Re: S.B. No. 2496, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, Relating to Tobacco Products

The Department of Taxation (Department) appreciates the intent of S.B. 2496, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, and provides the following comments for the Committee's consideration.

S.B. 2496, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, amends the tax on tobacco products other than cigarettes and cigars by imposing the tax on sales made after January 1, 2015, at an unspecified rate of the wholesale price. This measure also specifies that the funds from the tax on tobacco products other than cigarettes and cigars shall be deposited in the Hawaii cancer research special fund and the Hawaii tobacco prevention and control trust fund. H.D. 1 has a defective effective date of July 1, 2150.

The Department defers to the Department of Health with respect to the effect a change in the tax rate and fund redistribution would have on the State's health and wellness.

The House Committee on Health adopted the Department's suggested amendment to the previous version of this bill by deleting an automatic rate increase provision. The Department appreciates and supports this amendment.

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SUBJECT: TOBACCO, Increase rate on tobacco products

BILL NUMBER: SB 2496, HD-1

INTRODUCED BY: House Committee on Health

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Beginning on January 1, 2015 this measure proposes what appears to be a tobacco tax increase. However, as has been seen in other states, the increased tax on tobacco products may result in a decline in collections as consumers either reduce consumption or evade the tax by going to other markets. If the idea is to support the Hawaii cancer research special fund, lawmakers may want to consider a direct appropriation to these program areas.

BRIEF SUMMARY: Amends HRS 245-3 to increase the tax on tobacco products other than cigarettes and large cigars to ____% of the wholesale price sold by the wholesaler or dealer on and after January 1, 2015.

Amends HRS section 245-3(a)(13) to provide that the revenue generated under the rate increase shall be allocated with ____% deposited to the credit of the Hawaii cancer research special fund and ___% deposited into the Hawaii tobacco prevention and control trust fund.

EFFECTIVE DATE: July 1, 2050

STAFF COMMENTS: Currently tobacco products, other than cigarettes and large cigars, are taxed at 70% of the wholesale price of the product. Beginning on January 1, 2015 tobacco products, other than cigarettes and large cigars, shall be taxed at ____% of the wholesale value. The proposed measure also provides that the revenues derived from the proposed tax increase on tobacco products shall be deposited into the Hawaii cancer research special fund and the Hawaii tobacco prevention and control trust fund.

Care should be exercised in attempting to generate additional revenues from the tobacco tax. Hawaii's tax rates on these products are already among the highest in the nation. Not only would another rate increase reaffirm the perception that Hawaii is a tax hell, but it would probably have an effect on behavioral responses. Not only might it drive consumers to quit smoking, which theoretically is what health advocates want, but it may also drive consumers to find other sources for these products that would not incur the tax. Mail order and Internet sales are sources of product that could escape taxation as well as black market purchases made from the military reservations in Hawaii. So instead of seeing growing collections from higher tax rates, lawmakers may just find that collections will drop due to its effect to discourage consumption and send consumers to other markets. As noted above, the higher one pushes the cost of these products, the greater the possibility of actually seeing a decline in collections as consumers either could moderate consumption or shift it in ways that would avoid the tax. In fact, as was evidenced in the states of New Jersey and Maryland, lawmakers there counted on an increase in the

cigarette tax to help balance their budgets only to learn that collections actually went down below their prior levels. Thus, care should be exercised in targeting these products for specific programs or services.

For this very reason, earmarking the tax for a specific project or program could actually backfire. For example, should cigarette consumption decline, the amounts earmarked will also decline. If it is the intent of the legislature to provide adequate revenue to the stated programs, a direct appropriation would be preferable.

It should be noted that the hikes in the cigarette tax have begun to have an effect on collections not only locally but also nationally. For the first time in the continual drive to raise the tax on cigarettes, collections have fallen below their previous levels. For whatever reason, the rise in rate has jeopardized this source of revenue. If nothing else, lawmakers need to make up their minds whether or not they see this tax a source of revenue or a means by which deter consumption.

