Informational Budget Briefing

Chair Ige, Vice Chair Kidani and Members of the Committee. Thank you for this opportunity to testify on my department's budget.

Today, I will review our DBEDT programs, agencies and line items – and have asked all appropriate Division Managers and Agency Directors to be available with me today to answer any questions you may have.

Mission Statement

DBEDT seeks to achieve a Hawaii economy that embraces innovation and is globally competitive, dynamic and productive, providing opportunities for all Hawaii's citizens.

In particular, DBEDT serves as an advocate for renewable energy development, a resource for analytic data, and a facilitator for export business. DBEDT also fosters planned community development, creates affordable workforce housing units in high-quality living environments, and promotes innovation sector job growth.

DBEDT works with the legislature, the private sector, and the community to develop strategies and policies that are aligned with the Governor's New Day in Hawaii plan, and implements these strategies in a transparent and collaborative process.

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Hawaii Economic Conditions

Based on the most recent development in the national and global economy, the performance of Hawaii's tourism industry, the labor market conditions in the State, and growth of personal income and tax revenues, DBEDT expects continued positive growth in Hawaii economy in 2013 and 2014.

During the first eleven months of 2012:

- Statewide unemployment rate averaged 6.1 percent, a decrease of 0.6 of a percentage point from the same period last year.
- Hawaii's economy gained 1.5 percent or 9,000 non-agricultural wage and salary jobs compared to the same period of 2011. Job gain was due to increased jobs in the private sector; the government sector kept the same number of jobs during the first 11 months of 2012 as those in the same period a year ago. Leading the job gain were Food Services and Drinking Places (added 3,000 jobs or 5.2 percent); followed by Accommodation (added 1,950 jobs or 5.5 percent); Retail Trade (added 1,450 jobs or 2.2 percent); and Transportation, Warehousing, and Utilities (added 1,050 jobs or 3.9 percent).
- State General Fund Tax revenues increased \$552.8 million or 13.0 percent; General Excise and Use Tax (GET) collections increased \$236.9 million or 9.9 percent; Individual Income Tax collections increased \$164.7 million or 12.4 percent; and Transient Accommodations Tax (TAT) collections increased \$37.8 million or 13.4 percent compared with the same period last year.
- Total visitor arrivals by air increased 656,148 or 9.9 percent from that of 2011, while visitor expenditures totaled \$12.9 billion, up 19.2 percent over the same period a year ago.
- The total value of private building authorizations increased \$697.4 million or 40.4 percent.
- The number of existing units sold on Oahu was up 8.6 percent for single family homes and up 9.0 percent for condominiums, respectively, compared to the same period last year. The median price for existing single family homes on Oahu was \$625,000, up 9.6 percent from the same period last year; and the median price for existing condominiums on Oahu was \$315,000, up 4.1 percent from the same period last year.
- Construction jobs increased 0.2 percent from the same period of 2011.

Nominal personal income (not adjusted for inflation) increased \$2,154.7 million or 3.7 percent in the first three quarters of 2012 compared to the same period of 2011. Wage and salary

disbursements (which accounted for about 50 percent of total personal income) increased \$873.7 million or 3.0 percent during the first three quarters of 2012.

Highlights

Another key area of growth and activity in Hawaii's economy was clean energy.

Currently, Hawaii generates about 12 percent of its energy from renewable sources such as wind, solar, geothermal and biofuels, and is well on its way toward reaching its RPS benchmark of 15% by 2015.

Energy efficiency is set to account for 30 percent of Hawaii's 70 percent clean energy goal by 2030.

Hawaii ranked:

1st in the nation in solar water heaters and performance contracting per capita; 2nd in the nation in power purchase agreements; and 3rd in the nation in cumulative installed PV capacity per capita and, most importantly, in clean energy job growth.

We all know that the solar industry is booming, but it may be surprising to know that solar represented 26 percent of all construction expenditures.

DBEDT and its attached agencies were also productive in other areas of the economy:

- 1. In workforce housing, we expect to break ground or dedicate 15 housing projects this year, totaling over 2,500 units.
- 2. In Kakaako, we expect to complete a development agreement for Pohukaina, a mixed income, mixed use project, as well as begin work on the redevelopment of Kewalo Basin. Both of these projects are public-private partnerships with the private sector contributing the bulk of the capital.
- 3. With respect to the innovation sector, HSDC launched its Venture Accelerator program and selected 3 Hawaii-based companies who will provide matching funds. The program is designed to stimulate the emergence of new companies in export oriented high growth areas of the economy.
- 4. Finally, thanks to a federal grant, our Business Development Support Division sponsored two trade missions to Japan for the fashion industry, bringing together both larger, more established companies as well as start-ups. These missions contributed to over \$4.3 million in sales. Equally important, they set the foundation for potential long-term relationships that will help to rejuvenate the industry and promote exports.

