The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS</u> SB2875, which would enable the Endangered Species Recovery Committee to more fully consider potential impacts to Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices in its advisory functions, by adding a person with a background in such practices to the committee.

OHA appreciates and supports the role of the Endangered Species Recovery Committee, in providing technical advice on the protection of Hawai'i's many endangered species and their respective habitats. Hawai'i is known as the "endangered species capitol of the world," with a renowned level of biodiversity that contributes significantly to our islands' scientific, cultural, educational and economic interests. Accordingly, protecting our unique and fragile natural resources, including our endangered species and their habitats, should be a high priority of the state.

OHA also notes that the state, through its boards and agencies, has a constitutional and moral obligation to promote Native Hawaiian cultural perpetuation, through the reasonable protection and enforcement of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices. Insofar as many of these practices are intrinsically connected to the land and its resources, certain endangered species recovery actions may unnecessarily restrict the exercise of these practices, or impact such practices to a greater extent than other potential alternatives.

Therefore, OHA believes that the inclusion of a member with a background in Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices will provide the Endangered Species Recovery Committee with an additional and important perspective through which to vet recovery action proposals, in carrying out its important advisory functions.

Accordingly, OHA urges the Committee to **PASS** SB2875. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify.

In consideration of SENATE BILL 2875 RELATING TO THE ENDANGERED SPECIES RECOVERY COMMITTEE

Senate Bill 2875 proposes to establish a new member to Hawaii State's Endangered Species Recovery Committee, which consults to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) and the Board of Land and Natural Resources on matters relating to endangered, threatened, proposed, and candidate species. **The Department strongly supports this Administrative bill.**

Currently, nearly all of the boards and commissions under the Department require a member with a background in native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices. Last session, legislation was enacted requiring such expertise for the Natural Area Reserves System Commission. The remaining Department boards and commissions that need such expertise are the Board of Land and Natural Resources and the Endangered Species Recovery Committee.

As the Department is obligated under the Hawaii Constitution and Hawaii statutory and case law to preserve and protect the exercise of traditional and customary native Hawaiian rights, it would provide great value to have a member on the Endangered Species Recovery Committee to have expertise in this area to provide guidance on natural resource protection and management decisions.

My name is Benton Kealii Pang. I am a biologist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, current Chair of the Forest Stewardship Committee and Chair of the Clean Water and Natural Lands Commission. Please excuse my absence from being physically present at today's hearing.

I offer my personal testimony in support of Senate Bill 2875. The Endangered Species Recovery Committee is charged with protecting our rarest Hawaiian species from extinction. These species are important cultural treasures which hold special significance to native Hawaiians as kinolau (embodiments of Hawaiian gods), customary practices, and cultural traditions. Adding a native Hawaiian cultural expert to the Endangered Species Recovery Committee adds an important cultural dimension to the committee which ensures the long term protection of Hawai'i's threatened and endangered species.