SB 2496 SD2 HD1 - RELATING TO TOBACCO PRODUCTS

Chair Luke, Vice Chairs Nishimoto and Johanson, and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i Cancer Center strongly supports this bill, which proposes to impose a tax on tobacco products other than large cigars and credit the resulting revenues to the Cancer Research Special Fund.

The Cancer Center is one of only 68 institutions in the U.S. that hold the prestigious National Cancer Institute (NCI) designation and is the only NCI designated center in the Pacific.

The NCI designation provides greater access to federal funding and research opportunities. More importantly, it gives the people of Hawai'i and the Pacific region access to innovative and potentially life-saving clinical trials without the necessity of traveling to the mainland.

This bill addresses a serious concern among health professionals that addictive tobacco products other than cigarettes – including snuff, chewing tobacco or loose roll-your-own tobacco – are attracting a new generation of tobacco users. While the dangers of smoking are well known, national research also tells us there is no safe form of tobacco use.

Health advocates have urged consistent and equal taxation of the various forms of tobacco to avoid attracting consumers, especially youth, to products that are a less expensive substitute to cigarettes.

Since the cigarette tax increases were imposed beginning in 2006, sales have decreased steadily, which may indicate that the higher cost to consumers was the disincentive intended.

However, the declining revenue has had a negative impact on the Cancer Center's budget, and unless we compensate for the loss of revenue and obtain the necessary

funds to increase the size of our faculty, we will not meet the new and more stringent requirements to renew our NCI designation in 2017.

The additional revenue generated by this bill will allow the Cancer Center to continue to provide innovative clinical trials to Hawai'i residents to prevent and treat cancer, and to continue its research on the causes and cures for cancer, including those that are related to tobacco and smoking.

We are dedicated to enhancing community awareness of cancer-related issues, and we work with trusted organizations to address cancer health disparities in Hawai'i and the Pacific region. These organizations include 'Imi Hale (the native Hawaiian cancer network), the American Cancer Society, and the state Department of Health. Our community outreach helps people make better decisions about their health.

The incidence of cancer is increasing significantly and may double during the next twenty years, according to recent estimates by the International Agency for Cancer. It is imperative that we maintain NCI designation to provide our state residents access to the most novel clinical trials here in Hawai'i, in order to reduce the incidence of cancer in our state and to eliminate the need for our cancer patients to travel to the mainland to have access to novel therapies.

We respectfully urge you to pass this bill.

Thank you for the opportunity to offer testimony in **strong support of** SB 2496, SD2, HD1 which proposes to raise the tax on other tobacco products to achieve parity between cigarette taxes and other tobacco products (OTPs) and earmarks a portion of the revenues to tobacco prevention and control.

The Coalition for a Tobacco Free Hawaii (Coalition) is a program of the Hawaii Public Health Institute working to reduce tobacco use through education, policy and advocacy. Our program consists of over 100 member organizations and 2,000 advocates that work to create a healthy Hawaii through comprehensive tobacco prevention and control efforts.

Health is Promoted By Increasing the Tax on Tobacco Products Other Than Cigarettes

By increasing the cost of each tobacco product sold and making it comparable to cigarettes, tobacco use by adults and young people will decrease. This will result in a decline in the serious health conditions that arise from use of smokeless tobacco including cancer of the esophagus pharynx, larynx, stomach, and pancreas, gum disease, and the risk of cardiovascular disease, and a decrease in the diseases caused by smoking roll-your-own tobacco.

Adolescents and young adults are two to three times more sensitive to tobacco price changes than adults—when price increases, less youth will begin using smokeless tobacco and other tobacco products and more will reduce their consumption. Hawaii has seen youth use of smokeless tobacco fluctuate despite our decreasing smoking rates.



Currently, the tax on OTPs (other than large cigars) in Hawaii is 70% of the wholesale price. The amount recommended to achieve tax parity is 85% of wholesale value.

