MISSION: The mission of the Judiciary, as an independent branch of government, is to administer justice in an impartial, efficient, and accessible manner in accordance with the law. As the third branch of Hawaii's State Government, it is invested by Article VI of the State Constitution with powers coequal to those of the Legislative and Executive Branches.

Within the Judiciary, the major program categories are court operations and support services. The programs in the court operations category serve to safeguard the rights and interests of persons by assuring an equitable and expeditious judicial process. These include the Courts of Appeal (JUD 101); and the First, Second, Third, and Fifth Circuits (JUD 310, 320, 330, and 350, respectively). Programs in the support services category enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of the judicial system by providing the various courts with administrative services such as fiscal control and direction of operations and personnel, and fall under the title of Administration (JUD 601). Within Administration are the Offices of the Administrative and Deputy Administrative Director of the Courts, and four departments – Intergovernmental and Community Relations, Policy and Planning, Support Services, and Human Resources. Further details on the functions and activities of the programs in each of the categories can be found in Table 1.

ECONOMIC IMPACT: The Judiciary recognizes that the economy and overall economic outlook for Hawai'i have improved somewhat from the devastating effects of the last three years. However, the economic and revenue conditions, and the actions taken as a result of those conditions, had severe effects on the Judiciary – that is, on its funding situation, on its employees, and on its ability to provide complete, timely services to its clientele and to the public. Specifically, between FY 2009 and FY 2013, the Legislature reduced the Judiciary's budget base by 10.3%, or \$15.5 million; and eliminated 79 vacant positions, or 4% of the Judiciary's authorized permanent staffing, although it did provide 22 new positions in FY 2010 for Kapolei and 15 positions in FY 2013, mainly for security at the Detention Home and for staffing the Community Service Sentencing Programs on the neighbor islands. As a result, the Judiciary had to take various cost cutting measures, including significantly reducing expenditures for electricity (although overall utility costs have now increased due to significant electric, water, and sewage rate increases), purchase of service (POS) contracts, guardian ad litem/legal counsel services, per diem judges, overtime, repair and maintenance, travel, temporary hire positions, forms/supplies/printing, and other miscellaneous items. Further affecting employees and Judiciary operations were the two-day-per-month furloughs in effect for most of FY 2010 and all of FY 2011, as well as the 5% pay reduction in State government employee wages imposed for FYs 2012 and 2013.

Although the furloughs ended almost 18 months ago, the impact of the budget and personnel reductions that occurred is still being felt throughout the Judiciary, especially considering that the Judiciary has no control over its workload and has to now accommodate that workload with less financial resources and people. Taken together, these conditions resulted in (1) justice being delayed as cases and hearings sometimes took longer to get scheduled, heard, and resolved; and (2) the elimination or reduction of important services being provided by or through the Judiciary. These conditions continue to linger to a certain extent, as positions and funding have not been restored and as the caseload continues to increase. For example, the number of pending civil cases at the end of FY 2012, as compared to the end of FY 2008, had increased by 151% in the District Courts and 70% in the Circuit Courts (if we just compare FY 2011 and FY 2012, the increase was 14% and 29% in the District and Circuit Courts, respectively). The Judiciary's criminal and civil caseload (defined as the number of cases pending at the beginning of the fiscal year plus all the new cases filed during that year) in its Circuit and District Courts has increased over the last three

years, sometimes significantly, in all instances. Specifically, between FY 2010 and FY2012, the Circuit Court and District Court criminal caseloads went from 17,220 to 17,264 cases and from 94,479 to 99,443 cases, respectively, while the Circuit Court and District Court civil caseloads went from 37,251 to 45,901 cases and from 60,575 to 68,494 cases, respectively.

