My name is Sandra Matsushima, Executive Officer for the Occupational Therapy

Program of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs ("Department"),

Professional and Vocational Licensing Division. The Department appreciates the

opportunity to testify in support of Senate Bill No. 2472, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, Relating to

Occupational Therapy Practice.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 2472, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, is to improve the regulation

of occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants by establishing an

occupational therapy program and licensing requirements for occupational therapists

and occupational therapy assistants.

UCHIDA TAKEUCHI DEPUTY DIRECTOR In order to implement the licensure of approximately 600 occupational therapists and licensure of approximately 100 occupational therapy assistants, we are requesting that an appropriation of \$70,000 from the compliance resolution fund be inserted into Section 8 of the bill. The appropriation is being requested to cover operating expenditures such as office supplies, postage, and other current expenses to carry out and maintain this new regulatory area within the purview of the Director of the Department. Upon the issuance of a new license and at each license renewal period, every licensee will be assessed a \$100 surcharge in addition to the normal licensing fees. Once the collection of \$70,000 is received, the assessment of the surcharge shall cease.

We are also requesting that the Act shall take effect upon approval.

The Department has worked in collaboration with the proponents of the bill and we support Senate Bill No. 2472, S.D. 2, H.D. 2.

The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs ("Department")

appreciates the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 2472 S.D.2 H.D.2,

Relating to Occupational Therapy Practice. My name is Daria Loy-Goto, Complaints

and Enforcement Officer for the Department's Regulated Industries Complaints

Office ("RICO"). RICO offers the following testimony in support of the bill.

Senate Bill No. 2472 S.D.2 H.D.2 creates an occupational therapy program

within the Department and provides for the licensure of occupational therapists and

occupational therapy assistants. RICO worked collaboratively with the Occupational Therapy Association of Hawaii on several amendments to improve RICO's enforcement of the new licensing provisions and those amendments were adopted in the House Draft 2. RICO believes that Senate Bill No. 2472 S.D.2 H.D.2 will allow it to investigate and prosecute violations of Chapter 457G, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

I am Avis Sakata, OTR, President of the Occupational Therapy Association of Hawaii (OTAH) which represents over 560 occupational therapists (OTR) and 125 occupational therapy assistants (OTA) in Hawaii. Occupational Therapy practitioners are employed in many settings throughout the State, including hospitals, schools, skilled nursing facilities, Veterans Administration, Tripler Army Medical Center, mental health and community-based programs to name a few.

Occupational Therapy is a science driven, evidence-based health care profession that focuses on helping people of all ages, regain, develop, or maximize everyday skills in order to live independent and productive lives. Occupational Therapy services are provided for the purpose of promoting health and wellness to those who have or are at risk for developing an illness, injury, disease, disability or condition. Occupational therapy also addresses the physical, cognitive, psychosocial, sensory and other aspects of performance to support engagement in everyday life activities.

Occupational Therapy practitioners are recognized members of the healthcare rehabilitation and/or educational team which may be comprised of physicians, nurses, physical therapists, speech therapists, psychologists, social workers, case managers, teachers and others. As a healthcare provider, occupational therapy practitioners :1) assess and evaluate our patients/clients needs and develop an appropriate treatment plan; 2) interventions are focused on daily living skills, work readiness, play or educational performance skills; 3) and interventions include sensorimotor, neuromuscular, cognitive or psychosocial components.

Occupational therapists possess either Bachelors, Masters or Doctorate degrees while occupational therapy assistants graduate with an Associates Degree. Both the occupational therapist and assistant work collaboratively in providing rehabilitation services to their patients and clients. Occupational therapists (OTR) are currently regulated by Chapter 457G – registration, however, licensure would ensure the highest degree of government regulation that would safeguard the public's health, safety and welfare. Hawaii is the last state to gain licensure regulation for occupational therapists and the last of three states for occupational therapy assistants. Licensure will also protect your constituents from incompetent persons and persons who are not qualified to perform occupational therapy services and require the highest degree of professional conduct on the part of the occupational therapy practitioners. In addition, the intent of this bill is taking a proactive approach in protecting the consumer via providing government oversight versus being reactive and moving forth with legislation only after harm or unethical practices have occurred. Lastly, licensure would ensure the consumer access to occupational therapy benefits or services as the majority of health insurance carriers recognize services provided by "licensed" professionals.

We strongly support SB2472, SD2, HD2 that will provide for licensure of both occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants and would further define the scope of practice of Occupational Therapy. OTAH has worked in collaboration with Sandra Matsushima, Executive Officer for Occupational Therapy and Daria Loy-Goto, Regulated Industries Complaint Office on this bill. The bill has been amended per recommendations from DCCA and RICO and OTAH is in agreement as this would provide further clarification and enforcement of the bill.