<u>The Coalition Supports Earmarking a Portion of the Revenues for Tobacco Prevention and</u> Control

In a recent poll conducted by Qmark for the Coalition, Hawaii residents overwhelmingly agree (94%) that it's important for the state to earmark some of the revenue from cigarette and tobacco taxes to fund tobacco prevention and quit smoking programs. When the price of tobacco increases, more people seek help to quit.

The Coalition strongly supports creating parity between OTPs and cigarettes and the current earmark for tobacco prevention and control. We respectfully ask you to pass SB 2496, SD2, HD1.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in **support** of SB 2496 SD2, HD1, which increases the tax on other tobacco products other than large cigars to an unspecified of the wholesale price and distributes the proceeds in unspecified amounts to the cancer center special fund and the tobacco control and prevention trust fund..

The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) is the nation's leading cancer advocacy organization. ACS CAN works with federal, state, and local government bodies to support evidence-based policy and legislative solutions designed to eliminate cancer as a major health problem.

The purpose of this measure is to ensure parity between the taxes on cigarettes and other tobacco products. In addition, any increase in cigarette taxes will also trigger an automatic increase in the tax on other tobacco products, so that parity continues between the two products.

While some other tobacco products, like smokeless tobacco products including snus, dissolvable strips, sticks and orbs, do not create combustible chemical smoke like cigarettes, they are still harmful to our health. To date, use of smokeless tobacco has been shown to cause:

- Cancer of the mouth, pancreas, and esophagus;
- Precancerous mouth lesions;
- Dental problems including gum recession, dental cavities, and bone loss around the teeth; and
- Nicotine addiction.

Having consistency with the taxes on cigarettes and other tobacco products prevents having one product be significantly less expensive than the other, and discourages the purchase and use of all tobacco products.

My name is William Goo. I represent the Cigar Association of America, Inc. (CAA).

CAA opposes SB 2496 HD1 to the extent that it seeks to increase the excise tax on certain tobacco products such as pipe and smokeless tobacco. Although this bill is focused in part on the use of tobacco products by adolescents and young adults, it would impact users of products such as pipe or smokeless tobacco. These products are not typically favored nor used by adolescents and young adults in Hawaii.

To the extent that the bill attempts to equalize the tax rate on such products with the tax rate on cigarettes, they are very different products. For example, pipe tobacco is not consumed in the same manner as cigarettes, and cigarette consumers are not likely to substitute cigarettes for pipe tobacco. Increasing the tax on such products which is already among the highest in the nation would be devastating for those consumers who have responsibly chosen to use them.

As to the Legislature's concern of the temptation to purchase less expensive products such as loose or roll-your-own tobacco, any tax increase should apply only to that specific product.

I thank you for this opportunity in **strong support of SB 2496, SD2, HD1**, regarding increasing taxes on other tobacco products. This topic is very important to our organization, as we help those who suffer the awful ravages of long-term exposure to tobacco, those with emphysema and chronic bronchitis. I support this measure because it is a win-win for our State. Our State gains tax revenue and fewer people will use tobacco products, decreasing preventable diseases including cancers, gum disease, and cardiovascular conditions.

My name is Valerie Chang. I am Executive Director of the Hawaii COPD Coalition. Our organization provides services and support to Hawaii's people affected by Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease, more commonly known as emphysema and chronic bronchitis. COPD is now the third leading cause of death in the US and second leading cause of disability. Over 30,800 people in Hawaii have already been diagnosed with COPD and it is estimated that at least 30,800 more people may suffer from COPD but remain undiagnosed. Many of these COPD patients were seduced by tobacco when they were very young and unable to quit the addiction for decades, causing irreparable harm. *There are over \$55 million in COPD hospital charges in Hawaii each year*.