Impact on DBEDT Programs

To give you some perspective on the magnitude of the budget proposals you will hear from this Department today, consider that the entire DBEDT budget is just over one-tenth-of-onepercent (0.127 percent) of the total State budget.

Due to budget and spending reductions, our FY 2013 general fund appropriation remains at 63 percent of the Department's FY 2009 general fund budget.

DBEDT's general fund appropriation decreased 4 percent from \$7,413,272 in FY 2012 to \$7,123,263 in FY 2013, with 75.5 general fund positions in FY 2012 and 76.5 positions in FY 2013. However, due to budget reductions of 37 percent, the FY 2013 general fund appropriation remains at 63 percent of the Department's FY 2009 general fund budget.

The department was authorized a total of 124.50 general fund positions in FY 2009, which has been reduced by 48 positions to 76.5 positions in FY 2013, reflecting a decrease of **48 percent** in total positions.

Unlike other DBEDT programs, tourism has seen increases in funding due to increases in the Transient Accommodations Tax. The discussion of activities and challenges of the Hawaii Tourism Authority will not be included in this presentation.

DBEDT has worked very hard to attract Federal money to fund our key programs. Federal Funds in DBEDT increased from \$22,282,112 in FY 2009 to \$32,579,073 in FY 2013, a 32 percent increase.

BED 100 Business Development and Support Division (BDSD)

Most recently, BDSD's focus has targeted industries—fashion, gift, natural products and biotech—that have the potential to increase export trade with the Asia Pacific region.

For example, in two International Trade Shows with the fashion and gift products industries last year, BDSD brought large, r more established companies together with the "up-and-coming" firms to help develop the industries as a whole, and to assist the newer companies with mentorship, business and sales relationships, and marketing.

One mission produced \$2,922,000 in new, short- and long-term sales for the firms involved.

The other produced \$1,942,000 in new sales.

The Division launched an overall campaign called, "Buy Hawaii, Give Aloha," as an umbrella tagline for its products and export marketing campaign for the new year. The focus is on fashion, gift products and natural products from Hawaii. It will encompass overseas trade shows, local trade shows and promotional support for locally made products and services. We are requesting the following new program monies:

- \$250,000 for the State's matching portion of a federal US Small Business Administration grant of \$703,000 and for a grant request for next fiscal year. This grant is to increase the number of exporters from Hawaii and to increase the dollar amount of exports from Hawaii. The grant will provide export and training workshops to over 100 Hawaii companies and trade show participation for 70 Hawaii companies, and increase exports from Hawaii by \$10 million.
- \$150,000 to conduct a financial audit of the State's two overseas offices in Taipei and Beijing as recommended by the Legislative Auditor, and to provide operating monies to keep the offices operating.
- \$50,000 to support Hawaii Fashion month to increase sales and awareness of Hawaii made fashions, and grow the industry in Hawaii.

BED 103 Land Use Commission (LUC)

During FY 2012, the LUC approved petitions that will produce substantial amounts of affordable and entry level housing. The Hoopili and Koa Ridge projects, approved in June 2012, will include a significant number of affordable homes while also creating thousands of jobs in Hawaii.

The LUC's activities also involved the preservation of natural, historical, and cultural resources as well as the development of uses that diversified the State and local economy, created jobs, increased State and county revenues, and attracted new economic activity.

Last year, the LUC managed petitions for district boundary amendments, important agricultural land designations or special permits on all islands encompassing an estimated 59,688 acres of land.

The LUC accomplished the re-classification of 2,917 acres of land from agricultural to urban designation freeing up land for much needed affordable housing and development supporting major job development in the construction industry.

In addition, the LUC has secured the protected status of 56,771 acres of agricultural land by processing important agricultural land petitions on neighbor islands.

The LUC handled approximately 800 inquiries per month from the public, developers and county, state and federal agencies with regard to land use boundaries, petition status and general land use matters.

As a regulatory agency, the LUC is dependent on general funds. However, the LUC has already shifted most of its meeting room costs, court reporter costs, publication costs, and sound technician costs to the regulated private sector in an effort to cut expenses.

LUC is also requesting a secretary position and funding to provide clerical support and a temporary secretary position and funding for a digitization project. The digitization project is important to make LUC proceedings more transparent to the public and to facilitate input.

The LUC is also requesting funding for travel to the neighbor islands for periodic meetings. There has been public criticism in the past regarding the Commission's Oahu-centric meeting schedule.

BED 105 Creative Industries Division (CID)

Creative Industries Division (CID) is requesting additional program and CIP funds this biennium.

CID focuses on strengthening the growth, sustainability and export capacity of the State's arts, culture, design, publishing, music, film, publishing, digital and new media sectors – all of which comprise Hawaii's creative economy.

From 2001 to 2011, these creative clusters have grown 13.8 percent and represent over 47,000 entrepreneurs and companies statewide.