As mentioned above, the budget situation resulted in the Judiciary reducing funding for POS contracts; actual POS contract expenditures decreased by almost \$3.6 million (30%) between FY 2009 and FY 2012. These types of contracts involve the purchase of assessment and/or treatment services for substance abuse, child sex abuse, and mental health, as well as domestic violence (DV) emergency shelter services, juvenile client and family services, victim impact classes, individual/group counseling, and more. Portions of some of these programs/services were eliminated while others were significantly reduced. Cuts severely impacted treatment courts and resulted in fewer services being available and fewer clients served, and longer waits to access services resulting in less adherence to program goals and a slow-down in admittance. For example, between FY 2009 and FY 2012, expenditures for DV with Domestic Violence Action Center on Oahu decreased by 32% and with Child and Family Services on the Big Island by 36%; for substance abuse treatment for adults with Aloha House on Maui by 85% and for juveniles with Maui Youth and Family Services by 75%; for residential and shelter treatment services with Salvation Army on the Big Island by 48%; for juvenile client and family services with Parents and Children Together on Oahu by 32%; and for in-community service and alternative education programs at Palama Settlement on Oahu by 35%. If further budget reductions or other conditions cause the Judiciary to have make further cuts in its POS contracts, many of which serve its specialty courts, the long-term effect to the State would likely be vastly increased costs to the prison, welfare, law enforcement, social services systems, and judicial communities.

PERFORMANCE MEASUREMENT: In spite of this increased caseload referred to earlier, the median age of a case at termination has dropped between FY 2011 and FY 2012 – from 300 to 260 days for Circuit Court criminal cases, 100 to 99 days for District Court criminal cases, 375 to 359 days for Circuit Court civil cases, and 106 days to 90 days for District Court civil cases. It is also interesting to compare the median time to disposition of a case by circuit for FY 2009 (before the budget and personnel reduction), FY2011 (budget reduction, personnel reduction, and furloughs in full effect), and FY 2012 (post furloughs). For First Circuit, the median time went from 265 to 302 to 288 days for the three fiscal years for criminal cases, and from 393 to 421 to 404 days for civil cases. For Second Circuit, the median time was 231 to 297 to 249 days for criminal cases and 294 to 307 to 308 days for civil cases. For Third Circuit, criminal cases went from 301 to 321 to 251 days and civil cases went from 298 to 346 to 302 days. Lastly, for Fifth Circuit, criminal cases went from 307 to 273 to 261 days and civil cases from 400 to 300 to 399 days. Generally, the median time to disposition in days increased during the furlough period and came back down in FY 2012, although not quite to FY 2009 levels. The clearance rate (number of new filings divided by number of cases terminated or disposed) is another performance measure that can be looked at. The Intermediate Court of Appeals had a disposition rate of 97% in FY 2012 as compared to 76% in FY 2011, and the clearance rate for Circuit, Family, and District Court cases (excluding parking cases) in FY 2012 was 73.2%, 101.4%, and 96.4% as compared to 81.2%, 97.3%, and 98.1%, respectively, in FY 2012. FY 2012 Circuit Court rates were adversely affected by the large increase in filings for foreclosure cases that had not yet been heard and disposed of at year end.

FEDERAL FUNDS: The Judiciary is unaware of and has not identified any programs that may lose federal funds under the Federal Budget Control Act sequester.

BUDGET REQUEST: In late July each year, the Budget Office prepares and distributes a Budget Instruction package to its programs, requesting them to provide their budget requests and associated write-ups to the Budget Office by early September. The Chief Justice and Administrative Director of the Courts are also asked to provide information as to any specific items or other guidance that the Budget Office might want to focus on or consider. Once the budget support packages are received from the programs, the Budget Office reviews them, requests further information from the programs as necessary, and then makes a preliminary determination as to which requests are supportable, justified, and the Judiciary should go forward with. These requests, along with those not recommended, are reviewed with the Administrative Director and the Chief Justice and a final decision is made as to which items should be part of the Judiciary's budget request. The programs prioritize their requests when they submit them to the Budget Office. However, once the final decision is made as to which budget request items to submit to the Legislature, the Budget Office, in conjunction with the Administrative Director of the Courts and the Chief Justice and a final decision is made as to which budget request items to submit to the Legislature, the requests Judiciary-wide.

With regard to our budget requests for the biennium, we are well aware of the "fiscal cliff" facing the nation and its possible effects on Hawai'i, the State's unfunded pension and other post-employment benefit liabilities, the need for and potential costs associated with various State information technology initiatives, and the need to start recapitalizing the Emergency Budget and Reserve and Hawai'i Hurricane Relief Funds. We are also quite mindful of the many competing demands for the limited resources available. Accordingly, the Judiciary has tried to be very prudent in its biennium budget request.