One in three of the people we have found in Hawaii with low lung function were non-smokers, which highlights the dangers of second-hand smoke. Research by Dr. Elizabeth Tam of the John A. Burns School of Medicine highlighted that asthmatics are severely affected by second-hand smoke and being around smokers, even more than VOG (volcanic fog) of our volcanoes. There is a huge body of research that was carefully considered by this legislature to support the passage of the smoke-free workplaces law. Nothing has changed to lessen the health effects that people are subjected to when exposed to second-hand smoke, whether the setting is bars, nightclubs or any other venue. Let us not endanger the health of these workers who cannot easily afford to leave their jobs and search for another in this difficult economy.

Tobacco and nicotine products are still the leading cause of preventable disease. COPD is estimated to cause one in four deaths in Canada, our neighbors to the north. Let us reduce our exposure in Hawaii by increasing taxes. Taxes on all tobacco and nicotine products (including those contained in electronic smoking devices) must be equitable so that nicotine addicts will quit rather than switching to a less expensive option. More smokers quitting means reduced costs to our state in tobacco-related medical expenses. I also ask these tax increases be distributed as the original Tobacco Settlement Trust Funds are distributed—we must provide programs to help tobacco users quit, to increase their successes.

Thanks for the opportunity to testify about this issue that is so vital to the health of Hawaii and our nation. This issue is very important to our state and our Hawaii COPD Coalition is very glad that this committee has taken a leadership role in addressing this important matter. **Please vote in favor of SB2496, SD2, HD1.** Thank you.

The American Heart Association supports the intent of SB 2496, SD2, HD1 "Relating to Tobacco Products."

The American Heart Association is dedicated to supporting state and local action to protect the public from the dire effects of tobacco. As you are undoutedly aware, tobacco use is the leading preventable risk factor for cardiovascular diseases. Increasing tobacco pricing through taxes have been cited by the Centers for Disease Control as one of the science-based best practices proven to reduce tobacco consumption. There is no safe level of consumption of any tobacco product, including cigars and "other" tobacco products. Therefore, the American Heart Association recommends that all tobacco-related products be included in efforts to establish higher uniform tobacco taxes.

The American Heart Association also recommends that a significant portion of tobacco taxes be dedicated toward tobacco prevention and control funding. The CDC recommends that Hawaii invest \$15.2 million annually in tobacco prevention and control, while Hawaii invests only \$7.9 million.

The American Heart Association also recommends that all "OTPs" be taxed at a rate of 85% per cent of the wholesale price of each article or item of tobacco products.

As a pediatrician in Honolulu and medical director of the HEALTHY Quit Smoking Program, I strongly support SB2496.

The early initiation of smoking before age 18 is an important problem to address. Almost 90% of adult smokers started when they were younger than 18. I care for many children that suffer from secondhand smoke and urge you to consider the adverse health effects from tobacco use.

Raising the prices of all tobacco products helps deter the initiation of tobacco use, especially for young people, who are more sensitive to increased prices of these products. SB2496 raises the tax on other tobacco products (OTPs) to the same level as cigarettes, so that the price barrier for all tobacco products is equivalent.

Please also consider earmarking a portion of the funds from these taxes towards supporting tobacco cessation and prevention programs. As the medical director of the HEALTHY Quit Smoking Program, I have seen the positive outcomes from cessation efforts.

Comments: One should take note that tax increases often produce the opposite results. Take for example: Tobacco Tax Increases Can Actually Cause Revenue Losses On October 2009, Washington, DC raised its cigarette excise tax from \$2.00 to \$2.50. At the time, DC's Office of the Chief Financial Officer estimated that FY10 cigarette excise tax revenues would be \$45.4 million or 20.8% above 2009 levels. In fact, revenues were \$12 million lower than projections and even declined \$4.2 million below FY09 levels. At the beginning of FY07, New Jersey raised its cigarette excise tax from \$2.40 to \$2.58 per pack. At the time, revenue was projected to rise to \$819 million. Not only did actual revenues miss projections, they also declined below the two previous fiscal year levels.
