# TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL NO. 200, RELATING TO CONTINUING EDUCATION.

TO THE HONORABLE ANGUS L.K. MCKELVEY, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is Ahlani K. Quiogue and I am the Executive Officer of the Social Worker Program ("Program"), Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs ("Department"). Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 200.

The companion bill, House Bill No. 178, H.D. 1, Relating to Continuing Education, was passed unamended by the House Committee on Finance on February 20, 2013. The only substantive difference between Senate Bill No. 200 and House Bill No. 178, H.D. 1 are the effective dates of each bill. The Senate bill is effective upon approval. The House bill is effective January 1, 2112. Our preference is the Senate version of the bill.

The purpose of the bill is to require licensed social workers in Hawaii to:

1) complete a minimum of fifteen (15) credit hours of continuing education courses for the licensing renewal period beginning July 1, 2013 – June 30, 2016; and 2) complete a minimum of forty-five (45) credit hours of continuing education courses during each renewal period beginning July 1, 2016, and thereafter.

By way of background, the Department and the National Association of Social Workers, Hawaii Chapter ("NASW-Hawaii") were requested pursuant to Senate Resolution No. 78, which was adopted by the Senate of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2012, to submit a proposed draft for a bill to establish, implement and monitor continuing education requirements for all licensed social workers in the State of Hawaii. As such, and after several months of discussion and compromise between the parties, a proposed bill was submitted to the State of Hawaii Legislature on December 20, 2012.

As written, the Program supports this bill as it will ensure that licensed social workers maintain their professional competency and keep abreast of the latest developments in their profession. It is estimated that approximately 1,681 licensed social workers (LBSW – 15, LSW – 910, and LCSW – 756) will be required to obtain continuing education credits as proposed by this bill. However, similar to other professions that require continuing education, the Program in consultation with the NASW-Hawaii, agreed to perform post-renewal random audits of 5% - 10% of its licensees who renew their social worker licenses. By choosing to perform random audits, the Program's staff will have little to no impact on its workload due to this additional requirement.

Furthermore, the bill will no longer place the Program in the minority as one (1) of only three (3) jurisdictions that do not require continuing education credits as part of its licensing laws.

My name is Dr. Noreen Mokuau, and I am writing today in support of SB 200, relating to continuing education for social workers.

As the dean of the Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, I am committed to the concepts of life-long learning and continual professional development. These are values that are especially important for professional social workers because theories and skills within the field are constantly changing and improving. In order to be as effective as we can be, professional social workers must keep abreast with the latest knowledge and technologies available.

The MBT School of Social Work is also committed to meeting the changing needs and demands of the professional social work community. As part of that commitment, the school has increased its credit and non-credit course offerings in recent years. In addition to expanding the range of topics being covered – from practice theories and methodologies to clinical supervision and program management, the School has also expanded the formats through which the trainings are being delivered. - Consumer Protection: Requiring continuing education courses for social workers who are renewing their licenses will give assurance to Hawaii's consumers that social workers are current with the latest developments in their field. Social workers provide critical services in prevention, intervention, and treatment to a broad spectrum of clientele, including women, children and families, the incarcerated, the elderly, the medically vulnerable, the homeless and the marginalized who face racial and gender discrimination all of whom deserve to know their social worker is current in their chosen area of practice.
- Continuing education increases the <u>knowledge base</u> and <u>competency levels</u> of social work professionals. I serve returning Veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan, many of whom present complex emotional, psychological and physical needs requiring in many cases long-term care from a multi-disciplinary team of care providers. It is critical that these

men and women Veterans know that I and my social work colleagues are current and trained in up-to-date treatment methods and care no less than any other professional serving them.

- Access to best practices and innovations in the field of social work. The role of the Hawaii chapter of NASW will be to assist in the coordination of the variety of important trainings necessary to ensure that its membership is in compliance with this critical legislation, to include not only in-person trainings but electronic teleconference and webinar outreach to social workers in both urban and rural settings throughout Hawaii.
- Continuing education is a national standard and social work ethic. All states, except
  New York and Hawaii, have continuing education requirements for licensed social
  workers. Our Hawaii communities deserve that social workers in Hawaii be recognized
  as professionals meeting that standard.
- <u>Note</u>: I acknowledge the one discrepancy with regard to effective date as stated in the Senate and House bills. The House Bill 178 states "effective date 2112"; Senate Bill 200 calls for "effective date upon approval".

