to the students of Hawai'i. We provide multiple entrance and exit points for students to complete their degrees. Students may choose to start their education at a two-year or four-year campus. We have built pathways for students who start at a community college and moves to a four-year campus to complete a bachelor's degree. Students who earn an associate of arts degree from a community college are automatically admitted to a four-year campus. We have articulation agreements for students who complete an associate of science degree (generally focused on career and technical education) to move seamlessly into a bachelor's degree program at our four-year campuses. We have a common student information system that allows students at a four-year campus to register at any community college and all community college students may register for courses at any other community college. Many other data systems--from human resources to purchasing--are system-wide, allowing for economies of scale and improved reporting.

The vision of a self-sustaining University of Hawai'i at Mānoa would require a significant increase of tuition. Currently undergraduate resident tuition at UHM is about \$9,000 per year. In the years 2010-2012, tuition accounted for an average of 42% of the cost of education. Tuition would need to be increased by approximately 136% to cover the full cost of education. For undergraduates, this would mean an increase in tuition to more than \$19,000.

Separation into three higher education systems would lead to less efficiency. Providing support for three separate boards would require additional staff support. Each system would need to manage its own student information and IT systems, institutional research functions, capital improvements, etc. Transfer across campuses will be more complex as articulation will be campus by campus, rather than coordinated by the system administration.

The use of an independent educational expert to conduct this study will require funding during a time of scarce resources.

Dear Chair Choy, Vice Chair Ichiyama and Members of the Committee,

The General Contractors Association of Hawaii (GCA) is an organization comprised of approximately six hundred (600) general contractors, subcontractors, and construction related firms. The GCA was established in 1932 and is the largest construction association in the State of Hawaii. The GCA's mission is to represent its members in all matters related to the construction industry, while improving the quality of construction and protecting the public interest.

House Concurrent Resolution 147 is requesting that the Board of Regents of the University of Hawaii study the feasibility of separating the University of Hawaii system among the University of Hawaii at Manoa, the community colleges, and the University of Hawaii-West Oahu and the University of Hawaii at Hilo.

The University of Hawaii college system is unique in its geographical separation of the university and community college campuses, which is different from other state universities. This geographical separation along with the multiple administrations of the University and community colleges serving Oahu, Hawaii, Kauai, Maui, Molokai and Lanai results in increased costs to sustain each campus. This Resolution provides the Board of Regents an opportunity to consider separating the University of Hawaii's four year colleges from the various community colleges to provide a more focused direction for each of the university campuses.
