- 1 **Department's Position:** We support this bill provided that its passage does not replace or adversely
- 2 impact priorities indicated in our Executive Budget.
- 3 Fiscal Implications: Appropriates funds for FY2014 and FY2015 for pre-hospital emergency medical
- 4 services 24 hours a day at Ewa Beach on Oahu.
- 5 **Purpose and Justification:** The Department of Health supported Act 268 of the 2012 Legislature
- 6 appropriating one million dollars for a new ambulance unit in Ewa Beach, Oahu. The new unit was
- 7 needed to mitigate the closure of Hawaii Medical Center West, and also to serve the growing population
- 8 of Ewa and West Oahu. A new Ewa unit was opened this past summer operating out of a temporary
- 9 location in Ewa for 16 hours a day. The need for this additional unit in West Oahu is unchanged and
- therefore we recommend it become a permanent unit with appropriate funding.

Testimony in Strong Support

My name is Jen Chahanovich, Chief Operating Officer for Pali Momi Medical Center. Pali Momi Medical Center is a nonprofit hospital located in West Oʻahu. It is dedicated to the health and well-being of all Hawaiʻi residents. With 126 beds and more than 370 physicians on its medical staff, Pali Momi offers a full range of services. It has delivered many medical firsts for the community, including West Oʻahu's only interventional cardiac catheterization unit to detect and treat heart disease, a fully integrated minimally invasive surgical suite, CT scan and MRI services, emergency services, a Women's Center, and the state's first Retina Center. Pali Momi is the only medical facility in Hawaiʻi that utilizes a team triage approach in its Emergency Room, where patients are promptly evaluated by an emergency physician. The American Heart Association has recognized the hospital for excellence in the treatment of coronary artery disease and heart failure, one of only a few hospitals in the nation. Pali Momi was founded in 1989 and is an affiliate of Hawaiʻi Pacific Health, the state's largest health care provider.

I appreciate the opportunity to submit testimony supporting SB 1254 SD1 which appropriates funds to increase the on-call availability of emergency medical services and ambulance services in Ewa Beach.

For the last 23 years, Pali Momi has continued to respond to the medical needs of West Oʻahu. Since the closure of Hawaiʻi Medical Center-West, we have responded to the growing need for emergency medical services as evidenced by the significant increase in emergency room patients we've cared for this year.

The Ewa Beach Unit is a critical resource and community partner which Pali Momi relies upon to provide timely emergency medical care for our patients. This appropriation will help ensure that our patients have greater access to critical emergency medical services in the Ewa plain.