CID houses the Hawaii Film Office—which, this year, celebrates 35 years of supporting Hawaii's growing film industry—and the Arts & Culture Development Branch, which supports Hawaii's growing community of artists in all disciplines. The two branches are proud of the following major accomplishments this year:

- More than \$250M in direct expenditures from production that took place in Hawaii last year, largely due to our successful Act 88 tax credit for film. Once those dollars pump through our economy, the economic activity generated is more than \$400M, with thousands of Hawaii hires and local vendors engaged.
- CID's professional development programs in the business of the music industry and launch of The Creative Lab and Sound and Vision initiative with the Hawaii International Film Festival, increased the export of creative product via licensing deals across multiple distribution platforms.
- The success of these initiatives is demonstrated in the Fox Searchlight Academy Award Winning film, "The Descendants," and its recent Grammy nomination for the outstanding Soundtrack of the Year, as well as multiple licensing deals with major television networks including CBS' "Hawaii 5-0", NBC's "Parenthood" and Sony Classics.

FY 2014-2015 requests include CIP funding to support film studio repairs, planning for future creative media infrastructure development, an additional clerical position, expansion of web portals to support design, arts and culture development initiatives.

In 2011, estimated film industry <u>revenues</u> reached \$184.3M with an estimated economic impact of \$298.6M. CID is requesting \$5.198 M in FY 2014-2015 CIP funding for much needed additional repairs and upgrades to the existing Hawaii Film Studio Complex at Diamond Head. Basic repairs and maintenance of the Hawaii Film Studio average \$130,000 per year.

To increase media production capacity both off shore and locally generated, we are requesting \$250,000 in CIP funding in FY 2014 to identify sites and develop plans for a second multi-stage studio complex for Creative Media and Film Production.

To expand capacity of the new media sector, the legislature established an Economic Development position to facilitate support for this growing cluster of Hawaii's creative economy. We are requesting program funding to target professional development, trade show and marketing support for Hawaii's 4,000+ creative companies in the interactive, visual effects, game, animation, mobile content and mobile applications.

BED 107 Foreign Trade Zone 9 (FTZ)

The FTZ is special funded and receives no general funds and has contributed close to \$5 million to the general fund over the past 45 years. Our FTZ has approximately 300 clients which provide revenue of close to \$2 million annually. Over \$12.5 billion in cargo and merchandise transited through FTZ sites in Hawaii last year.

The FTZ continues to establish, maintain, and administer general-purpose Foreign-Trade Zones and special-purpose Foreign-Trade Subzones throughout the State; provide storage and distribution services to firms engaged in import/export of merchandise; and lease office, warehouse, and manufacturing space to firms engaged in international trade.

This past year, the Foreign-Trade Zone's leased office space and Public Domestic storage space were filled to capacity and currently has a waiting list of companies requesting space when it becomes available.

The Foreign-Trade Zone is in the design phase of a \$7.5 million renovation project which will essentially double the Zone's available office space to nearly 60,000 square feet. This expansion will allow for additional import/export small businesses to participate in the program, allow companies to synergistically work together by clustering key industry businesses in one location, and expand the FTZ's ability to offer additional international trade related services and training. This project was made possible through a \$3 million competitive grant received from the U.S. Department of Commerce as well as \$4.5 million in reimbursable

General Obligation bonds from the State. Construction is expected to begin in early 2013 and be completed by early 2014.

The FTZ also initiated a pilot project to re-purpose a portion of the existing four acre warehouse into assembly and light manufacturing space for companies utilizing Foreign-Trade Zone procedures. The first company to use this program was identified and will begin manufacturing at the Pier 2 facility in early 2013.

The FTZ, as the official city/state partner of the EXIM Bank, successfully hosted the EXIM Bank Global Access Forum which attracted over 150 people, which was twice the number of expected participants. This forum included remarks from Patricia M. Loui, Member, Board of Directors, Export-Import Bank of the US; Nicole Y. Lamb-Hale, Assistant Secretary, US Department of Commerce; and was attended and supported by the late Senator Daniel Inouye and Senator Daniel Akaka. Last year, the EXIM Bank program supported Hawaii companies with loans totaling close to \$2.3 million in export financing.

The Foreign-Trade Zone also hosted the Export University training program with its partner, the Hawaii Pacific Export Council. This training series, focused on helping companies grow their business through exporting by teaching businesses the tools for export success, was attended by nearly 70 participants whose businesses made over \$550,000 in confirmed international sales since completing the training.

This year, the FTZ is embarking on a marketing push to increase program awareness and market presence through an update to its website, creation of vertical market specific collateral, and participation through targeted media outlets.

FTZ has partnered with other trade-related government agencies and private industry to offer programs and training aimed at fostering import and export activity. These programs include the High Tech Development Corporation's Manufacturing Extension Partnership program; Hawaii Pacific Export Council's Export University training; and Hawaii Pacific University's International Trade MBA program.

