Chair Takai and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General offers the following comments regarding constitutional and legal concerns as to the contents of this bill.

This bill, among other things, proposes to create a nonprofit entity under chapter 414D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, named the Pacific-Asia Institute for Resilience and Sustainability, which is to be placed within the Office of the Lieutenant Governor.

We first note that the Pacific-Asia Institute for Resilience and Sustainability is to be created as a nonprofit entity under chapter 414D, but placed within the executive branch. Consequently, it is unclear whether or not such an entity would be a state agency, subject to the various rights and responsibilities of state agencies, such as sovereign immunity, the State Code of Ethics, etc. If you wish to create a state agency, then we recommend that you delete the phrase "under chapter 414D" on page 2, line 7, of this bill. If you wish to create a private entity, we recommend that you delete the phrase "and to be placed within the office of the lieutenant governor for administrative purposes only" on page 2, lines 8-10, of this bill. This latter change would also resolve the concern regarding compliance with article V, section 6, of the Hawaii State Constitution discussed below.

Under article V, section 6, of the Hawaii State Constitution,

[a]ll executive and administrative offices, departments and instrumentalities of the state government and their respective powers and duties shall be allocated by law among and within not more than twenty principal departments in such a manner as to group the same according to common purposes and related functions. agencies for special purposes may be established by law and need not be allocated within a principal department.

Only temporary agencies established for a special purpose, therefore, may validly be placed within the Lieutenant Governor's Office.

In order to comply with article V, section 6, of the Hawaii State Constitution and assuming you wish to create a state entity, we respectfully recommend that page 2, lines 9-10, of this bill be amended to place the Pacific-Asia Institute for Resilience and Sustainability within one of the principal departments of the State.

These changes will resolve our constitutional and legal concerns as to the contents of this bill. We respectfully submit these comments to the Committee for its information.

Chair Takai, Vice Chair Ito, and Members of the House Committee on Veterans, Military, and International Affairs, and Culture and the Arts.

The Office of Planning (OP) offers the following comments on SB 2742, SD1, which would establish the Pacific-Asia Institute for Resilience and Sustainability (herein after referred to as the "Institute") – an innovative public-private partnership with the purpose of developing the next generation of leaders to address problems of global concern, including climate change, environmental degradation, public health, sustainable use of natural resources, critical infrastructure protection, and cyber resilience.

OP has long been involved in the topic of climate change and recently guided the development and passage of Act 286, Hawaii's Climate Change Adaptation Priority Guidelines, which was signed by Governor Abercrombie in 2012, and is codified as HRS § 226-109. Since then, we have been working with county, state, and federal agencies to implement Act 286 through Hawaii's major statewide land use policies (i.e., State Land Use Law (HRS

Chapter 205); Coastal Zone Management Act (HRS Chapter 205A); and State Planning Act (HRS Chapter 226)). In doing so, OP has recognized an increasing need to better align scientific information with resource management decisions and sees the Institute as an excellent opportunity for bridging the apparent science-policy disconnect.

In particular, OP recommends that the Institute not only operate "through multisector integration and coordination of three core activities," but also under the guidance of an appointed Board of Directors, whose members would include, among others, ex officio representatives from state and county agencies with the jurisdiction and resources to address issues related to sustainability and resilience. The latter would ensure that the Institute's approach to community resilience is consistent with the everyday needs of decision-makers.

Aloha Chair Takai, Vice Chair Ito and members of the Committee on Veterans, Military, and International Affairs and Culture and the Arts. My name is Ken Kaneshiro and I am the Director of the Center for Conservation Research & Training at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. However, I am presenting testimony on SB 2742 as a private individual and my comments do not reflect the opinion of the University of Hawai'i.

I am in strong support of the intent of SB 2742 to establish a Pacific-Asia Institute for Resilience and Sustainability which is "...envisioned to provide an opportunity for a new generation of leaders..." who will become tomorrow's leaders in addressing challenges within the global commons. Hawaiian island environments provide ideal test beds for developing the models and technologies required to achieve sustainability and resilience in face of impending climate change scenarios. There is an urgent need to enhance the development of the emerging field of "Sustainability Science and Resilience" and the Hawaiian Islands serve as a microcosm of real-world sustainability issues such as conservation of biodiversity, habitat protection and restoration of ecosystem services and resilience, etc., where research on these issues can be studied at manageable spatial scales. Furthermore, lessons in sustainability can be assimilated from traditional Hawaiian cultural practices where intensive and productive agricultural uses of the landscape supported remarkably high population densities.

The establishment of the Pacific-Asia Institute for Resilience & Sustainability would foster the kind of research and education necessary to train the next generation of leaders with the capacity to address issues not only in Hawai'i but within the Pacific-Asia Region and beyond.
