My name is Emmalyn Pilande and I am the Project Assistant for the HEALTHY Program located at Kapiolani Women & Children's Medical Center. I strongly support SB 1127, which prohibits the sales of all electronic smoking devices (including e-cigarettes) to minors under the age of 18. Electronic smoking devices contain varying levels of nicotine and they contain cartridges of different flavors, which entices the youth. These devices are readily available in kiosks, small shops, and even at the mall.

Through my work, I have been exposed to various people and different circumstances on how tobacco products affect their lives. This affects babies and pediatric patients in the intensive care unit, whose parents want to quit smoking, thinking that their children are facing the consequences of their decision to smoke. This affects teenage parents, who want to quit for their baby's health. This affects those who have spouses and relatives, who want to quit, encouraging others to make a healthy change in their lives.

Electronic smoking devices are not currently regulated by the FDA. This allows the advertisement of electronic smoking devices on the radio and television. They are also legal if sold to youth and can be sample at kiosks and stores. Given the limited federal regulation on these devices, I strongly urge you to pass SB 1127, to prohibit the sale of electronic smoking devices to minors, as well as banning the sampling of this product.

I believe that prevention is the key. If tobacco products are out of sight, hopefully they will also be out of mind—not just for users, but also for those who may be intrigued at using them. This will thereby decrease the risk they pose to the people of Hawaii. Therefore, prohibiting the sale of electronic smoking devices and banning sampling them will prevent our keiki from beginning an addiction that can last a lifetime.

I strongly urge you to support SB 1127 and help us in our prevention effort to reduce tobacco marketing directed at our youth.

I am in favor of this bill because it will create a statewide minimum age requirement for the sale of e-cigarettes products in Hawaii as well as a much needed tax increase on the product to make it less reasonable for young people to purchase.

I believe these products are just another way of promoting rebelliousness among smokers to get around smoke-free laws that restrict traditional tobacco smoking in public place throughout Hawaii. Also I think it's a way to market addiction of nicotine to youth masked in a tech-friendly device that makes it seem completely harmless. That is also obvious with the colorful packaging and numerous fruit flavors available. I also DO NOT believe the marketing for these products is truthful.

I would like to see you take SB 1127 to the next level and either ban the sale of these products all together in Hawaii or require them to be sold in specialty tobacco shops where no one under the age of 18 years old is permitted.