The FTZ is requesting \$2.2 million in CIP funds to repair the facility's 55 year old roof. The aging roof has been rapidly deteriorating which has lead to water leaks causing damage to tenant offices and cargo stored in the warehouse.

BED 120 Strategic Industries Division (SID)

SID leads the State of Hawaii's acclaimed energy agenda to achieve 70% clean energy by the year 2030. Its mission is to deploy a clean energy infrastructure as a catalyst for economic growth, "test bed" investment opportunities, and greater energy security.

SID is special funded and receives no general funds. During the past biennium, SID generated additional revenues for the State by receiving and effectively managing \$34 million in Federal funds under ARRA and pledging to do more with less. We reduced our biennium workforce from 44 positions to 39 in the FY 2013 supplement budget. Our FY 2014-2015 biennium budget request is for a total of 36 positions under a reorganized divisional organizational structure and energy plan that focuses on several key areas – Renewable Portfolio Standards; Energy Efficiency Portfolio Standards; Jobs; Transportation; and Innovation, Planning and Policy.

Among the major accomplishments of the State Energy Office in 2012, was the passage of SB 2785. Simply put, it will cost less to build an interisland electrical grid network as a result of SB 2785's establishment of a clear framework for any interisland cable proposal to be developed, financed and considered.

As Governor Abercrombie noted upon passage, "This is a long-term infrastructure investment that is needed now. An integrated grid will stabilize energy prices and equalize rates between the islands, which will benefit all of us. As I mentioned at the start of the session, there is no legislation more critical to our future."

The State Energy Office also rolled out the online Developer/Investor Center; including the Renewable EnergGIS map, the Renewable Energy Permitting Wizard; and the Department of Health e-Permitting Portal.

These features are designed to provide prospective developers and investors the resources for starting a clean energy venture in Hawaii. These tools are also contributing to recognition by national and international developers that Hawaii is the ideal laboratory for the development of clean energy technologies.

The State Energy Office also expanded the scope of the Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (DOE/EIS-0459) to include the full scope of renewable energy and energy efficiency solutions that may be pursued under the Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative.

In 2013, the SEO is seeking to continue its commitment to Hawaii's clean energy goals.

Along with the Department of Agriculture and Department of Health, SID is seeking Legislature approval to use the unallocated portions of the environmental response, energy, and food security tax to achieve our statutory obligations and mission related goals during the upcoming biennium with a particular focus on the following:

- HRS 269-92 Sets statewide RPS targets;
- HRS 196-41 DBEDT shall develop a program to maximize the use of renewable energy to achieve renewable portfolio standards;

- HRS 201N Energy Resources Coordinator (ERC) to administer RE Facility Siting Process to encourage expedited permitting;
- HRS 196-1.5 Energy Resources Coordinator (ERC) to work with state agencies to more efficiently process permits for renewable energy projects;
- HRS 46-19.4 Energy Resources Coordinator (ERC) to work with county agencies to more efficiently process permits for renewable energy projects; and
- HRS 196-42 State to facilitate development of alternative fuels.
- Administrative Directive No. 06-01 (Energy & Resource Efficiency and Renewable Energy & Resource Development).
- State energy policies mandated by Act 96, SLH 2006, Acts 155 and 156, SLH 2009, and Act 73, SLH 2010.

Currently, Hawaii generates about 12 percent of its energy from renewable sources such as wind, solar, geothermal and biofuels, and is well on its way toward reaching its RPS benchmark of 15% by 2015.

Energy efficiency is set to account for 30 percent of Hawaii's 70 percent clean energy goal by 2030. The State of Hawaii is also leading by example with a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Gold designation for the State Office Tower and a national Race to the Top award as the nation's leader in Energy Savings Performance Contracting.

SID plans to extend its national leadership in energy efficiency through \$1.5 million for technical assistance for energy savings performance contracting, efficient building retrofits, and LEED certifications.

Hawaii now leads the U.S. in several categories regarding deployment of electric vehicles and supporting infrastructure. The widespread deployment of Electric Vehicles (EVs) is a key approach towards the reduction of imported petroleum consumption. Since the beginning of fiscal year 2012 to present, the number of EVs in Hawaii has almost tripled (from 357 in July 2011 to 1,016 in October 2012).

Currently, Hawaii ranks third in the U.S. in clean energy job growth.

To stimulate further growth in Hawaii's economy, SID is focusing on innovation and job creation through developing clean energy business opportunities for the State. SID has tasked its new Innovation, Planning and Policy (IPP) branch with \$9 million for a venture energy accelerator to leverage the Hawaii Strategic Development Corporation's venture accelerator funding program and the launch of an innovative Green Infrastructure Fund to provide extremely low cost credit for high impact renewable energy and energy efficiency projects. IPP will also provide subject matter experts for intermittent renewable energy transmission and improved statewide planning for energy assurance.

