We work with DLNR often, designing and building portable, cost effective shipping container structures for their many operations. I know the people on the ground, they are extremely dedicated and efficient people who care about our aina and also are financially conservative and efficient. Everytime we are involved with building a structure for them, we always go over every detail so they get exactly what they need at the best possible price. They are charged with many duties and responsibilities. They get criticized, and I can say that their job is extremely difficult, they operate on a tiny budget compared to all the infrastructure and lands, harbors beaches forests etc that they maintain and oversee. So overall, it is accurate to say that DLNR people get a lot done with a tiny amount of money.

Our watershed is under attack from thirsty, invasive plants that are extremely aggressive, fast growing and difficult to eradicate. Oahu is facing an upcoming water crisis with the close to 2 million people using our water every single day. No one likes to think about that, but it is going to be a crisis in fairly short order.
