BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 356D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§356D- Social service partnership. The authority may
5	enter into a work study program with the University of Hawaii
6	Myron B. Thompson school of social work and may allow the work
7	study program to be implemented at each public housing project
8	and state low-income housing project."
9	SECTION 2. New statutory material is underscored.
10	SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