SID's Renewable Energy Branch (REB) provides resource expertise and facilitates the development of renewable energy projects, infrastructure and investments. Since the beginning of fiscal year 2012 to present, REB has assisted the development of 202 MW (equivalent to approximately 764 GWh) renewable energy generation.

To provide resource expertise and facilitate the development of alternative transportation and fuels projects, infrastructure and investments, REB has provided permitting and siting assistance to two pilot biofuels facilities: UOP BioRefinery (expected production 1,460 gal/year), phase one which is currently in operation; and Phycal Algae Oil (expected production 100,000 gal/year), currently under development.

With the State being well under way to achieve the 2015 RPS targets, \$1.2 million will be allocated to counties and economic development boards for technical assistance in carrying out the solutions identified above and coordinating dialogue with the public on appropriate clean energy solutions to be deployed in communities throughout the State.

BED 128 Office of Aerospace Development (OAD)

The Office of Aerospace Development (OAD) was established through Act 149, Session Laws of 2007, to identify and promote opportunities for expanding and diversifying aerospace-related activities statewide.

Its activities in 2012 included initial development of an Aerospace Research and Development Park on the Big Island under the Pacific International Space Center for Exploration Systems that will design, test and evaluate new technologies supporting both robotic and human missions to space.

Our budget request for this line item does not reflect any additional expenditure.

BED 130 Research and Economic Analysis Division (READ)

The Research and Economic Analysis Division is the center for credible, accurate and useful economic data and analysis in the executive branch.

Each year, READ produces quarterly economic forecasts, monthly economic indicators, monthly energy trend data, and timely analytical reports on key sectors of the economy.

In addition, READ is the hub for the compendium, "Hawaii State Data Book," and the State Data Center coordinating census and economic data on the State's population.

READ identifies trends, analyzes industries, and provides economic data critical to making policy decisions.

READ also serves the general public and the media, fielding more than 1,100 direct phone inquiries annually.

Read is requesting \$270,686, of which \$70,686 will be used to cover the shortfall in wage and salaries which was cut by the legislature in 2011, and \$200,000 will be used for research projects.

READ is requesting the restoration of \$70,686 cut from the READ budget in 2011.

The funds will be used to fill a vacant position and to cover the cost of reallocating a Secretary II (SR 14) to a Secretary III position (SR 16).

The READ request for an additional \$200,000 will be used to fill part of the gap left when the Federal government terminated the Honolulu Consumer Expenditure in 2005, terminated the Economic Census in 2007, and terminated the Federal Government Expenditures report in 2010,

These reports provided critical data needed to build models (such as the Input-Output Model) to measure the impacts of economic activities.

In addition, without the Federal spending data, READ will not be able to measure the contribution of Federal government in Hawaii; and without the Economic Census, State analysts will not be able to measure the status and changes in the State's industrial structure or measure industry performance.

For example, since 2005 READ has been unable to measure the spending pattern of Hawaii residents, so informed decisions on issues such as tax policy cannot be made with hard empirical data.

For visitor data, READ has been working with the Hawaii Tourism Authority in collecting, processing and maintaining databases. That partnership will continue into the future.

BED 142 Administrative Services Office (ASO)

We are requesting a Contracts Specialist position and attendant funding to meet Department's priority of transparent procurement procedures.

This position will provide support to the Contracts Section, which oversees the State Procurement Office's delegation of procurement, training, Electronic Procurement System, Posting and Notices System, contracts and administration, internal post-procurement checks and balances, and other related procurement matters.

BED 143 High Technology Development Corporation (HTDC)

HTDC remains fiscally stable and its performance continues to trend upwards.

Despite the general trend of federal funding decreases, HTDC's Hawaii Center for Advanced Transportation Technologies (HCATT) program experienced a significant increase in its funding level to warrant an increase in the ceiling for the appropriation for matching federal funding. (The additional \$19M received this FY is to fund projects that extend over 2-3 years, and the higher appropriation level is needed in this biennium to cover future encumbrances of contracts.)

This year, HTDC has rebranded the operation of the federal Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP) as INNOVATE Hawaii.

HTDC is starting to expend the \$3M CIP monies from FY 2013 for planning and design of an innovation facility in light of the Manoa Innovation Center's land lease expiration in 2015. We understand that the State is currently considering a public-private partnership to secure an innovation facility for HTDC. HTDC is seeking additional CIP for construction monies to have alternative options.

BED 144 Office of Planning (OP)

In 2012, the Office of Planning supported land use projects proposed before the Land Use Commission that included a workforce-housing component. These projects included the Kula Ridge Maui project; A&B Properties' Waiale master planned development in Central Maui; Koa Ridge Makai/Castle & Cooke Waiawa master planned communities; and the Hoopili mixed-use residential project in Ewa.