Our budget requests seek to properly and fairly compensate our employees for their work and for the services they provide to the community and the public as a whole. Therefore, our two priority requests, which together total \$8.6 million, are to provide funding to cover the restoration of salaries to the levels prior to the five percent pay cut experienced by all Judiciary employees in FYs 2012 and 2013, and to restore judges' salaries to the legislatively mandated pay levels set by the 2006 Commission on Salaries. Another very important request is for \$1.1 million to move from Honolulu and lease space in Kapolei for 81 employees in the Juvenile Client Services Branch (i.e., Juvenile Intake and Probation Services, Girls Court, Juvenile Drug Court, and Family Drug Court). Having this Branch in Kapolei will improve communication and coordination among Family Court divisions as they will all be in geographical proximity of each other, will eliminate travel time (lost time) between Honolulu and Kapolei, result in workers being more productive and efficient and in spending more quality time with juveniles and their families, and improve morale and performance by reducing stress and fatigue. Moving will also free up the second floor space in the Circuit Court Building in Honolulu for additional courtrooms and related offices. Also, much like the Executive Branch and its need to begin recapitalizing its Emergency and Hurricane Funds, the Judiciary likewise needs to begin restoring funds for its POS contracts so it can better serve those in need of assessment, treatment, counseling, and shelter services. To that end, the Judiciary has two requests, one each in the First and Third Circuits, which together seek funding in excess of \$600K as a first step in this restoration process. Lastly, additional funding and permanent positions are being requested in such areas as Girls Court; Project HOPE (Hawaii's Opportunity Probation with Enforcement); a Capital Improvement Specialist for the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) to help with construction of two new courthouses and all the other major CIP projects for which the Judiciary has received funding; two positions for the Community Service Sentencing Program on Maui so the Program can be fully implemented; a fiscal clerk in the Courts of Appeal Fiscal Office; two bailiffs for courts on the Big Island; forensic interview specialists on each island for the Children's Justice Center; new x-ray machines at court locations on Oahu to protect court staff, court users, and visitors; and for increased utility costs in Kapolei. In total, the Judiciary is requesting 40 new positions, of which 20 are conversions from budgeted

temporary to budgeted permanent, and additional funding of \$10.8 million and \$11.5 million in FYs 2014 and 2015, respectively.

In the special fund area, \$1 million in additional Indigent Legal Assistance Fund (ILAF) expenditure ceiling is being requested to accommodate the significant increase in revenues expected due to Act 180, SLH 2011 provisions that increased surcharges on January 1, 2012, and will further increase such charges on January 1, 2014, for indigent legal fees to provide low and moderate income residents with additional access to legal services.

CIP requirements remain a major item of concern as the Judiciary's infrastructure continues to age and deteriorate, and as the population served and corresponding demand for services provided by the Judiciary keep increasing. Therefore, the Judiciary's CIP request for the biennium focuses on funding for construction of a new Judiciary Court Complex in Kona and District Court Facility in Wahiawa, renovations in Kaahumanu Hale (the Circuit Court Building on Oahu) primarily related to spaces vacated by the planned Family Court move to Kapolei, and two safety related projects for Hoapili Hale (the Circuit Court Building on Maui) – structural repairs and replacement/upgrade of the carbon monoxide monitoring and ducting system. CIP planning funding has also been included to begin the process to provide a juvenile services center at the former site of the juvenile detention facility on Alder Street, along with the existing status offender shelter. This facility is vital to ensuring the continuum of services necessary to provide for Hawaii's juveniles exhibiting behaviors that could potentially lead to more serious problems with the law as they grow older and become adults.

In sum, the Judiciary recognizes the State still has important fiscal concerns even as the economy and revenues improve. Our total general fund budget request is approximately \$145.3 million in FY 2014 and \$146.1 million in FY 2015 which is about \$11 million more than our current budget base, but \$8.6 million or more than 75% of this \$11 million relates to restoration of salaries for Judiciary employees. We believe that the additional \$2.4 million is a relatively small amount to enhance court and client services; ensure the protection of the public, employees, and clients alike; continue our emphasis on access to justice; and provide for employee training, productivity, and morale concerns and needs.

This concludes the overview section of our testimony. It should be noted that the 20 tables and the organizational charts requested by the December 14, 2012 Budget Briefing Instructions follow this overview section.