Similar to the National Association of Social Workers Hawai'i Chapter, the mission of the HPA is to enhance the quality of life for the people of Hawai'i by encouraging, integrating, applying, and communicating the contributions of Psychology in all its branches. The HPA seeks to strengthen public relations, advocate for a psychologically healthy community, develop solutions for mental health care, be responsive to the multiple cultures in Hawai'i, promote the highest standards of professional ethics, and to diffuse psychological knowledge through meetings, conventions and publications. As part of this mission, we are committed to promoting lifelong learning to account for the changing world in which we live. We support this bill with the shared goal to promote client/patient safety and support the valuable role social workers contribute in our health care system.

It is estimated that the rate of human information is doubling every two years. Additionally, multicultural experts have pointed to changing demographics in the United States, particularly Hawai'i, and suggest that professionals must make substantive revisions to their curriculum, training, research and practice to address issues of race and ethnicity, culture, gender and sexual orientation. My name is Nathan Chang, and I am writing today in support of SB 200, relating to continuing education for social workers.

First, let me say that I have been a practicing social worker in Hawai'i for more than 37 years, have been an active member of the National Association of Social Workers for the same period of time, and was one of a group of social workers who developed the current licensing statute for social workers twelve years ago. I have a strong commitment to the profession, to the concept of professionalism, and to the public that we serve. It is from this perspective that I advocate for the passage of this measure.

I must admit that I was initially somewhat hesitant to support mandated continuing education for social workers as it would place yet another financial burden on practitioners who are generally not compensated adequately for the work that they do and the responsibilities that they carry. However, after long contemplation regarding the relevant issues and concerns, I have determined that it is a reasonable and necessary addition to the current licensing law.

An inherent part of being a professional is the utilization of theory to inform practice and the continual maintenance and enhancement of practice skills. As such, it is necessary for professionals to keep up with developments within the field in relation to things like research and theory on best practices. It has been my observation over the years that most social workers understand this and do seek continual training to maintain their theory base and skills. They would not be adversely affected by this measure because they are already engaged in continuing education. The concern is for those social workers who need more incentive to do so, and that is what this measure would provide.

I am therefore strongly urging your favorable consideration of this bill.

My name is Kenneth W.Y. Lee and I am retired social worker with over 45 years of experience. Since my retirement, I have continued to practice as a licensed social worker through volunteer work with the Hawaii Chapter of the American Red Cross and American Cancer Society. I would like to offer testimony in expression of my avid support of SB 200, Relating to Continuing Education for Social Workers.

Since I completed my social work training in 1968, the practice of social work has dramatically changed through evidence-based research studies. Some of the social work interventions and practices that I was initially taught have been proven, through evidence-based studies to be ineffective, or sometimes counter productive to clients.

As an example, the model for the stages of resolution of grief (created by Dr. Elizabeth Kubler-Ross in her milestone book "On Death and Dying", 1969) was well accepted and utilized by mental health professionals (myself included) for over four decades. The stages in her model (denial, anger, bargaining, depression and acceptance) have very recently been proven through evidence-based studies to be inaccurate. The model itself was not based on any credible scientific research, yet it was widely accepted by both the professional community and the public. Many mental health professionals, without any knowledge of these recent findings, still continue to use this model of grief resolution, to the possible detriment of their clients.

My strong support of SB 200 is for the following reasons:

- Only through mandating continuing education can the State ensure that the knowledge base and competency levels of all licensed social work professionals are current.
- Mandated continuing education ensures that licensed social workers are required to have
  access to best practices and the most recent innovations in the field of social work. This
  would improve and maintain the ability of social workers to provide effective, quality
  services to a broad spectrum of vulnerable clients. Requiring continuing education will
  protect Hawaii's consumers by assuring that social workers are current with the latest
  developments in their field.

Required continuing education will not present an undue burden for social workers.
 Many training opportunities are available statewide through in-person webinars, and teleconferences by approved providers.

All states, except Colorado and Hawaii, have continuing education requirements for licensed social workers. CE is a national standard. Hawaii's licensed social workers want to be recognized as meeting a widely accepted professional standard. For this, and all of the above reasons I urge you to support SB 200.