OP worked with many stakeholders to formulate climate change adaptation policies. Legislation to add climate change adaptation as a new Priority Guideline in Part III of the Hawaii State Planning Act (HRS Chapter 226), passed the State legislature and was signed into law by the Governor.

OP convened meetings of major stakeholders in transit oriented development (TOD) with the support of Smart Growth America. As a result, a report was prepared which outlines major recommendations for pursuing Transit Oriented Development (TOD) and Smart Growth actions with State agencies. This State initiative was undertaken in recognition of the need for greater coordination and that State agencies are the largest landowners along the rail transit line, with over 2,000 acres of land ownership within a half mile walking distance of the 21 stations.

OP (in cooperation with the Department of Agriculture) prepared a strategy for increased food security and food self-sufficiency for Hawaii. The strategy implements the New Day Plan and the Statewide Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy. It contains recommendations

to increase the demand for local food products, increase production and provide policy support to increase food self-sufficiency.

While the implications of the "fiscal cliff" are uncertain, OP's federal funds may be impacted to some degree.

At the Office of Planning, economic and fiscal conditions over the past several years have resulted in reductions in general funded positions and other expenses. OP has strived to meet its core statutory responsibilities with diminished resources. About half of OP's positions are federally-funded.

OP's budget request is focused on restoring funds and positions that were lost due to budget cuts.

- 1. Add personnel funds to cover shortfall in existing personnel salaries (FY 2014/\$23,045, FY 2015/\$23,045).
- Restore Land Use Division (LUD) Secretary position and funds. (FY 2014/\$23,088, FY 2015/\$46,176). The LUD Secretary position was cut during the 2009 reduction-in-force. The position is essential to prepare and organize the submittals of position papers, testimonies and legal documents needed to represent the State's position before the Land Use Commission (LUC).
- Add funds for CZM Program Other Current Expenses (FY 2014/\$50,000; FY 2015/\$50,000). CZM federal funds require one to one matching funds. The Federal government has expressed concern over the declining state cash match for the program.
- 4. Add a Planner position and funds (FY 2014/\$27,750 FY 2015/\$55,500). Requests for planning assistance have been made by the administration and legislature. The additional planner will conduct new work that is not being conducted by existing planners. The planner position will provide planning services throughout state government, a capacity OP previously had but lost due to reductions-in-force.

BED 145/VC Hawaii Strategic Development Corporation (HSDC)

HSDC's mission is to promote technology based economic development and economic diversification in Hawaii through a return driven investment program in partnership with private capital.

HSDC has implemented a pilot initiative with the \$13 million grant from the US Department of the Treasury to implement a venture capital fund of funds investment program and a \$2 million appropriation from the Legislature to implement a venture accelerator funding program.

Venture accelerators are private sector investment programs that bring together business mentorship and capital investment through a collaborative program that allows all participants in an industry cluster to contribute to the economic growth of that industry.

The Launch Akamai Venture Accelerator (LAVA) Program was signed into law at the end of June 2012. In July 2012, HSDC initiated a Request for Information to solicit interest in the LAVA Program and held information sessions on Oahu, Maui and the Big Island. This effort included hosting the Accelerate Hawaii's Innovation Summit in August 2012 – a conference moderated by Steve Case and showcasing Hawaii's entrepreneurs and innovators from startup and corporate companies. The event also included an all day workshop on best practices in accelerator management.

In November 2012, HSDC selected 3 Hawaii based accelerators, out of seven applicants, for funding under the LAVA Program. HSDC and the selected accelerators are now working to complete the funding for these accelerator programs, as matching private investment is required. All three accelerators are expected to be operating by early 2013. HSDC is using this pilot initiative to establish privately managed investment programs that will form the foundation for an ecosystem to support entrepreneurial high growth companies in Hawaii.

Once these pilot programs are established, it will take several years to deploy the funds and create a sustainable ecosystem to support entrepreneurial high growth companies. Both the Federal program and the Legislative appropriation are one-time grants and HSDC is seeking additional resources in separate legislation to maintain and build on the momentum in the private sector created by these pilot investment programs.

HSDC is seeking additional resources of \$10 million in each year of the biennium budget to establish this investment initiative.

BED 146 Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii Authority (NELHA)

NELHA is special funded and does not receive any general funds for its operations. It is not requesting an increase in the special fund ceiling. This budget code <u>no longer</u> includes the National Defense Center of Excellence for Research in Ocean Sciences (CEROS) which closed on October 16, 2012, due to lack of federal funding.

An analysis of the economic impact of NELHA found that its total impact is significantly larger than previously thought. The Economic Research Organization at the University of Hawaii (UHERO) completed the report for NELHA in June 2012.

