MEASURE:S.B. No. 1042, S.D. 2, H.D. 1TITLE:Relating to the Public Utilities Commission

Chair Luke and Members of the Committee:

#### **DESCRIPTION:**

This measure amends Section 269-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS"), and Act 177, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007, ("Act 177") relating to staffing and recruitment by the Public Utilities Commission ("Commission"). S.B. No. 1042, S.D. 2, H.D. 1 also contains an effective date of July 1, 2112.

#### POSITION:

The Commission strongly supports this measure, as it is critical to the Commission's efforts to build its capacity to fulfill its rapidly changing regulatory duties. The Commission offers the following comments for the Committee's consideration.

#### COMMENTS:

This bill would provide the Commission with needed flexibility to recruit and hire staff with the right skill sets to effectively carryout the Commission's regulatory duties, particularly in the area of energy regulation. While the 2007 Legislature passed Act 177 authorizing the reorganization of the Commission, Act 177 mandates specific position descriptions for Commission staff based on the Commission's needs during that period, which makes recruitment of personnel to satisfy the Commission's efforts to

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identify key positions and rewrite position descriptions to build up staffing required to carry out its many current and future duties by eliminating the restrictions of Act 177.

After being assigned additional space within the Kekuanaoa Building in July 2012, the Commission has continued to work on its office expansion and renovation plan with the assistance of the Department of Accounting and General Services, the Department of Budget and Finance, and the Office of the Attorney General. As the Commission's office expansion plan moves forward, this bill will serve to support the Commission in designing and filling the kinds of positions needed to modernize and transform the agency to meet the needs of a rapidly changing regulatory environment.

The Commission requests the Committee correct this bill's current effective date from July 1, 2112 to upon approval.

IN SUPPORT OF SB 1042, SD2, HD1- Relating to the Public Utilities Commission

I am Sharon Moriwaki, Co-chair of the Hawaii Energy Policy Forum (Forum). The Forum, created in 2002, is comprised of 45 representatives from Hawaii's electric utilities, oil and natural gas suppliers, environmental and community groups, renewable energy industry, and federal, state and local government, including representatives from the neighbor islands. Our vision and mission, and comprehensive "10 Point Action Plan" serves is designed to move Hawaii toward its preferred energy goals.

SB 1042, SD2, HD1 proposes to update Section 269-3, HRS and Act 177 (2007), relating to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) and its employment of assistants, which the Forum strongly supports as critical to enhance the effectiveness of the important work of the PUC.

One long-standing, unanimous priority of the Forum has been the revitalization the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) and the Division of Consumer Advocacy (DCA). The vitality of these important regulatory agencies is essential to ensure that the implementation of Hawaii's energy policies is effective, fair, cost-effective, and reasonable. In addition to regulating utility expenditures of over \$4 billion dollars annually, the PUC is tasked with developing and implementing many technically complex policy matters that affect every one of Hawaii's people on a day-to-day basis. Energy policy legislation and clean energy policies leave many of the most difficult, sensitive and technical determinations to the PUC for ultimate resolution and implementation. It was for this reason the Forum conducted a study in 2003, and urged the reform and reorganization of the PUC. The resulting Act 177 lay the foundation, with specific positions that were deemed to be needed at that time. Major strides in clean energy policy and programs have been made since Act 177. The result, while good for Hawaii □s clean energy future, impacts significantly on the PUC. In order to do this effectively and make sound decisions for the best interests of our state, the PUC requires skilled and competent staff in a rapidly changing field. We cannot overemphasize the importance of allowing the PUC to develop a staff capability that is sufficiently qualified and can, over the long term, develop the extensive institutional experience necessary to develop, implement, and maintain progressive energy policies. The PUC faces exceptional challenges in recruiting and maintaining the specialized staff needed to provide the unique nexus of technical, economic, policy, and legal expertise necessary for enlightened energy regulation. SB1042, SD2, HD1 would remove obstacles and would facilitate the efficient and effective recruitment and retention of the qualified staff well suited to the PUC's important duties.

Based on the foregoing, the Forum strongly supports SB1042, SD2, HD1 and respectfully urges passage of the bill. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.
