SUBJECT: S.B. 1112 – RELATING TO DELETING STATE PUBLIC HUOSING DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of this bill is to authorize the Hawaii Public Housing Authority (HPHA) to delete delinquent accounts receivable records for state low-income public housing projects that have been delinquent at least ninety days and also authorizes the Hawaii Public Housing Authority to assign delinquent accounts to a collection agency.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports this Administration bill. There should be a positive impact on the public as the HPHA will more quickly be able to delete from its accounts receivable records uncollectible debts from the state low-income public housing program in the same manner as under the federal lowincome public housing program. This will reduce the negative impact of such long-term uncollectible accounts on the HPHA's financial statements.

In consideration of Senate Bill No. 1112 Relating to Deleting State Public Housing Delinquent Accounts

Honorable Chairs Chun Oakland, Hee and Members of the Senate Committees on Human Services and Judiciary and Labor, thank you for the opportunity to provide you with comments regarding Senate Bill (S.B.) No. 1112, relating to deleting State public housing delinquent accounts.

The Hawaii Public Housing Authority (HPHA) <u>supports</u> the enactment of this measure, which would add a new section to part III of Chapter 356D, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), and allow the HPHA to delete from its accounts receivable the records of delinquent accounts for vacated units within the state low-income public housing program that have been delinquent for over ninety days, and allow those delinquent accounts to be assigned to a collection agency.

Section 356D-32 (a) and (b), HRS, currently allows the HPHA to delete from its accounts receivable the records of delinquent accounts for vacated units within the federal low-income public housing program that have been delinquent for over ninety days, and allow those delinquent accounts to be assigned to a collection agency.

Due to the fact that there are no similar statutory provisions for the administration of the state low-income public housing program, any account receivable must be delinquent for more than two years and meet the requirements of section 40-82, HRS. In the interest of consistency across program administration for the HPHA and its property

managers, the HPHA humbly requests provisions for state low-income public housing program administration similar to section 356D-32 (a) and (b), HRS.

Although we have improved our accounts receivable by \$2,800,000 and our account uncollectible by \$2,025,583, we believe that this measure will create a single, consistent, streamlined process that would allow all parties involved to maintain accurate records and pursue delinquent debts owed to the HPHA.

The HPHA appreciates the opportunity to provide the Senate Committees on Human Services, and Judiciary and Labor with the agency's position regarding S.B. No. 1112. We respectfully request the Committees to pass this measure favorably, and we thank you very much for your dedicated support.
