The members of the Small Business Regulatory Review Board (SBRRB) are in **support** of **S.B. 2487 SD1**, Relating to the Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Act. This measure requires members of the SBRRB to receive training by the appropriate division of the department of the attorney general, clarifies the contents of the annual report that the SBRRB must submit to the legislature, sunsets the SBRRB and chapter 201M, HRS on June 30, 2019.

This independent small business regulatory review board, better known as SBRRB, consists of eight pro-bono appointees from across the state each with different business backgrounds, and one designated DBEDT ex officio member, to provide a healthy, homegrown mixed plate representation of the 117,000+ small business entities throughout the state providing over 475,000 jobs.

Since the SBRRB's inception, we have reviewed and rendered our advice on over 600 proposed rules and amendments and existing rules and regulations submitted by state and county agencies. We have conducted our reviews of rules, regulations and petitions submitted to the board pursuant to the guidelines set forth in Chapter 91, HRS and Chapter 201M, HRS.

As appointed pro bono board members on the SBRRB, we firmly believe we are performing our role as representatives of small businesses: providing input, recommendations, engaging with agencies and small businesses on rules and regulations that may have a negative, detrimental impact that impedes the growth and success of the small businesses within our State. The SBRRB volunteers provide a valuable, needed service to enhance, promote and defend the continued growth of small business to perpetuate a positive, healthy economy and lifestyle for the benefit of our present and future generations here in Hawaii.

Chair Tsuji and Members of the Committee:

I am Tim Lyons, President of the Hawaii Business League, a small business service organization. We can support this bill.

We continue to believe that the <u>Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Act is a great vehicle</u>. It's problem has been <u>since it's very inception</u> that it has not had <u>the proper staff</u>, not been given the <u>proper attention</u> and not been given <u>sufficient resources</u> to get its job done.

As you may know when the Act was <u>first created, it pretty much received a "stiff arm"</u> from most <u>of the regulatory agencies</u>. They largely ignored it and it wasn't until an <u>executive order</u> was sent to all the <u>department heads that the Board was given any credence at all</u>.

Under another <u>administration, the Board was given even more credence</u> and at this point, the <u>Board worked better than it probably ever has</u>. That is largely because the <u>Departments came</u> to the Board in <u>order to get small business input</u> and although, because it was new, it was considered one more step in the process, it nevertheless <u>provided a very effective</u> and important role in <u>assuring that regulations without input did not take place</u>.

We ask you to consider <u>all the regulations</u> and there are hundreds that go to the Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Board which are by and large reviewed and <u>acted upon by a board of</u> <u>volunteers who has</u> at times, had barely <u>a part-time person</u> assigned to it. With tons of regulations bestowed upon the Board for review we hardly see how a part-time person and a volunte<u>er Board</u> could accomplish that <u>mission</u>. This is <u>not to say that this is not a worthwhile</u> <u>mission and it is not</u> to say that it <u>couldn't be done but it does take the resources and the</u> <u>personnel in order to provide for an effective process</u>.

We would recommend to this Committee that <u>you consider</u> bolstering the <u>Board and having the</u> <u>Legislature</u> provide it with the <u>proper resources</u> and staff.

5B2487,5D1 Proposed 401

Under Section 201M-5 Small business regulatory review board; powers.

- (a) There shall be established within the department of business, economic development, and tourism for administrative purposes, a small business regulatory review board to review any proposed new or amended rule or to consider any request from small business owners for review of any rule adopted by a state agency and to make recommendations to the agency or the legislature regarding the need for a rule change or legislation. For requests regarding county ordinances, the board may make recommendations to the county or the mayor for appropriate action.
- (b) In order to operate effectively, the small business regulatory review board shall be sufficiently supported by the department of business, economic development and tourism. The director of the department of business, economic development and tourism shall include as part of this subsection sufficient administrative assistance with a reasonable nexus to the small business regulatory review activities of the board.