On behalf of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) I am writing in support of SB 2472, to revise the state occupational therapy practice act. The purpose of the bill is to safeguard public health, safety, and welfare; protect the public from incompetent, unethical or unauthorized persons; assure a high level of professional conduct on the part of Occupational Therapists and Occupational Therapy Assistants; and assure the availability of high quality Occupational Therapy services to persons in need of such services.

My name is Lucy Lessard, I am the Manager of Inpatient Rehabilitation Services at The Queen's Medical Center. I would like to provide testimony in support of S.B. 2472, SD2, HD2, Relating to Occupational Therapy Practice.

The Queen's Medical Center is the leading medical referral center in the Pacific Basin and offers a comprehensive range of primary and specialized care services, including acute care physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech language therapy. As the only Level II Trauma Center and only The Joint Commission-certified Primary Stroke Center and Hip and Knee Joint Replacement Center in the State of Hawaii, we specialize in the care of complex trauma, stroke, and orthopedics patients.

The Queen's Medical Center employs occupational therapists and occupational therapist assistants throughout our acute care and skilled nursing units. They provide a valuable service to our patients and work alongside other professionals as part of the multidisciplinary team.

Hawaii is the only state that does not currently license occupational therapists and is one of 3 remaining states that do not license occupational therapist assistants. The State of Hawaii educates occupational therapist assistants; however all occupational therapists are educated on the mainland. The licensure of these professionals is necessary to ensure the highest form of oversight in order to protect the public from unqualified individuals, employers from hiring those individuals and to raise the quality of occupational therapy services to equal that which is found on the mainland.

We understand that there are ongoing discussions between the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and the Occupational Therapy Association of Hawaii in revising the proposal. The Queen's Medical Center is supportive of that dialog and urges passage of S.B. 2472, SD2, HD2 so that those exchanges may continue to further develop this measure. We are occupational therapy practitioners employed at Straub Clinic & Hospital and we support SB 2472, SD1, HD2 which would license both occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants.

At Straub, the occupational therapists play an integral role in the rehabilitation of our patients many of whom have sustained an injury or illness such as strokes, burns, amputations, hip/knee replacements, neurological injuries, arm and shoulder injuries or fractures. Our services encompass both on the acute inpatient units as well as outpatient services.

Occupational therapy services include: 1) assessment and evaluation of our patients followed by development of a treatment plan, 2) interventions focusing on activities of daily living, work readiness, return to hobbies/sports, 3) therapeutic exercises, therapeutic activities, physical agent modalities, cognitive or psychosocial components, 4) education of family members or significant others in carrying out appropriate interventions, 5) adaptation or recommendations for home modifications or other environments to allow our patients to return home safely.

As you may be aware, Hawaii is the only state that does not currently license Occupational Therapists (OTR) and one of three remaining states that does not license Occupational Therapy Assistants (OTA). Licensure would protect the public from incompetent practitioners from practicing in Hawaii and would require the highest degree of professional conduct on the part of both OT's and OTA's. This bill would also further define the scope of Occupational Therapy practice in Hawaii.

We are occupational therapists currently employed at Kahi Mohala Behavioral Health. We strongly support SB 2472 SD2 HD1 to license both occupational therapists (OTR) and occupational therapy assistants (OTA) in Hawaii.

As you may be aware, Hawaii is the only state that does not currently license Occupational Therapists (OTR), and one of 3 remaining states that does not license Occupational Therapy Assistants.

At the behavioral health hospital where we are currently employed, occupational therapy practitioners play an integral role in each patient's recovery. We work with patients (ages 4 through adult) who are struggling to deal with their life circumstances, while managing the symptoms of a mental illness. We teach important life skills and coping skills to support their successful reintegration into the community. It is only through our knowledge and the application of evidenced based OT principles as it relates to psychosocial functioning, that we are able to provide the most effective care and treatment.

We strongly feel that licensure provides the highest form of government oversight and will continue to: 1) safeguard the public's health, safety and welfare; 2) Protect those seeking occupational therapy services from incompetent persons and persons not qualified to perform these services; 3) Require the highest degree of professional conduct on the part of occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants and 4) Provide the highest quality of occupational therapy services in Hawaii. This bill will also further define the scope of Occupational Therapy practice.

We hope that you and your committee will look favorably upon the passage of this bill, which would provide full licensure for both occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants in Hawaii. I injured all of my fingers in both hands while trying to prevent an iron gate from falling off its track. Needless to say, I had to undergo surgery by an orthopedic surgeon to place pins in my fingers to repair all of the broken bones. After surgery, my doctor referred me to Straub where the occupational therapist had to design and make two special hand splints to not only protect the pins, but to allow healing of all of the bones. After one month, I was sent back to see my occupational therapist and under her guidance I was taught exercises that would help me regain the motion and strength in my hands. One takes things for granted, but the simplest things like brushing your teeth, washing your hair, cutting with a knife and even driving were challenges that I faced. My occupational therapist encouraged me and provided step-by-step instructions and I have now "graduated" from O.T. Without rehabilitation professionals like the occupational therapists, I would probably have not been able to regain my hand function.