It found that total expenditures from the businesses at NELHA were \$81.0 million dollars, of which about \$50 million were paid to Hawaii entities in 2010. Using type II multipliers from the State's input-output model, UHERO estimated the total economic output to the greater Hawaii economy was \$87.7 million dollars which generated \$4.5 million dollars in State tax revenue for 2010.

The analysis also found that not only do NELHA tenants employ hundreds of people but also their expenditures contributed to 583 jobs in the larger Hawaii economy annually.

Additional State and Federal funding for new initiatives and existing infrastructure resulted in considerable progress on the key initiatives. With the receipt of \$3.5M in new federal grants, work has begun to renovate the main office building into an incubator and a micro grid demonstration project.

Further, \$3 million in additional State CIP funds was secured for pipeline repair and the main office renovation.

A new NELHA master plan and strategic plan were finalized including a 5-year financial plan to project revenues and development of new initiatives to achieve key objectives of the plan. Key initiatives include increase utilization of existing assets such as the research campus and Gateway Center; attract additional renewable energy projects to assist in broadening revenue streams. Significant progress was made regarding the sitting of a 1MW net OTEC research and demonstration facility

The budget request for NELHA includes two important CIP projects: 1) a connector road; and, 2) an upgrade to the main pipeline system.

The connector road request of \$9.6 million would complete a road between the existing Hawaii Ocean Science and Technology Park (HOST Park) entrance at Makako Bay Drive and the new planned entrance at Kaiminani Street. This connector road is essential as DOT is in the process of converting the two-lane Queen Kaahumanu Highway into a divided four-lane highway. Upon completion, northbound traffic will no longer have access to HOST Park.

NELHA received funds for the design of this road as a result of an earlier CIP appropriation and as such this is a "shovel-ready" project.

NELHA has also requested approximately \$2.3 million to upgrade the main pipeline system to allow warm seawater to be shared between the two main subsystems. This will allow for redundancy in the system in the event of failure at either end subsystem; allow more warm seawater to be pumped to higher elevation properties

It will also help facilitate the development of a 1MW ocean thermal energy conversion facility.

NELHA received funds for the design of this pipeline as a result of an earlier CIP appropriation and as such this is also a "shovel-ready" project.

BED 150 Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA)

HCDA is currently operating without a general fund appropriation having shifted funding to its revolving fund.

In 2012, HCDA highlight included:

- **Construction of Affordable Housing in Kakaako.** Halekauwila Place is a \$70M project initiated by the Hawaii Finance Development Corporation (HHFDC) designed to provide 204 affordable studio/one/two and three bedroom rental units in the Kakaako Community Development District. In December 2012, financing for Halekauwila Place closed and construction has already begun. Halekauwila Place financing includes:
 - \$25M first mortgage insured by the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) and issued by the PNC Bank (the nation's 5th largest bank);
 - \$28M in equity provided by low income housing tax credit investors also syndicated by the PNC Bank; and
 - a \$17M second mortgage issued by the HCDA.

Besides creating needed construction activity, the support of the nation's 5th largest bank for the long term viability of affordable housing projects such as Halekauwila Place is notable. Of course, most importantly, the development will offer working families an opportunity to live in the urban core at rents topping out at approximately \$1,370/month for a three bedroom unit.

• Permitting the Development of 635 Workforce Housing Units in Kakaako. In 2012, the Authority gave its approval to Downtown Capital LLC to construct 635 affordable for-sale units at the site of the former Hawaii Newspaper Agency (HNA) press facility on South Street. In exchange for agreeing to construct 635 for-sale condominium units at prices from <100 to 140% of Area Median Income (AMI) without government subsidy and within established caps on unit size, the developer received approval to develop twice [7.0 floor area ratio (FAR)] as much density as typically allowed.

Again besides creating needed construction activity projected to begin in the later part of 2013, the development will be providing home ownership opportunity for a significant number of working families convenient to jobs and services in the urban core.

Granting the developer the ability to construct twice the amount of floor area is a creative approach being taken by the Authority to realize the benefits of previous

investment in infrastructure to make Kakaako a desirable live, work and play community.

- Overseeing Economic and Community Revitalization in Community Development Districts. Whether in Kakaako, Kalaeloa or Heeia, the Authority has strived to design and develop vibrant communities that can be sustained over time.
- Being continuing mindful of the need to foster community dialogue and participation in its activities, the Authority has sought to:
 - Establish and administer zoning rules that create compact and walkable communities that take advantage of public transit (and therefore sustainable);
 - Develop and implement community master and infrastructure plans; and
 - Steward agency resources and assets.

To establish sustainable communities in Kakaako and Kalaeloa, the Authority has promulgated the State's first form-based zoning rules. These rules provide the flexibility and ability for less car-centric (and thus more compact and walkable) communities in Kakaako and Kalaeloa to be developed.

New developments such as the recently permitted Symphony and 801 South Street projects in Kakaako and the FBI Building in Kalaeloa reflect these new design and development principles (e.g., creation of more active street frontages; shifting parking to the back of parcels; elimination of on-site parking requirements in space restricted Central Kakaako; incorporation of renewable energy facilities and features in Kalaeloa development; etc.).

Upcoming development in both Kakaako and Kalaeloa will continue to build upon these design and development principles.

The development of community infrastructure in Kalaeloa is highlighted by to energy corridor projects. In a 3,700 acre area that was formerly the Barbers Point Naval Air Station and serviced entirely by Navy utilities, the Authority has initiated two electric power projects to bring Hawaiian Electric service where the current level of service is spotty.

At Heeia, there are now regular harvests of kalo (or taro) where previously there were only overgrowth of weeds and non-native shrubbery. The Kewalo Basin Harbor is bustling commercial small boat harbor where partnership and talks of redevelopment and expansion of harbor facilities are foreseen in the coming calendar year.

• An Eye on the Future. Recent selection of a development partner for the 690 Pohukaina project signals the start of an estimated 18 month process to kick start an

ambitious plan to bring approximately 390 affordable rental units to the urban core of Honolulu.

While there is much due diligence to be conducted by both the Authority and Forest City, the focus on creating sustainable communities for all facets of our population remains the objective for the Authority in the coming year.

Looking forward to 2013, HCDA is working towards starting a public, private partnership for renovation, expansion, and management of Kewalo Basin Harbor through which a private party is expected to invest over \$20 million in the harbor for the right to manage the harbor on a long-term basis and pay an annual lease rent to HCDA.

BED 160 Hawaii Housing Finance Development Corporation (HHFDC)

As the economy comes out of recession, affordable housing developers still have difficulty obtaining private capital. HHFDC's financing and development tools continue to be needed to support affordable housing development.

HHFDC does not utilize any general funds – its activities and operational costs are supported by its revolving, trust, and federal funds. HHFDC enters into public-private partnerships to construct or preserve rental and for-sale housing. The provision of tools and resources such as financing, land, and assistance with land use and zoning approvals facilitate housing development and, thereby, stimulate the economy without reliance on general funds.

- Through public-private partnerships, 448 newly constructed rental and for sale units were added to the affordable housing inventory statewide.
- State and County land use approvals under Chapter 201H were obtained for Kamakana Villages at Keahuolu, a 2300-unit master planned community located in Kailua-Kona on the Big Island, and Halekauwila Place, a 204 family rental unit high-rise in the urban core of Honolulu
- \$43.5M in Hula Mae Single Family below market rate mortgages and \$12.5M in Mortgage Credit Certificate federal tax credits were made available to eligible first-time homebuyers.

Informational Budget Briefing

The Hawai'i Tourism Authority (HTA) is directed by law to have a "permanent, strong focus on marketing and promotion" that is guided by a tourism marketing plan and priorities established in the Tourism Strategic Plan. HTA's planning strategies consider economic conditions in the United States and the world markets, and conditions that may impact Hawai'i's visitor industry, such as the European economic crisis and natural disasters like the Japan earthquake and tsunami. In 2012, HTA's focus was on enhancing the momentum that was building in the Hawai'i visitor industry, and to pursue the short-term and long-term economic targets established by the HTA board for the state's visitor industry economy.

In 2012, visitor spending rose by 19.2 percent to \$12.9 billion. Total arrivals increased in the first eleven months to 7,265,107 visitors, and air seats grew by 15.4 percent, with new or additional flights from Los Angeles, San Jose, Oakland, San Diego, San Francisco, Las Vegas, Bellingham, New York City, Washington, D.C., Fukuoka, Sapporo, Nagoya, Osaka, Tokyo-Narita, Brisbane, Sydney, Auckland, and Seoul. The increases in arrivals and the resulting increase in visitor spending will help to generate \$______ billion in state tax revenues and support ______ visitor industry and related jobs.

We anticipate that Hawaii's tourism industry will continue to fare well in 2013, and HTA will continue to provide leadership in the visitor industry through its strategic planning, and its global marketing partnerships to sustain the upswing in momentum experienced in 2012. HTA is committed to building the demand from our major market areas, distributing the benefits of tourism across all islands, and leveraging opportunities and partnerships from developing markets, especially in the Asia-Pacific region.

HTA will support the Hawaii brand by supporting programs which provide a unique Hawai'i experience. We will continue to work to enhance Hawai'i's competitive advantage and invest in unique experiences that celebrate who we are as a people, place and culture. We

strongly believe these efforts are critical to sustaining Hawai'i's tourism economy and will help pave the way for a bright future.

It is recommended that the HTA be allowed to retain its current level of TAT revenues at \$69 million and \$33 million into the Tourism Special Fund and Convention Center Enterprise Special Fund respectively, and approximately \$141 million in appropriations, which allows the agency to meet its goals and have a significant and direct impact on the state's economy and overall resident quality of life.
